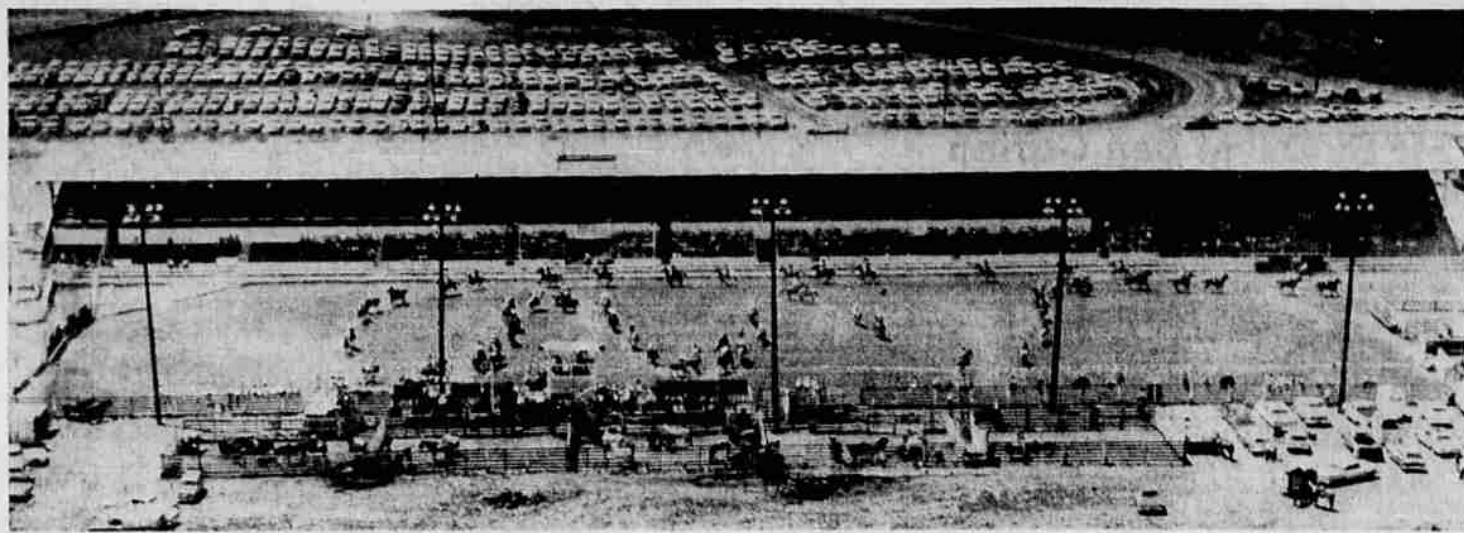

Radio Says Cosmonette, Fifth Soviet Spaceman Are Both In Top Shape

The Roseburg Sister City Committee today began calling for assistance in selecting a country from which the city's sister city will be selected.

On page 3 of today's News-Review, a coupon appears which will serve as a ballot for anyone interested to vote on the country he thinks the sister city should be chosen.

The five Latin American countries from which the choice must be made are Chile, Argentina, Brazil, Mexico and Uruguay.

From the ballots returned, three will be selected as winners of free airplane or helicopter ride and two airplane rides will be awarded "so these people can see their city from the air," Serafin said. The prizes are transferable, he reported.

Voting is not limited to people within the city limits. Anyone in the Roseburg area may take part in voting.

Serafin said the Sister City Committee will decide next week on the country on the basis of the voting response.

MOSCOW (UPI) — Valentina Tereshkova, the first space woman, flew within three miles of cosmonaut Lt. Col. Valery F. Bykovsky Sunday during her first orbit, the Soviets said today.

Tass news agency said Soviet scientists determined the near-rendezvous after receiving "more precise data about the trajectory of the flight" than had been available at first.

This was a mile closer than the two crafts piloted by the first Soviet space twins had come to each other.

The world's first cosmonette, a dimpled bachelorette who wore lipstick into space, and Russia's fifth cosmonaut, whirled confidently in their twin orbits, refreshed after a night's sleep.

Although the two craft came to within three miles of one another, there apparently will be no cosmic boy-meets-girl linkup of the space craft during the current flights.

Moscow radio said both were in "top shape."

While there has been speculation that the 28-year-old Miss Tereshkova and 26-year-old Bykovsky might try a link-up of their vehicles in space, an authoritative source said the twin flights now did not call for a rendezvous.

Miss Tereshkova, a brown-haired parachutist who insisted on wearing make-up on her historic mission, was fired into orbit Sunday aboard the Vostok VI and passed in "direct vicinity" of Bykovsky's Vostok V, which was launched Friday.

Both Valentina and Bykovsky said they were a "close distance" from each other. But they gave no indication whether they were within sight or as close as the four miles that at one point separated Nikolayev and Popovich.

Miss Tereshkova's spacecraft was flying at 17,400 miles an hour, taking her round the earth once every 85 minutes.

Moscow Radio said Miss Tereshkova's orbit carried her 144.8 miles from the earth at its highest point and 113.7 miles at its lowest at an angle of about 65 degrees to the Equator.

Farther Into Space

This made her voyage about two-thirds of a mile farther into space, and two-thirds of a mile closer to the earth than Bykovsky's.

Lack of information could mean the launches, highly complex procedures, did not have the accuracy of those in which Nikolayev and Popovich were placed in twin orbits, observers said.

The official government newspaper Izvestia and the official Communist party newspaper Pravda both were filled today with extensive accounts of the launching of Vostok VI with the cosmonette aboard.

Bykovsky may be headed toward a possible eight-day flight. He already has taken dead-end last on Nikolayev's 64-orbit stint August.

But the big news was the cosmonette, whose name goes down in history with those of other fabulous women pioneers.

Youth Killed In Viet Nam Religion Riot

SAIGON, Viet Nam (UPI)—One youth was killed and 100 persons injured Sunday during a religious riot in which police used truncheons, teargas and pistols to disperse more than 400 Buddhist students.

The riot broke out when 10,000 Buddhist men and women gathered for the funeral of a Buddhist priest who burned himself to death to protest alleged discrimination by Roman Catholic President Ngo Dinh Diem against the country's Buddhist majority.

The riot occurred only a few hours after Diem signed a peace agreement worked out with Buddhist leaders during several days of negotiations.

The crowd of Buddhists gathered near the Giac Minh pagoda to join the funeral procession for Thich Quang Duc, the priest who made himself a human torch on a crowded street last week.

Fighting started when a group of more than 400 youths began throwing shoes, sandals, rocks and bricks at the police.

Police retaliated by throwing teargas grenades into the crowd, then charging the youths with truncheons and shields. The police also drew their pistols and appeared to fire over the heads of the mob.

One youth was shot in the head and died later at a hospital. Another was wounded in the leg.

About 50 other demonstrators were injured, including two Buddhist priests. Police sources said a similar number of policemen were hurt, including 38 with serious injuries.

The battle raged more than an hour before police were able to restore order and arrest about 130 rioters.

The peace agreement signed earlier in the day said the government would release jailed Buddhist priests and permit the Buddhists to fly their flag and spread their faith without fear of harassment.

Court Says Lord's Prayer In Schools Unconstitutional

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court ruled today that use of the Lord's Prayer and Bible reading as devotional opening exercises in public schools is unconstitutional.

The court's opinion was delivered by Justice Tom C. Clark. The vote was 8 to 1 with Justice Potter Stewart dissenting.

Clark declared: "The place of religion in our society is an exalted one, achieved through a long tradition of reliance on the home, the church and the inviolable citadel of the individual heart and mind.

"We have come to recognize through bitter experience that it is not within the power of government to invade the citadel, whether its purpose or effect be to aid or oppose, to advance or retard."

"In the relationship between man and religion, the state is committed to a position of neutrality," the long-awaited opinion concluded.

Clark said this neutrality is "clearly and concisely stated in the words of the First Amendment."

Amendment Quoted

The First Amendment says, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." The same prohibition is applied to the states by the 14th Amendment under previous Supreme Court decision.

The court cited both amendments last year in ruling out use in New York schools of a 22-word non-denominational state-written prayer.

That opinion also was 8 to 1 with Stewart dissenting.

The Lord's Prayer case was brought by a Baltimore mother Mrs. Madalyn E. Murray, and her son, William J. Murray III, both atheists. They challenged a 1963 rule of the board of school commissioners requiring reading the Bible and recitation of the Lord's Prayer without comment every morning.

The Maryland Court of Appeals upheld the practice on April 6, 1962, by a 4 to 3 vote.

Colonial Custom

The Pennsylvania case was initiated by a Unitarian couple, Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Schenck, who have two children in Abington High School. A 1913 state law requires that 10 verses of the Bible be read without comment at the opening of each school day—a practice dating back to colonial times.

The program is carried on by means of a loudspeaker by the students in the school's television workshop. The court was told that the school buys the King James version of the Bible but that the pupils normally read their own revised version, Douay and others.

According to custom, the Lord's Prayer follows, although the law does not mention it.

A special three-judge federal court in Philadelphia ruled the exercises unconstitutional on Feb. 1, 1962, as a violation of the First Amendment.

Stewart, in a blistering dissent, accused his colleagues of trampling on the First Amendment's guarantee of religious freedom while pursuing an extreme view.

Chemicals Explode In Roseburg Home

Chemicals stored in a metal cabinet exploded Sunday at 2:02 a.m. in the home of J. T. Piel, 1456 NW Almiria St., with fumes and odor.

The Roseburg Rural Fire Department was called into action following the explosion, and spent two hours pumping the fumes out of the house. No damage was listed.

The explosion allegedly was the result of an amateur chemist's materials being stored too close together setting off a chemical reaction.

Sunday afternoon a small grass fire occurred at 1810 NE Stephens. The cause of the fire was listed as a non-permit fire in a barrel placed near high grass. Paper from the trash barrel flew out and set the surrounding grass on fire. No damage was reported.

Saturday at 7:20 p.m. the Rural Fire Department was called into action to extinguish a small fire in a garage at the home of Norman Totton, 1739 NE Sunset Lane. The fire was reportedly caused when a light extension cord to a freezer in the garage overheated and set the wall ablaze. Damage was listed at \$15.

Firemen warned that with warmer weather freezers and refrigerators should be moved away from walls to prevent overheating.

Five Persons Die In Oregon Traffic

Five persons lost their lives in traffic accidents in Oregon during the weekend.

Richard Anderson, 19, Dallas, Ore., and Sherrie Wendell, 16, Salem, were killed Sunday afternoon when their car collided head-on with a truck on State Highway 22 about 15 miles west of Salem.

Arthur McAllister, 67, Grand Ronde, the driver of the truck, was taken to a Dallas hospital with minor injuries.

Ernest Norris, 66, and Roy Stewart, 55, both of Eugene, were killed late Saturday night in a one-car accident on U.S. Highway 99 10 miles south of Albany. Norris was deputy director of civil defense in Lane County. Stewart was the commander of the American Legion post in Eugene.

Cheryl Lewis, 17, Redmond, died in a flaming one-car crash on U.S. Highway 126 about 10 miles east of Redmond late Saturday night.

No New Progress Reported In Strike

PORTLAND (UPI) — Federal mediators reported no progress toward ending the Northwest lumber strike today, although there were no indications it would spread beyond the 19,000 workers now idled.

Mediator George Walker said he had made no progress toward bringing the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) or the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) together with representatives of the "Big Six" of the Northwest wood products industry. The unions are on strike against St. Regis Paper Co. and U.S. Plywood Corp., and are locked out at Weyerhaeuser, International Paper, Rayonier and Crown Zellerbach. Both unions have filed charges of unfair labor practices.

A judge in Montana Saturday issued a temporary injunction forbidding a strike by LSW locals against St. Regis plants at Libby and Troy, Mont. It will be in effect at least until a hearing is held Thursday.

Walker said the LSW has bargaining sessions scheduled with two large independent firms, Simpson Timber Co. and Georgia Pacific Corp., here Wednesday and Thursday. The IWA is scheduled to meet June 24 with Georgia Pacific and the next day with Simpson.

A meeting between the IWA and Simpson last week ended with both sides saying they were "hopeful" a settlement could be reached.

Canadian Boy Is New Local Rodeo Champ

Canadian champion Ellie Lewis rode his way to the top spot of the 19th annual Douglas County Rodeo last weekend by staying astride four rugged bucking horses to capture both the bareback and saddle bronc riding contests.

Lewis, from Okanogan Falls, B.C., picked up \$252 first prize money in the saddle bronc contest and added \$246 in the bareback bronc riding competition for \$498 in prize money over the two-day rodeo.

Red-haired Gene Miles from Eugene, a long-time favorite of rodeo fans in Douglas County, picked off top prize money of \$311 in the steer wrestling contest with a total time of 19.4 seconds for two days.

Another Eugene cowboy who has long been a favorite in this area, Louie Touricellas, turned in the best time in the event of bulldogging his steer Saturday night in 7.1 seconds. Miles' 7.5 Sunday was the best time in the second go-around.

A pair of Douglas County cowboys, Tod Tougnet from Roseburg and Rich Vredenburg from Myrtle Creek, won the team calf roping contest. They collected \$116 each in prize money for winning the Saturday night event and the best average time for the title, as well as coming in second in Sunday's action.

The bull riding championship also went to an Oregon cowboy, as Bill Stanton of Sisters, rode Banana Horns the full eight seconds and received a rating of 84 points from the judges Saturday night. Stanton won \$336 in prize money.

The calf roping contest title went to Jim Perry, of Bow, Wash., who recorded a total time of 23.8 seconds for the two performances. Perry picked up \$76.70 for second place Saturday night and came back to win \$102.26 for tops Sunday and an equal amount for the best average.

A Philomath cowgirl, Kay Wigle, won the woman's barrel race both days to capture \$24.66 in each running and an equal amount for the championship. She won Saturday night in 18.3 seconds and Sunday in 18.6. Shirley Zeigler of Myrtle Creek placed third Saturday night with a 19.1 and third in the overall event with 38.7 to pick up \$24.66.

The wild cow milking title went to Knox Blasingame, who turned in the best time in the event Sunday. Tom Finlay finished second. On Saturday night, Don Knight won the event and Leonard Breck came in second. Winner each day collected \$20.

Rodeo queen Trudy Easeltrom won the powder puff derby Saturday night, with Shirley Zeigler second and Toni Wright third. Lorna Miller won the event Sunday afternoon, with Miss Zeigler once again finishing second.

Lee Re-Elected By Mill Union

Norman Lee was re-elected business agent of the Lumber & Sawmill Workers Union Local No. 2949 in Roseburg at a general membership election Saturday.

Neal Meyer, who works at the Roseburg Lumber Co. sawmill division, was re-elected president.

Both the LSW and the International Woodworkers of America report no new activities locally on the strike situation, which to date affects only one mill in the Roseburg area.

Sutherlin School Budget Vote Set

Following two open meetings with Sutherlin taxpayers and after considerable discussion, a third edition of the 1963-64 school budget was set by the budget committee.

It calls for the same expenditure, \$759,383, that had been called for in the second budget defeated on May 29th. However, the budget committee did include \$300 additional to cover the cost of the next election.

A public hearing was set for July 8 with the voting to follow on July 16, correspondent Mrs. Jerry DeMuth reports.

Hoover's Condition Still Very Serious

NEW YORK (UPI) — A team of doctors and nurses continued a round-the-clock watch today on former President Herbert Hoover who was reported still in "very serious" condition suffering from anemia.

It was revealed Friday that Hoover, 88, was suffering from anemia and was bleeding from the gastro-intestinal tract.

The last medical bulletin on his condition issued Sunday by the three doctors treating him said that while Hoover remained in very serious condition, he "is in no pain and resting quietly."

The doctors said there had been "no evidence" of further intestinal bleeding within the 36-hour period preceding the bulletin but that Hoover's heart action was "somewhat irregular," and he had a low-grade fever.

The medical team did not say when the next bulletin would be issued.

It gave no indication that Hoover's present trouble was related to an operation he underwent last August for removal of a cancerous tumor. He is being treated at his Waldorf Towers suite.

Pope's Funeral Rites End Today

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Nine days of funeral services for Pope John XXIII ended today with a solemn Mass in St. Peter's Basilica attended by churchmen and politicians from all over the world.

Seventy-two cardinals were present for the services presided over by Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, of the Sacred College. On Wednesday, the cardinals will begin the conclave to elect the successor to Pope John, who died June 3 at the age of 81.

For the Mass, representatives of 85 governments and international organizations gathered beside the redraped catafalque lit by 88 candles and topped by the jeweled papal crown.

After the services, the cardinals moved to the consistorial hall where they received the government delegations one by one, including U.S. representatives headed by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson.

There was no official representative of the Soviet government, but a two-man delegation represented the Russian Orthodox Church.

Portland Firm Gets Interest In Hotels

The AMC Corporation of Portland, through foreclosure of a trust deed, has acquired the interest of the Senior Citizens Land and Development Co. in the Grand Hotel and Rose Hotel in Roseburg. This action does not affect the interests of other persons having an interest in the property, AMC officials said.

The Rose Hotel will continue to operate as it has in the past few months, under the management of Cliff Thornton, executor of the will of the late Mazie E. Smith.

World's Women Lead Tributes To Cosmonette

LONDON (UPI) — Women around the world led the salutes today to their new champion — Russia's Valentina Tereshkova, the first female in space.

Queen Elizabeth of Britain sent a message to Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev conveying her "very warm congratulations" to the pioneer cosmonette.

In Amsterdam, Fanny Blakers-Koen, the gold medal-winning "flying housewife" of the 1948 Olympics, said:

"Women can do great things just as well as men. That is nothing new. Of course, space was a man's domain up to now and therefore it seems wonderful that I admire that Russian girl. I think she is great."

In Frankfurt, Germany, seamstress Emma Groth, 62, said "Valentina has shown that women can do anything a man can do. She has proven that we women also have the stuff of courage."

In Copenhagen, television weather girl Anne Jerichou said she welcomed the cosmonette's feat after the London scandal over Christine Keeler.

"It looks as if Valentina is going to be the woman face-saver after the recent adventures of a more down-to-earth female," she said.

Newspapers throughout Europe hailed the Soviet feat of placing a woman in orbit along with male cosmonaut Lt. Col. Valery F. Bykovsky, 28.

"To the millions of underprivileged women of the world, she is a soaring symbol of feminine emancipation," said London Daily Express writer Chapman Pincher.
