

Palmer Records Sudden Death Victory In Thunderbird Classic

RYE, N. Y. (UPI) — Arnold Palmer today called his victory in the \$100,000 Thunderbird Open "a \$25,000 worth of mistakes which will help me win the Open."

Golf's Golden Boy definitely became the man to beat for the big one at Brookline, Mass., this week, when he staged another of

his miracle finishes to win the first place money Sunday in a sudden death playoff with veteran Paul Harney.

It marked his return to tournament golf after a month's layoff and the way he came back expelled all doubts that his days as one of golf's greats were over because he had too many business interests occupying his time.

"This tournament did me a world of good, although I did not play as well as I wish I had," said Palmer, whose first place money put him into second place among the year's money winners. He now has won a total of \$58,545 — only \$2,000 behind Jack Nicklaus, the defending U. S. Open champion, who won only \$1,075 in the Thunderbird, finishing seven strokes behind Palmer.

Palmer's Outcome Doubtful

For a time on a sunny Sunday which drew a gallery of more than 15,000 persons to the Westchester Country Club it looked like Palmer — a front runner all the way — was going to blow his return to the golfing wars.

But in the end victory went to Palmer — at his best when the chips really were down. The 518-yard par five 18th provided the drama of the day.

With the crowd getting out of control, Harney drove to the edge of a trap while Palmer was down in the middle.

Harney's second shot was 120 yards short of the green while Palmer's second barely cleared a trap. Harney hit his approach to within six feet of the pin.

When Harney missed his putt, it looked like Palmer had it won. But the pressure even told on this iron man of the fairways and he,

too, blew his putt.

So they went to the first extra hole — a par three, 190-yarder. Harney won the flip of the coin, teed off first and sent his four iron shot over the green. Palmer's four iron tee shot was dead to the pin and stopped 10 feet short. Harney chipped to within five feet of the cup.

Palmer then putted to within four feet and when Harney missed the five footer, he tapped his putt in for the \$25,000 jackpot and his 10th victory in the 13th playoffs he has been in.

Heart-Breaking Loss

For Harney, it was a heart-breaking loss — \$15,000 worth. For second place was worth only \$10,000.

Palmer carded a final round two-over-par 72 for a total of 277 while Harney carded a 69 for the same aggregate.

Defending champion Gene Littler finished third at 278 with Dow Finsterwald and Bill Collins tied for fourth with 279's. Then came PGA champion Gary Player and Tom Nieporte at 281 while Jay Hebert, Bobby Nichols and Joe Campbell tied at 281.

Big George Bayer, Canadian Al Balding, Jacky Cupit and Gardiner Dickinson were next in line at 282 while Jackie Burke, Miller Barber, Dan Sikes, Jack Fleck, Gay Brewer and Billy Farrell were at 283.

Nicklaus was at 284 along with Tommy Jacobs, Bill Eggers and Mason Rudolph.

Ben Hogan, who returned to the golfing wars after 13 months, beat his old rival, Sam Snead, by one shot. Hogan finished with a 70 for 285 and Snead a 73 for 286. Tony Lama, one of the favorites was far back at 290.

Bevos Edge Tacoma In PCL Doubleheader, 4-3, And 9-6

About a dozen former major leagueers sent down to the Pacific Coast League this season are showing their bosses in a hurry that they want return tickets to the steak and salad circuit.

All of them played a big hand Sunday in helping their respective teams achieve victory. They are pitcher Dave Thies and outfielders Manny Jimenez and Jose Tabataba of Portland; hurlers Ted Wills and Dave Sisler and infielder Gene Freese of San Diego; Seattle pitcher Hal Klotstad; pitcher Jim Constable of Tacoma; southpaw George Brunet of Oklahoma City.

Also outfielder Bob Will of Salt Lake City and pitchers Bob Duhla and Fred Newman and infielders Ken Hunt and Tom Satriano of Hawaii.

Wills (6-4), formerly of the Boston Red Sox and Cincinnati Reds, hurled a nine-inning two-hitter in blanking Dallas-Ft. Worth 6-0. Relief pitching by former Cincinnati and Red Sox hurler Sisler helped the Padres edge the Rangers 6-5 in the first game.

Portland beat Spokane twice, 4-3 and 9-6, on the strength of Thies' pitching in the opener and a three-run homer by Jimenez in the nightcap. Tacoma's Constable shut out Seattle 1-0 on four hits in the seven-inning finale after Klotstad, late of the Red Sox, scattered five hits to win the opener for Seattle 4-3.

Will, starting his first game for Salt Lake after being sent down by the Chicago Cubs in exchange for Ellis Burton, bashed a two-run homer in leading the Bees to a 12-9 win over Denver.

Home runs by Satriano, Hunt and Carlos Bernier carried the parent Los Angeles Angels.

Brunet allowed Hawaii only four singles, three by Bernier who ran his consecutive game hitting streak to 14, in blanking the Islanders 8-0 in the second game.

It was the second shutout of the season for Brunet (4-2) who pitched for the Houston Colts last year.

Weather Hampered Fishing On Coast

Cool Spins No-No Win In Nightcap As Roseburg 9 Runs Wild, 17-0

Ran Cool was credited with the first no-hitter of the season for the Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors Sunday as he blanked the invading Al Pierce Lumber Co. team of Marshfield in the second game of a twin-bill at Legion Field.

Cool's performance came just after Dick Williams had been robbed of a no-hitter in the seven-inning opener.

The local crew downed the invading coastal nine in both ends of the double bill by scores of 7-6 and 17-0 to raise Roseburg's record for the season to 10-4.

Cool lacked the razor sharp edge he has had in previous appearances as he walked four batters over the five inning route, including the bases full in the second inning. Still the talented Drain southpaw struck out 11 to raise his total for the season to 55 in 24 innings.

In the opener Williams had a no-hitter going until the seventh inning when pinch-hitter Rowan Gould was credited with a scratch single. Though he gave up only two infield singles, Williams was charged with six runs as he walked four and had some shaky fielding backing him. Williams struck out seven, coming through with his seventh as he fanned Roger Gould to end the game with the tying run parked on third.

Roseburg picked up four runs in the first inning of the opener to grab an early lead. Mike Blomberg walked and went to third when a fielder's choice on Bob Manning's grounder went astray. Jim Beamer followed with a single to drive in Blomberg and Manning, and Tom Morrison put Lockwood Motors ahead 4-0 with a blazing inside-the-park homer.

In the fifth Blomberg led off with a walk, stole second, went to third on Beamer's single and scored on Morrison's fly to center.

Winning Run

The winning run scored in the sixth as Dave Sevall led off with a triple to right and Jerry Boucock followed with a scratch single. Boucock was sacrificed to second and scored on a throwing error at first base.

Marshfield put together a walk,

an error, a wild pitch and two ground outs for two runs in the fifth, then threatened the lead held by Roseburg in the seventh.

With one away Zane Hoffman walked and Rowan Gould ruined Williams no-hitter when Lance Casebeer pulled a mental error at second. On an easy ground ball Casebeer broke to cover second base, leaving no one to field the ball until too late. With two outs a pair of walks, a throwing error and a scratch single off the third baseman's glove by Terry Falls drove in the fourth run and put the tying run on third before Williams settled down to strike out Roger Gould.

In the second contest the Lockwood Motors crew scored six unearned runs in the first inning without the aid of a base hit, then romped on to the easy win. The big first inning came on three walks and five errors committed by the Al Pierce Lumber Co. team.

Roseburg continued on the rampage in the second frame, racking up five runs on six hits and a walk which did not figure in the scoring. Cool helped his own cause with a two-run triple in the upturning, while Mike Blomberg's dou-

ble started the rally. Other hits were singles by Beamer, Bob Kinyon, Don Evans and Ron Westbrook.

Six more runs crossed the plate in the fourth on four hits, one walk and two Marshfield miscues. The big blow was a three-run inside-the-park home run by Kinyon. Beamer and Williams led the winners at the plate in the first game with 2-3 and 2-2 records, while Blomberg and Westbrook were each 2-2 in the nightcap. Kinyon also collected two hits, going 2-3.

Roseburg will return to Douglas Lane League action Wednesday, traveling to North Eugene for a pair of seven inning games against Lockwood Motors is boasting a 2-0 league record to date

Ducks Dethroned By Strong USC Spikers

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI)—The 42nd annual NCAA track and field championships, won by Southern California for the 22nd time, had its heroes in USC's Julio Marin and Rex Cawley and Stanford's Larry Questad. But, it also had its disappointments.

Marin and Cawley provided rookie coach Vern Wolfe's USC Trojans 42 of the 61 points that won the team title going away and Questad provided Stanford a surprising 18 of the 42 points the Palo Alto, Calif., Indians made in nosing out dethroned Oregon for second place.

Two of the biggest disappointments, oddly enough, were in the USC camp where Larry Stuart, who owned the year's best javelin throw, failed to qualify for the finals, and Kevin Hogan, touted as a sure point-getter in the 880-yard dash, also flunked his first trial test.

But, as it turned out the Trojans didn't miss those lost points a bit as Marin became the darling of the meet by winning the 6-mile in 30:32.9, the 3-mile in 14:24.9 and finishing fourth in the 3,000-meter steeplechase. Cawley ran on fortitude to win the 440-yard hurdles in 48.8 seconds and push Uli Williams of Arizona State to the tape in a 45.8 quarter-mile dash.

Another disappointment — especially to hopeful Oregon — was

a first night injury to Mel Renfro that could have cost the Webfoots anywhere from 16 to 20 points since he owned the second best broad jump and high hurdles times in the nation.

Questad had a hand in contributing to another disappointment as he boosted his own stock by turning in a stunning defeat of Arizona State's Henry Carr in the 100-yard dash in 9.7 seconds — an event in which Carr has a 9.3 pending world mark.

Oregon's defending champion Ducks collected third place and the Oregon State Beavers gained sixth in the NCAA track and field championships which ended here Saturday night.

The Ducks, failing to get any

contribution from big guns Mel Renfro and Keith Forman, accounted for 41 points. The Beavers picked up 29. Southern California won with 61 and Stanford was second with 42.

Oregon State's Norm Hoffman and Morgan Groth took individual championships. Hoffman won the 880-yard run in 1:48.0 and Groth, a sophomore, captured the mile in 4:05.3. Tom O'Hara of Loyola of Chicago finished first in the mile but was disqualified for cutting to the post too soon.

For Oregon, the top point getters on the final day of the three-day competition were Dave Steen with a second place in the shot put, Mike Lehner with a second in the 3,000-meter steeplechase and Paul Stuber with a third in the high jump.

Steen, who went 61-11 1/4 in Friday night's qualifying round, lost out to Gary Gubner of New York University in the finals when Gubner went 62.5 on his final put.

Lehner came in with a 9:10.8 clocking behind Villanova's Victor Zwolak, who recorded 9:10.1.

Stuber jumped 6-9 1/4 for his finish. Teammate Terry Llewellyn collected sixth with 6-8 1/4.

Oregon's other points came from John Burns, fifth in the javelin at 242-10 1/2; Bob Watson, fifth in the pole vault at 15-9 1/2; Archie San Romani, fifth in the mile in 4:06.7; Dave Bluff, sixth in the 100-yard dash in 9.8, and Clayton Steinke, sixth in the steeplechase in 9:44.2. Watson's mark was a Canadian and University of Oregon record.

Vic Reed, of the Ducks took second in the three-mile run Friday night and Steinke was fifth in the six-mile run Thursday night.

For Oregon State, Gary Stenlund finished second in the javelin in 253-4 and Tom Wyatt came in sixth in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles in 31.0.

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Cassius 'Muzzled' By Manager Prior To Battle With Cooper

LONDON (UPI)—Cassius Marcellus Clay was "muzzled" today as he restlessly awaited Tuesday night's rich world heavyweight challengers' fight with Henry Cooper of England at suburban Wembley's open air Empire Stadium.

Manager Bill Faversham of Louisville, Ky., had told Clay: "No more statements to anyone until after the fight."

Big Bill explained: "Cassius already has done a tremendous job of talking this fight into a sellout. And we want him to relax now until the weigh-in tomorrow."

Their expected weights are Clay 198 pounds; Cooper, 189.

Largely through the "Louisville Lip" salesmanship in glorifying himself and belittling British Empire champion Cooper, the 10-rounder will be a sellout of about 55,000 fans and \$448,000, promoter Jack Solomons was able to announce today.

That gate will be the largest for any fight ever staged anywhere outside the United States, although the crowd will not be the biggest.

Meanwhile today from America arrived at least three men who are interested in contracting for Tuesday's winner to engage in what might be a \$10,000,000 September world title fight with the winner of the July 22 title fight between world champion Sonny Liston and ex-champion Floyd Patterson at Las Vegas, Nev.

The three men were Jack Nilon, advisor to champion Liston; matchmaker Teddy Brenner of New York's Madison Square Gar-

den Corporation, which is ready to re-enter big-time outdoor competition, and Frederic H. Brooks of New York, president of Sportsvision, Inc., which wants the closed-circuit television rights to the mammoth September extravaganza.
