## Metro Squad Triumphs In Prep All-Star Series

EUGENE (UPI)—The Metropolitan and State all-stars depicted a doubleheader Sunday to end their annual three-game high school baseball series. The split gave the Metropolitan team the series 2-1. The Metro won the nightcap 2-0 behind the one-hit pitching of Frank Lohch of Central Catholic after the Staters captured the opener 1-0 on the three-hit hurling of Butch O'Brien of Frairie City and John Conrad of Bandon. The seven-inning games were watched by 472 persons at Bethel Park. Rick Wise of Madison struck out 22 and gave up only six hits in nine innings as the Metro opened the series with a 8-0 victory Saturday night. The Metro's Leroy Pittman of Washington and Wise were named the most valuable player and the most valuable pitcher, respectively.

Lowe repeated as the mens single champ as he easily rolled to the victory. In the semifinals Lowe bested Howard Sohn handily by 6-0 and 6-1 scores, then handled Don Bodeen in the finals, 6-1 and 6-2. Bodeen had edged Doug Green in a semifinal thriller by scores of 7-5 and 6-4.

Lowe and Green teamed up to win the mens doubles by overpowering Howard Sohn and Tom Garrison, 6-3 and 6-4. Miss Sevall rolled to the championship in the womens singles, topping Shirley Stier, 6-4 and 6-2, in the finals. Miss LeBeau captured the junior girls open division crown with a rapid 6-1 and 8-0 victory over Martha Hetrick.

In the womens doubles Miss Sevall and Miss LeBeau teamed up to down their opponents 6-2 and 9-7 after losing the first set by a 6-4 count. The victory gave each two first place trophies for the tourney.

Tommy Hill provided the thrills for the fans in the boys 12-and-under singles. Hill outlasted Jim Sevall, 6-4, 4-6, 6-4, in Saturday's semifinals, then came on strong to dump Eddie Ohman in the championship three-setter by scores of 6-3 and 6-4 after Ohman had opened with a 7-5 victory.

Competition in the boys 12-and-under bracket highlighted the tournament as each of the 10 entrants showed future promise, and each played hard to win.

In other divisions, Brian Phillips won the boys open division; Tom McKee captured the trophy in the junior boys novice class; Tom Gardiner exhibited top form in winning the boys novice category; and Patty Neve won the first place trophy in the girls novice division.

The first and second place winners in eight divisions of junior competition qualified for the Oregon Jaycee Tennis Tournament which will be held at the Stewart Park courts in Roseburg on June 29-30.

# Yanks, White Sox Win To Keep AL Race Tight

Pitching still is "the name of the game" and the Chicago White Sox firm of Johnny Buzhardt, Juan Pizarro and Jim Brosnan is more than proving the case to American League rivals. Buzhardt, who leads the AL pitching staff by earned run average of 1.99, spun a four-hitter at the Kansas City Athletics Sunday and partners Pizarro and Brosnan combined on an eight-hitter in the nightcap to give the White Sox 2-1 and 3-2 decisions and a virtual tie with the New York Yankees for the league lead. For Buzhardt, who had an 8-12 won-lost record with the White Sox in 1962, it was his eighth win of the season against only two losses. It also marked the fourth straight complete game for the former Chicago Cub and Philadelphia Phillie who never before has won more than eight games in any one season in the majors. Pizarro, a 14-game winner for the White Sox a year ago, picked up victory No. 7, but he needed help from Brosnan, the transplanted "author" from Cincinnati, who got the final five outs. Before he left, though, Pizarro had fanned eight batters to run his strikeout total to 81. The Yankees stayed nine per-

centage points ahead of the White Sox by defeating the Detroit Tigers twice, 4-0 on Ralph Terry's three-hitter and 6-3 behind Bill Stafford and Hal Reniff before a crowd of 44,357 at Yankee Stadium, the largest of the season in the American League. The Cleveland Indians, Los Angeles Angels and Boston Red Sox also scored doubleheader wins. The Indians shaded the Washington Senators, 4-2 and 6-4; the Red Sox routed the Baltimore Orioles, 8-1 and 12-5; and the Angels beat the Twins, 3-3 and 5-4. In the National League, the Cincinnati Reds swept the New York Mets, 11-5 and 10-3; Houston and San Francisco split, the Colts taking the nightcap, 3-0 and the Giants the opener, 4-3; the Chicago Cubs downed the Los Angeles Dodgers, 8-3, then lost, 2-0; the Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Cards divided, Pittsburgh winning the first in 12 innings, 4-3, and St. Louis the second, 11-7, and Milwaukee beat Philadelphia, 5-3, before dropping the nightcap, 7-4 in 11 innings.

## Reds Moving In NL Race, Win Two

It took an old fashioned tongue lashing and a traditional club one-two pitching punch to snap the Cincinnati Reds out of their lethargy.

Manager Freddie Hutchinson provided the lecture and pitchers Jim Maloney and Jim O'Toole was considered about as low as a club could sink.

Maloney got off poorly in the opener, giving up all five New York runs in the first three in-

nings, but he settled down after that and was touched for two harmless singles the rest of the way in notching his 10th victory of the season in 12 decisions.

O'Toole went him one better, although he gave up 11 hits. However, the Mets weren't able to put them together until the ninth when they scored two runs. The victory was O'Toole's 12th against three losses.

San Francisco, St. Louis and Los Angeles split their doubleheaders, enabling the fourth-place Reds to pick up a game on all three top clubs. Cincinnati now is only 3 1/2 games behind the Giants, who lost to the Colts, 3-0, before winning the nightcap, 4-3, on the strength of ninth inning relief pitching by Billy Pierce and Jim Duffalo.

The Pittsburgh Pirates nipped the Cardinals, 4-3, in the opener on relief pitcher Al McBean's 12th inning homer, but St. Louis bounced back to take the nightcap, 11-7, while the Chicago Cubs downed the Dodgers, 8-3, before bowing to Rookie Nitch Willhite, 2-0, in the second game.

In the other NL action, Milwaukee and Philadelphia also split, the Braves winning the opener, 5-3, and the Phils the nightcap, 7-4 in 11 innings.
