Hearing Tests Set For Pre-Schoolers

The Douglas County Health Department will sponsor a series of hearing tests for children of preschool age (3-5) later this month.

According to Mrs. Glen Miller, children who will be entering the kindergarten or first grade this fall will be given tests at school. If, however, their parents suspect a hearing loss, these children will be tested at the summer clinic so any required treatment may be begun before school starts.

Results of all tests are made available to the parents so they can take the child to their family doctor for treatment. There is no charge for the hearing tests.

Mrs. Miller explained the purpose of this summer testing program is to try and detect hearing losses as soon as possible so they can be corrected before the child enters school. There is no pre-registration required for the hearing tests, which will be given by two audiometrists from the state Board of Health. This is the second year the program for pre-school children has been sponsored by the Douglas County Health Department.

County Represented At Salem Meeting

Dr. James K. Gray, new Douglas County health officer, and the Rev. Harold Robbins of Sutherlin, representing the Douglas County Family Service Clinic, will join other representatives of Oregon's 16 state-aided community mental health clinics in a mental health meeting Friday in Salem.

They will meet with members of their advisory boards and the staff of the Mental Health Division of the State of Oregon. About 100 persons will attend the meeting at which common problems will be discussed, according to John H. Waterman M.D., director of the Community Services Section of the division.

This is the second collective meeting of representatives of the network of community mental health clinics. Unsolved problems in the state's mental health program along with budgetary problems, will be included in the agenda.
