

Oregon Solons Request Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Oregon Democrats went before appropriations subcommittees at both ends of the capital this week to press for approval of budget requests for public works projects in their state.

Sen. Wayne Morse and Marjorie H. Neuberger recommended to the Senate Public Works subcommittee that spending proposed in President Kennedy's budget be increased by about \$8 million.

Similar requests that the budget be adjusted upward to meet the full construction capabilities of the Army Engineers were made in the House by Reps. Edith Green, Robert Duncan and Al Ulman.

Morse, in a prepared statement, urged that a budget request for \$7 million for John Day dam be added to \$71 million because of "long delays that ensued in past years."

He also urged that \$345,000 be added to the budget for the Coos and Millicoma Rivers Project to help provide cheap transportation for logs in the Coos Bay area.

Mrs. Green endorsed a budget request of \$1 million for a project to deepen the Columbia River channel to 40 feet. She noted that the project also had the backing of Rep. Walter Norblad, R-Ore., and Julia Butler Hansen, D-Wash.

She told the committee that Portland's 11th ranking among U.S. ports was threatened because newer vessels had deep drafts and some were not able to load to capacity because of the shallowness of the existing channel.

U.N. Financial Woes Unsolved

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—The Security Council debate on financing a United Nations peace mission to Yemen left the world parliament Wednesday as far away as ever from solving its money problem.

The resolution adopted by the 11-nation council Tuesday sanctions the dispatch of U.N. observers to Yemen, but it skirted the key question of what U.N. body is responsible for arranging financial support for such operations.

A last-minute compromise averted a showdown that might have lit the fuse on the U.N. fiscal crisis. Consequently, the whole problem reverted to private consultations for a formula to meet expenses of future peace-keeping costs.

The Afro-Asian powers, the only non-Communist group still to approve a formula worked under an appeal to complete their negotiations by the 11-nation council General Assembly.

Blamier of the Netherlands, chairman of the assembly's budgetary committee, called off today's meeting and pleaded for an end to all private consultations by Thursday.

The assembly has been meeting in special session for more than four weeks in an attempt to devise means of erasing a \$100 million debt and paying future peace-keeping costs on a basis equitable to all members.

The huge deficit is largely the result of the refusal of the Soviet bloc countries, France, South Africa, Portugal and several other states to pay their shares of the peace-keeping costs in the Congo and the Middle East.

Calvin Christensen, principal of Glide Junior High, stated that 29 eighth grade students were promoted from Deer Creek Grade School and five from Toketoe grade school, all to attend Glide High next year and will make a total of 78 students in the freshman class. He also remarked that only 40 seniors were graduated this year.

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Scotsman's Art Collection Sold

LONDON (UPI)—Free spending bidders paid a world record of nearly \$3 million Tuesday night for a collection of French Impressionist paintings kept out of sight by their reclusive owner during the past 40 years.

Scottish charities will receive the proceeds—after taxes—of the \$2,912,052 auction sales of 47 paintings and one bust from the collection of the late William Cargill, a Scottish oil and shipping magnate.

Cargill, who died last year without heirs, lived as a recluse and permitted no one to see the collection he had put together at bargain prices in the early 1920s.

Solihby's Galleries were jammed for the record auction, which exceeded the previous high total of \$2.2 million for a modern art collection. That price also was paid at Solihby's, for seven Impressionist paintings of the Edwin Goldschmidt collection auctioned in 1958.

"Danceuse Basculant," a pastel ballet scene by Degas, brought the top price of \$294,000. The 26- by-14 inch work had been exhibited only three times since it was painted in about 1875.

Some of the collection's highly touted paintings failed to arouse the expected interest among the chooky bidders. A Cocteau landscape thought capable of bringing \$200,000 sold for \$106,400. A Degas oil of ballet dancers brought \$154,000 instead of the predicted \$280,000.

Sutherlin School Budget Rejection Precipitates Cuts

Because of the recent budget not receiving voter approval the Sutherlin School Board has been called upon to make several decisions to curtail or delay activities of the school district. Without an operating budget authorizing the expenditure of school district funds, the district cannot expend money after the current fiscal year ending on June 30.

Employment Ends
 All non-certificated personnel have been notified that their employment with the school district is terminated as of that date. Consideration will be given those employees if their positions are provided in future budgets according to board action. It was also necessary to suspend the driver education program and the summer band for this summer, according to Supt. Raymond Mendenhall.

The board also ordered a delay in summer maintenance on buildings and grounds and rescheduling pending future developments with the 1963-64 budget. New construction which would have provided classrooms at the high school have also been delayed. Only minimal school supplies are to be purchased to prepare for the opening of school in the fall. The budget has been rejected twice.

Date Moved
 A later opening date for school was directed by the board. School will open on September 9. This will allow some extra time to perform maintenance tasks necessary to operation of the schools normally carried on during the summer vacation.

The resignation of Darl Hunt, high school English instructor, was accepted by the board at its last meeting. Hunt has served as speech instructor, English department head and drama coach in addition to his regular classroom teaching assignments. He indicated that he will work in the Springfield school district this fall.
