Cowboys began arriving in Roseburg today for a rugged weekend of rodeo work, and final plans were being completed for the big North Roseburg Rodeo Parade.

Soviets Offer To Back JFK's Cold War Plea

GENEVA (UPI)—The Soviet Union today promised President Kennedy its "full support and cooperation" in carrying out his appeal of last Monday for an end to the cold war.

But Soviet disarmament negotiator Semyon K. Tsarapkin at the same time said the West must "reconsider its attitude" to Moscow's disarmament proposals.

Tsarapkin's speech to today's 144th disarmament conference session was the first official Soviet reaction to President Kennedy's address at the American University in Washington June 10, United States spokesmen said.

U.S. officials said Tsarapkin's remarks were encouraging but they pointed out the Kremlin apparently demands Western concessions as the price of cooperation.

Despite Tsarapkin's conciliatory words, the Kremlin appeared to be dragging its feet on the proposal for a "hot line" communications link between Washington and Moscow.

U.S. negotiator Charles C. Stelle planned to bring up two other U.S. proposals at today's session of the 17-nation disarmament conference. The proposals call for an exchange of military missions and prior notice by each side of military maneuvers.

American experts refused to become dismayed over the failure of the Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev to give final approval to a "hot line" agreement worked out here by Soviet and American technical teams.

They felt that the recent easing of the Soviet attitude would lead eventually to a discussion of the other U.S. proposals. Like the "hot line," the measures are designed to lessen the risk of war by accident or miscalculation.

Four Small Fires In Forest Stopped

SALEM (UPI)—A 20-acre blaze and three minor fires were battled in Oregon forest lands Thursday, the Forestry Department said.

All four fires were reported out or controlled.

The largest, a 20-acre fire in the Coos Forest District five miles south of Bandon, required the efforts of 28 men, four tankers and two bulldozers before it was controlled.

The other blazes, all small, occurred near The Dalles, Springfield and La Grande.

Local Rodeo Clown Booked For Big Show This Weekend

The heart of a clown lies beneath the mild-mannered and suave exterior of one of the Roseburg area's young stock ranchers. If you met him on the street you would little suspect that he is one of the west's leading fun-provokers on the rodeo circuit from British Columbia to Denver, Colo.

The young man is Karl Doering and he will be this year's official clown at the Douglas County Rodeo. Even his children, Greg, 11, and Harla Kay, 7, find it hard to believe that their dad is the one billed on rodeo programs throughout the west.

Doering, who travels some 30,000 miles a year clowning and suave riding on the circuit, with his wife raises cattle and sheep on a ranch south of Roseburg. His bookings, both as clown and contestant, have in the past 14 years taken him to such major events as the

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Irate Solons Cut Travel Agency Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gift cuff links and bracelets passed out by the U.S. travel service at a cost of \$2.141 to the taxpayers today cost the agency a shattering \$1.6 million.

That was the sum the House Appropriations Committee, peeved and perturbed at the agency's promotional efforts to woo foreign visitors to this country, dropped out of the travel service's proposed new \$4.2 million budget.

The congressmen said it was a heck of a way to spend the taxpayer's money and swung the economy ax to show their indignation.

The lawmakers took the action while cutting \$308 million from a \$2.1 billion appropriation the administration requested to run the State, Justice and Commerce departments and several independent agencies during the fiscal year starting July 1.

The committee wound up approving a \$1.8 billion bill, or 14 per cent less than President Kennedy asked.

The House group also didn't think much of the way the travel service set up six overseas offices. The cost of operating the offices was \$222,382. But the congressmen noted acidly that the agency spent \$192,690 for "planning and supervision" and decorating them.

The committee took a dim view, too, of the State Department's request to add 570 employees to its payroll. All of the new jobs were denied.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), however, batted 100 per cent. The bureau's request for the \$147 million it wanted, including an additional 550 employees.

"Director J. Edgar Hoover personally justifies the request for funds for the FBI and answers the questions concerning the details of the budget," the estimate, the House report said.

"He is accompanied before the committee by two assistants. This is in contrast with some of the other agencies which are represented by a retinue of 20 or more witnesses together with a corridor full of backstoppers."

The committee gave the U.S. Information Agency (USIA) all the money it requested to broadcast to Latin America and Africa by the Voice of America. The agency's over-all budget was cut \$44 million, but this was \$56.7 million more than at present.

Dick Moore, manager of U.S. Plywood Corp.'s Roseburg division, announced Thursday that non-union employees of the U.S. Plywood have been given the same first year pay hike offered to union employees in current negotiations.

Moore said the 44 employees of the veneer plant, located on NW Garden Valley Road, will receive the pay hike beginning July 1.

U.S., a member of the Big 6, is currently being struck in Roseburg by the International Woodworkers of America. Some 350 employees at the firm's main plant are affected by the strike.

Supporters Rally For Macmillan

LONDON (UPI)—Loyal supporters rallied behind Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today against critics clamoring for his resignation because of the Profumo sex scandal.

Apparently having weathered a critical cabinet crisis, the 69-year-old "unflappable Mac" won acknowledged backing from highly respected Lord Hailsham and several other government ministers.

Reports persisted, however, of possible cabinet and rank and file revolts within the ruling Conservative Party as a result of the sex scandal and name-calling that have mushroomed from the resignation of War Minister John Profumo last week. A crisis atmosphere continued in some circles.

Names most prominently mentioned as possible rebels were Health Minister Enoch Powell, 50, and Education Minister Sir Edward Boyle, 39, both of whom have quit government posts in the past over matters of principle.

Neither would confirm nor deny the reports after Thursday's crucial cabinet meeting, the second in two days.

Political observers believed even one cabinet resignation could set off a cabinet revolt that could topple the government.

An indication that Macmillan was more confident than he was earlier in the week was the fact he scheduled no more cabinet meetings prior to Monday's showdown debate with the opposition Labor party in the House of Commons.

Political observers believed further pledges of support for Macmillan would come as party officials sought to close ranks for the Commons collision.

Denounces Profumo
Lord Hailsham, in a television interview Thursday night, furiously denounced Profumo, 48, for his illicit love affair with Christine Keeler, a 21-year-old party girl.

His face bleak with anger, Hailsham rejected any contention the affair was a government crisis and called it one of "national morality."

Another union—the Order of Railroad Conductors and Brakemen—also was reported ready to withdraw from the talks.

The rift was disclosed after leaders of the two unions were not shown during an hour-long television show Wednesday night dealing with the railroad dispute.

Switchmen's President Neil Speirs, told a reporter that he was "fed up" with the five union unity committee and would handle negotiations with the carriers on a separate basis.

Conductors' President Louis J. Wagner said he was "very unhappy" with the coordination of bargaining and his union might pull out of the joint talks, too.

The switchmen, with 10,000 members, and the conductors, with about 20,000, are the smallest unions involved in the dispute. The others are the engineers, firemen and engineers and the trainmen.

Refugees Claim Russia Has Firm Control Of Cuba

MIAMI (UPI)—A group of 107 diplomatic refugees, carrying little clothing but loaded with cigars, arrived from Havana Thursday and reported that Cuba was firmly under Russian control.

"All key positions in the military and the police are in Russian hands," said one of the refugees from the Uruguayan Embassy in Havana.

A second Pan American World Airways flight freeing the diplomatic refugees was scheduled to arrive at Miami International Airport today.

Two more flights are scheduled on Monday and Tuesday of next week.

The new exiles Thursday told of reports they heard while confined in the Havana embassy of a bloody battle four days ago between rebels and militiamen in Cuba's Matanzas Province. They said 45 militiamen and 14 rebels were reported killed, and an unknown number wounded.

They also brought more stories of increased Soviet penetration of the Fidel Castro government.

And although the refugees left most of their possessions in Cuba, they took up their allotted baggage weight for the flight with hand-made Cuban cigars, a rarity in this country since the severing of economic relations with Cuba.

Customs officials would not release any information on the cigars brought in by the refugees, but unofficial estimates put the number at between 40,000 and 50,000 smokes.

The plane carried 74 adults and 33 children. Customs agents said each passenger is allowed 150 cigars duty free, and the duty above the legal limit is about five cents apiece.

Authorities said most of the refugees who brought cigars apparently intended them for personal use or as gifts to relatives or friends in the country. It is illegal now to import Cuban tobacco or cigars for sale.

Crash Kills Pilot
CASCADE LOCKS (UPI)—Two Army National Guardsmen escaped unhurt Thursday when a helicopter crashed 12 miles south of Bonneville Dam.

Capt. Robert Whiting, a Multnomah County deputy sheriff, and Sp. 5 H. Oliver of Hood River, walked out of the rugged area after the mishap.

Pair Circle Earth
Last August the Soviet Union sent two space ships into orbit within a day of each other, and the pair circled the earth at the same time. They kept in radio contact with each other and sent back television transmissions from space.

The official Soviet Tass news agency announced the launching with a statement saying, "the Soviet space ship Vostok 5 has been placed in orbit around the earth today."

The official announcement said Bykovsky reported he survived the blastoff and went into orbit satisfactorily. It added that he "feels well" and said that "all equipment on board is working normally."

Radio Moscow announcers broke into programs to give the Soviet public first word of the successful launching. Programs on Soviet television were interrupted for the news, and Bykovsky's picture was flashed on screens in Moscow.

Speculation Continues Tandem Launching May Place Woman In Orbit

MOSCOW (UPI)—Russia blasted its fifth manned space ship into orbit today on a flight that may be the prelude to the launching of the first space-woman.

Lt. Col. Valery Fedorovich Bykovsky, 28-year-old air force pilot, was hurled into orbit at 3 p.m. (5 a.m. PDT) in the space ship Vostok 5. His flight was believed to be the first step in a "Romanov and Juliet" man-and-woman tandem space marathon.

Bykovsky, described as an athletic type with a young wife and a three-month-old son, "feels fine," Radio Moscow said, in announcing that "all systems are functioning normally."

The official Soviet Tass news agency said without giving details that Bykovsky's mission was to study conditions "of a long flight" in space.

There were unofficial indications the young Russian might be kept up for as long as a record eight days and be joined soon by the world's first space woman—also a Russian.

Attractive And Unmarried
Reports have been circulating for days that the Soviets were on the verge of launching a space woman—said to be an attractive, unmarried girl in her 20's.

According to these unofficial reports, the Soviets were hoping to launch and bring the girl back before the start of an international women's congress in Moscow June 24.

With the blasting of Bykovsky into orbit today, the belief was that a man-and-woman flight in twin space ships was planned.

Pioneering work in twin orbiting was carried out last year by "space twins" Andrean Nikolayev and Pavel Popovich.

Nikolayev went into orbit aboard Vostok 3 on Aug. 11, 1962. A day later, Popovich went up in Vostok 4, and, according to official Soviet accounts, jockeyed to within sight of his comrades in a space spectacular that brought cheers of admiration from all the world.

The two men talked back and forth with one another as they looped around the earth at speeds of 17,500 miles an hour. They came down within moments of one another after marathon flights that broke all space records.

Nikolayev clocked 64 orbits in 94 hours, 22 minutes for an estimated total distance of 1,615,000 miles. Popovich completed 48 orbits in 70 hours, 59 minutes and a space distance of 1,243,000 miles.

It appeared likely the Russians now were preparing to top this with a man and woman space duel.

Yanks Expect Shot
U.S. space officials in Washington lent support to this theory by saying that a second Soviet manned space launch may come within 24 hours. They based their views on belief the Russians have been planning a space rendezvous mission in which two craft would be coupled aloft.

(An alternative guess in Washington was that the Russians were out to set a new record by launching a one-man space flight of about eight days to test life support equipment for a later moon mission.)

Bykovsky issued a statement before his launching in which he credited Soviet space successes and his flight to the "implementation of the historic directives of the Communist party."

"Today, a great honor has befallen me: to continue the work initiated by our Soviet motherland," he said.

He went on to "assure" the Soviet Communist Party Central Committee, the Soviet government and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, "and my dear fellow countrymen, that I shall apply all my efforts and knowledge and abilities in order to carry out honorably this honorable and responsible assignment."

Demonstrations honoring the flight broke out as soon as it was announced in downtown Moscow over loudspeakers.

The launching of a 28-year-old air force pilot aboard, put the Soviet Union one orbital step ahead of the United States in the space race.

The best and latest U.S. effort was the 22.9-orbit flight of Maj. L. Gordon Cooper last month.

Although Lt. Col. Valery Fedorovich Bykovsky was aboard the latest space ship designated as Vostok 5, there was continued speculation that the Soviets might put the first woman into space in a tandem launching later.
