Cool, Williams Claim Wins

Making the most of nearly every scoring opportunity, the Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors took off at a deadly pace in defense of their Doug-Lane League crown Tuesday.

The Roseburg nine romped to 6-12 and 7-0 triumphs over the invading Willamette (Bethel Legion) team as Dick Williams and Ran Cool turned in sparkling pitching performances.

Williams scattered six hits over the seven inning route in the first half of the double bill as he improved his record to 2-1. Williams' control was near perfection as he walked just one batter while fanning five.

Cool came on in the nightcap to shut-out the invaders with a nifty three-hitter. The flashy left-hander struck out 14, walked two and was tagged for just three singles. Cool has now struck out 44 batters in 19 innings and is boasting a 3-0 record for the season. During his 19 innings on the mound, Cool has given up just five hits—all singles.

Bob Manning provided the power in the first game with a towering circuit clout for three runs in the fifth inning, while Jim Beamer came through with a triple in his first appearance at the plate to run his hit string to five straight before grounding out in the fourth frame.

Lockwood Motors took the lead in the second inning of the opening game when Beamer led off with his triple to deep left. Tom Morrison brought the husky catcher home with a timely single through the box.

In the fourth the local stars struck again. With two away Lance Casebeer tripled to right field and scored on a passed ball.

Willamette threatened to even the count in the top of the fifth as Phil Petersen led off with a single to center, and with one away John Cornett doubled to deep right-center to score the lead runner. Williams then got Lonnie Ballard to ground out to Artie McDonald at short and Jim Coon flied out to Casebeer at second to end the inning with the tying run stranded at second.

Roseburg blew the game wide open in the fifth with a four-run rally. Williams was hit by the pitcher and McDonald followed with a base on balls. Mike Blomberg was safe on a hard smash which went through the second baseman's legs as Williams raced home. Manning then stepped to the plate and picked on a 1-1 pitch to send the ball into orbit over the right field fence 340 feet from home plate.

Willamette fought back with a single run in the sixth, but a potential rally was wiped out when Jerry Boucock snared a liner at third and tossed to second to double Carl Nicholson off the base. In the final frame Steve Skelton and Cornett met Williams with back-to-back singles, but the invaders could not keep the uprising alive.

Cool's teammates started him out on the right foot in the nightcap as they racked up two runs in the initial inning. McDonald led off with a single down the left field line and Blomberg walked. Manning forced Blomberg at second, then stole second. Beamer was intentionally walked to load the bases and Morrison came through with a broken-bat single to center scoring McDonald. Manning crossed the plate on a ground out.

Working on a two-run bulge, Cool retired the first 19 batters he faced before giving up a single to Nicholson in the fourth inning. By the time Willamette really got a threat going, Lockwood Motors was leading 7-0.

The winners scored an insurance run in the third on a walk to Blomberg, a stolen base, an error and a sacrifice fly by Beamer. In the fourth Roseburg tallied four after two were away. Ron Westbrook singled, Cool walked and McDonald was hit by the pitcher to load the bases. Blomberg followed with a screaming double to left field, clearing the bases, then continued around on a throwing error on the relay from the outfield.

Willamette's big threat came in the sixth frame. Pitcher Bob Haines led off with a single, after the first out Nicholson walked, and Peterson singled to load the sacks. With a 3-0 count on the batter, Jeff Rude, Cool poured a fast ball over the outside corner.

Rude thought he had a walk and tossed his bat to the side. Nicholson seeing the action at the plate started trotting toward third—only to discover the pitch was a called strike. Beamer's throw to Casebeer trapped Nicholson who headed for third and was thrown out. The play at third sent Haines streaking for the plate where he was cut down on a throw from Mike Markham.

The victory gives Roseburg a 2-0 league record, and increases the season's mark to 6-4. Thursday Lockwood Motors will host the Central Point Cheney Studs in a single non-league game at 8 p.m., then will travel to North Bend Friday for a single encounter with the Tower Motor team.

Changes Announced Here For Pee Wee Baseball Play

Pee Wee supervisor, Darl Thornton, reports that there has been a change in the districts to play at each field this summer from the original plan announced earlier.

The change became necessary when the Green and Winchester-Wilbur areas decided to form their own teams.

The same fields will be used and the boys will register Monday at the following times: 8 a.m. for boys 12 and 13; 10 a.m. for boys eight and nine; and 1:30 for boys 10 and 11. Practice sessions will start Tuesday at these same times.

Those to register at the Fullerton field will be the boys from Melrose, Fullerton IV, and students of the Fir Grove Elementary district living west of Ball St.

Riverside field will include those of the Riverside district and those from the Hucrest district living east of the freeway. Newton Creek boys are also included in this area, or may play for the Winchester-Wilbur team.

The Eastwood field will accommodate Eastwood, Benson and those Rose students living east on SE Stephens St. Those to register at the high school include boys from the Hucrest district west of the freeway, the Fir Grove students east of Ball St., including Umpqua Park, and the Rose district students living west of SE Stephens.

Registration fee will be \$2.50, which will include insurance for the player. Registration and insurance forms can be picked up this week at J.C. Sporting Goods or at the high school gym Thursday and Friday mornings. The forms will also be available Monday at the various diamonds. Players will not be permitted to practice until the forms are completed and returned.

Oregon Prep Matmen Due For Good Tour Of Japan

CORVALLIS — Ten Oregon high school wrestlers scheduled to compete in Japan this summer will see more of Nippon than most tourists.

That much was guaranteed this week when a nine-match schedule involving nearly 2,000 miles of travel within Japan was announced.

The Oregon schoolboys will depart from Portland aboard a Pan-Am jet flight July 9, spend three days in Hawaii and arrive in Japan July 13. They will open their exhibition schedule July 15 in Tokyo and end it there Aug. 3.

In between they will visit the cities of Sendai, Aomori, Asahigawa on the northern island of Hokkaido, Akita, Niigata, Gumma and Japan's second city, Osaka.

John Dustin and DeLance Duncan, wrestling coaches at Marshfield and Klamath Falls high schools respectively, will accompany the wrestlers and manage the tour.

Wrestlers will be selected at a try-out camp June 18-18 on the Oregon State University campus. Competitors who placed in an AAU meet here in March and high school state champions who competed but did not place in the same meet have been invited for the try-outs.

The selected 10, who will be obliged to win their berths in freestyle wrestling competition, will assemble again early in July in Portland for a training camp immediately before the trip.

The tour originally was scheduled to begin about July 23 in Japan but was advanced on the request of the Japanese. Oregon's athletes will be repaying a visit by a team of Japanese national high school champions to this state last winter.
