There's a long way to go until season's end but it's clear that Koufax and the award go together like ham and eggs — or like guts and skill.

A little less than a year ago Koufax' career was endangered by a finger ailment. He didn't win a game for the Dodgers over the second half of the 1962 National League season and he went to spring training this season as one of the biggest question marks in major league baseball.

It's taken him just two months to demonstrate that he's shaken off the effects of the ailment and is again one of the great pitchers of baseball.

Westbrooks Handcuffs Invaders With 4-Hitter

Sweet revenge was tasted Thursday night by the Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors and by Ron Westbrooks, classy Myrtle Creek southpaw.

The Roseburg nine, led by Westbrooks' brilliant four-hitter, started off with Bob Manning's third circuit clout of the season in the first inning, and went on to record a 3-0 triumph over the invading Central Point Cheney Studs in a nine-inning affair.

The victory avenged a pair of losses suffered at the start of the season to the same club at Camp White, and leaves Roseburg with a 7-4 record going into tonight's contest at North Bend. Central Point came into the game with a classy 8-1 mark, but went home with its second loss of the young season.

Westbrooks had everything his own way after Manning clobbered his four-bagger in the first inning. Using his sneaky fast ball and a variety of breaking pitches, the young lefty set the Cheney Studs down on four hits, issued two free passes and struck out six.

In a relief role against Central Point early in the season Westbrooks was charged with a 1-0 loss when an unearned run circled the bases on three consecutive errors. The victory Thursday gives Westbrooks a 2-1 record on the mound.

Central Point's Wayne Clay came in for his share of glory as well, going the full nine innings and being tagged for six hits. Clay walk-

ed two and struck out five as he suffered his second loss of the season — the first being on a no-hitter tossed by Klamath Falls' John Benson. Clay has a 2-2 record.

Grabs Lead

Manning became the hero at the plate in the first inning. After Clay had fanned the first two batters, Manning stepped to the plate and picked off the first pitch. The ball sailed high in the air over the fielders outstretched hands, dropping at the foot of the right-center field fence 405 feet from home plate. Manning was on his way to third by the time the outfielder got the ball and the relay to the plate was too late to catch the stocky Roseburg center fielder as he circled the bases.

Roseburg did not manage to score again until the sixth frame. Mike Blomberg led off with a smashing single off the pitcher's right shoulder, then stole second. Manning's grounder to shortstop got Blomberg moving toward third. Manning stole second and on the steal the catcher's throw was to the first base side of the bag, sailing into centerfield. With the centerfielder playing deep, Manning romped home with another tally.

With two away in the eighth inning Tom Morrison singled for the winners. Morrison stole second and Lance Casebeer followed with a line-shot single to left to bring the Riddle star home.

The local crew missed a golden opportunity in the second when a walk and a throwing error on a sacrifice bunt put runners on second and third with no outs. However, Clay settled down and retired three men in a row to get out of the innings.

Visitors Threaten

Cheney Studs also had a few threats — with their first coming in the initial frame as Mike Glines led off with a triple to right field when the sun got in the right field-

er's eyes while he was trying to locate the low liner. An attempted squeeze play went for naught when Lou Alvarez was called out as he ran into the ball after bunting in fair territory. On the interference play Glines was sent back to third. Neal Ellis then went down swinging and Darryl Summerfield fled out to right field.

In the fourth inning a double play on a strikeout and attempted steal ended a possible threat, while luck held with the Lockwood Motors to prevent a run from scoring in the fifth. Dave Twedell was safe on an error to lead off the fifth and was sacrificed to second by Bob Corlies. Bob Stroth then laid down a bunt which he had beat at first and the throw was wild which would have allowed Twedell to score.

When the dust settled Twedell had been sent back to second and Stroth was called out for stepping on the plate as he bunted the ball.

Each of the final innings, from the fifth on, saw the lead-off batter get on base for the invaders, but each time Westbrooks took over and retired the side. Central Point never managed to have more than one runner on base at a time during the entire nine-innings.

Tonight Lockwood Motors will put its three game win streak on the line at North Bend against Tower Motors — the team that handed the local crew its last loss. Because of a change in plans in the pitching of Thursday's game, Darrell Cellers has been named by coach Bill Harper to start on the mound tonight. Game time is 7:30.

Sunday Roseburg will be back before the home fans in a 6 p.m. doubleheader against Marshfield. The next league counters will be Wednesday at North Eugene.

Favored USC Spikers Capture First Event To Take NCAA Lead

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI)— Southern California, which has won 21 of the 41 previous NCAA track and field championships, rolled along a solid favorite to do it to make the controversial 42nd collegiate cinder carnival another Trojan conquest.

The Trojans won the only final event on the first night of the three-night show at the University of New Mexico, and qualified a dozen athletes in seven of the nine events in which qualifying trials were held Thursday night.

Julio Marin got Southern Cal away on a winning pace when he whipped a bulky field in the NCAA's first-ever six-mile run in 30:32.9 to give USC 10 big points in its bid to unseat Oregon as the NCAA champ.

Three other finals are scheduled today and tonight, including the broad jump in which Clifton Mayfield of Central (Ohio) State college equaled the NCAA meet record in the preliminaries with a wind-aided leap of 26 feet 7 inches. The other finals are the hammer throw and the three-mile run.

Mayfield is one of the principals in the eligibility drama which has engulfed this meet as the result of alleged violations by 11 small colleges in bypassing last week's NCAA College Division meet at Chicago.
