Education Board Approves Request For Federal Funds

CORVALLIS (UPI)—The building committee of the State Board of Higher Education Monday approved application for federal planning funds for eight college building projects.

The buildings are to be built with money from a \$12.5 bond issue if the voters approve it next May. The 1963 legislature authorized the sale of the bonds, dependent on voter approval.

In the meantime, the committee voted to ask the U.S. Housing and Home Finance Agency for funds so that planning can be under way if the bond issue is approved.

The projects include a second unit of the Portland State College library, and additions to the physical education building at Southern Oregon College, University of Oregon library, University of Oregon College of Education library, University of Oregon Medical School library, Oregon State University pharmacy building and OSU's Cordley Hall.

The committee also fitted nine building projects originally estimated to cost more than \$12 million into an \$11.5 million allocation from the legislature.

Campbell Hall Work
Those projects are replacement of Campbell Hall at Oregon College of Education, completion of the Oregon Technical Institute plant, a new heating plant at the University of Oregon Medical

School, a utility tunnel extension at Oregon State, a \$3.4 million physical education building at Portland State, classrooms and laboratories at Southern Oregon College and OCE and a science and mathematics building at Eastern Oregon College.

In other action, the committee authorized completion of final plans for replacement of Campbell Hall, accepted preliminary plans for Oregon State's new marine science laboratory at the Quinn Bay and a new dormitory at OCE, authorized acceptance of the vessel Yaquina from the General Services Administration for use as an OSU ocean research ship and approved revised plans for a new University of Oregon student health center.

The actions by the committee were expected to be approved by the full board today.

Millions In Pay Increases Set By Legislature

SALEM (UPI)—Millions of dollars were allocated by the 1963 legislature for pay increases.

State agency and department heads had their top pay upped from the \$120 a year increase received by the employment commissioner, to the \$2,100 a year hike received by the director of finance and administration.

A total of \$4.2 million was set aside with the emergency board, made up of legislators, for increases in civil service and unclassified personnel pay rates.

The State Board of Higher Education received \$1,781,627 for pay raises for academic personnel.

Merit Raise Too

This money is in addition to automatic merit increases.

The governor was raised \$1,500 to \$21,500 a year. In addition, he receives \$600 a month for expenses.

The secretary of state and state treasurer also received a \$1,500 pay increase, bringing their pay up to \$16,500 a year.

The attorney general and labor commissioner were raised \$1,000 a year to \$16,000.

Pay for the newly-created position of state fire marshal was set in a range from \$8,200 to \$10,140.

The pay for the secretary of the Racing Commission, who was given the additional duties of pari-mutuel supervisor, was increased \$6,840 to a top of \$12,840.

One Salary Unchanged

The annual salary of the superintendent of public instruction was unchanged, and still ranges from \$14,800 to \$17,700.

Salaries of state policemen were increased. The top pay for recruits was upped \$120 to a top of \$4,800.

Privates were upped \$180 to a top of \$5,820; corporals up \$120 to \$6,900; sergeants up \$300 to \$7,500; lieutenants up \$480 to \$8,380, and captains up \$900 to \$9,900.

Highest-paid state employes is Roy E. Liewallen, chancellor of the State System of Higher Education, who receives \$26,000 a year plus a house, car and expense allotment. Next highest except for the governor are the superintendents of the state's mental hospitals, upped to a uniform \$19,680.

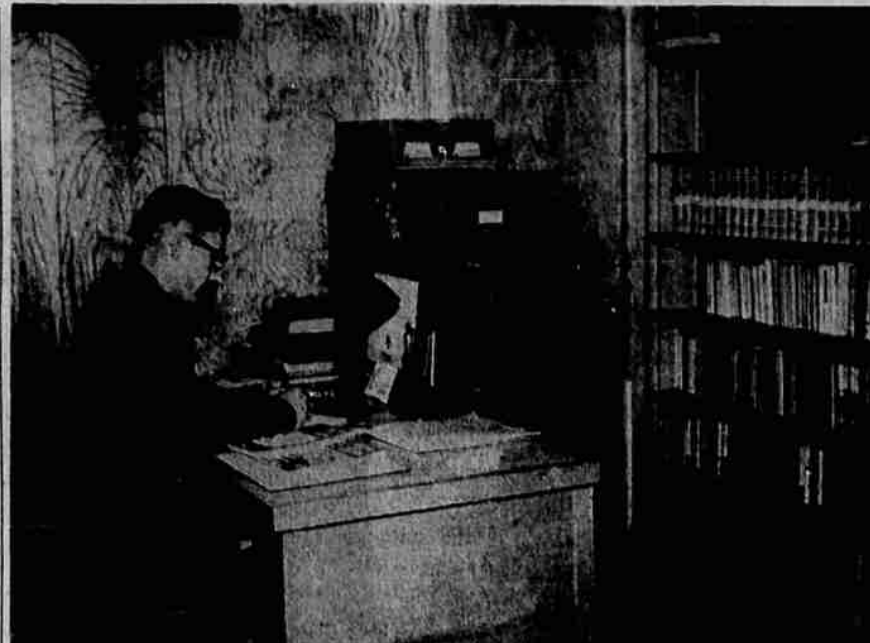

Glide Church Finishes New Building Job

The Glide Baptist Church has completed a new 50 by 60-foot cement block educational and recreational building behind the parsonage.

Two inner partitions running the full length of the building make a center main recreational room of 30 by 30 feet. In one corner of this room is a fireplace with a raised hearth and a surface wall which reaches to the ceiling. Oregon Rainbow rock, quarried in Maupin, faces the fireplace.

On the east side of one partition is a row of classrooms. Beyond the west partition is the pastor's kitchen and two restrooms. Dividing walls between the classrooms are removable for easy accommodation of a large group.

Regular Sunday school, Vacation Bible school and youth group meetings are being held in the new building now, reports correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

Western Union Asks Rate Hike

NEW YORK (UPI)—A 10 per cent increase in telegraph rates has been requested by Western Union, the company announced this week.

Western Union said it had asked the Federal Communications Commission to recommend repeal of the 10 per cent excise tax on telegrams. If the rate increase is approved and the tax is repealed, the public would pay no more for telegrams, the company said. The excise tax dates from World War II.

Western Union officials said the firm would use added revenue to complete a modernization program, including microwave communications systems valuable to national defense.
