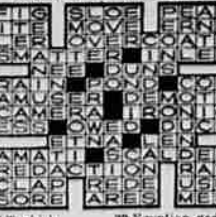

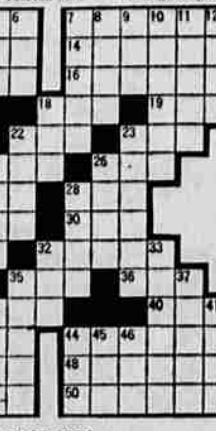

Governor Cancels Many Engagements

SALEM (UPI) — The eye ailment of Mrs. Mark Hatfield, and an "unexplained" event slated next week have resulted in the governor canceling many scheduled engagements, it was announced Thursday.

Hatfield has canceled "a number of social and ceremonial engagements, but none that have to do with the operation of government" for the balance of this week because of Mrs. Hatfield's eye trouble, Press Secretary Travis Cross said.

Cross said Mrs. Hatfield "was much improved and is resting at home." He described Mrs. Hatfield's eye trouble as "the most painful and most sustained," she has had.

Engagements for several days of next week have been canceled "for another reason," Cross said. He would not elaborate.

The governor spoke later Thursday to the State Grand Convention at Oregon City and to the International Circulation Managers Conference in Salem.

He canceled a scheduled address to Girls State delegates this afternoon. House Speaker Clarence Barton replaced him.

Hatfield also has canceled a scheduled appearance at the Lebanon Strawberry Festival parade Friday, and participation in the Grand Floral Parade at Portland Saturday.
