Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors of Roseburg will face a stiff Doug-Lane League test Wednesday, traveling to North Eugene to face a tough Martin Bros. Signs team.

The twin-bill at the North Eugene High School diamond is scheduled to get under way at 4 p.m., with both games going seven innings.

Going into Wednesday's games, the local crew is tied with Springfield and Snellstrom Lumber (Sheldon) for the league lead. The three co-leaders have identical 2-0 records. Roseburg built up its league mark with a pair of victories over Bethel Legion (Williamette), while Springfield, rated as a strong contender for Roseburg's crown, has posted two triumphs over Martin Bros. Signs.

Snellstrom Lumber has built its 2-0 league mark at the expense of Pitchford Motors (South Eugene). Other games Wednesday finds Springfield meeting Pitchford's at Bethel Legion playing Snellstrom

Lumber. Thursday Pitchford's will be at Springfield and Friday Snellstrom Lumber will battle Bethel Legion at Williamette High School. Ace southpaw Ran Cool (4-0) and talented right-hander Dick Williams (3-1) are scheduled to be on the mound for Roseburg. Cool will oppose another top lefty in the form of North Eugene's Mike Snow.

Cool has worked 24 innings in building his 4-0 record. During his appearances the Drain star has recorded 55 strikeouts, walked 12, been charged with five hits and has been charged with three runs.

Williams has pitched 25 innings and has given up 18 runs on 18 hits, 10 walks and has struck out 20 batters. For relief the local crew will have Ron Westbrook (2-1), Jerry Boucek (1-1) and Jon Burnham (0-1).

Catcher Jim Beamer is leading the hit-parade among the regulars with 13 hits in 39 at bats for a .333 average and 12 RBIs. Dave Sevall, first baseman, also is hitting at a .333 clip and has five RBIs.

Sevall or Westbrook will start at first for Lockwood Motors, with the remainder of the infield finding Lance Casbeer at second, Artie McDonald at short and Boucek or Bob Kinyon at third.

Probable starters in the outfield include Mike Blomberg in left, Bob Manning in center and Tom Morrison in right.

Springfield's Legion crew boasts most of the McKenzie High team that won the state A-2 championship this spring. In the opening league game for Springfield it topped North Eugene on a brilliant

no-hitter by Dennis Baldridge, 11-1. Springfield won the second game 12-8 as Jim Peglow recorded 17 strikeouts while being tagged for 11 base blows. Baldridge is a leading hitter as well as being the top pitcher, and in the second game against Martin Bros. Signs he collected four hits in five trips to the plate.

Following Wednesday's league twin-bill, the local crew has a busy weekend lined up with six games in three days. Friday Roseburg will host Albany in a pair of non-counters at 6:30 p.m., then will host Snellstrom Lumber (Sheldon) in a league doubleheader Saturday at 6:30. Sunday Lockwood Motors will travel to Camp White for a 1:30 p.m. non-league doubleheader against the Central Point Cheney Studs.

LA Dodgers Drop SF Giants, 2-0

Koufax Twirls 4-Hitter; Cards Surge Into Lead

The Los Angeles Dodgers should start selling record books along with scorecards when Sandy Koufax pitches.

Otherwise how are the fans going to know what new feat the overpowering Dodger pitcher is out to achieve? He's already pitched two no-hitters and set a National League strikeout record both for a game and a season. And yet his bullet-like speed continues to threaten more records. Koufax whipped the San Francisco Giants, 2-0, Monday night to post his sixth shutout of the campaign—only one short of the club mark for a season shared by Burleigh Grimes and Whitlow Wyatt. His 10 victories put him halfway to his first 20-victory season—and the first by a Dodger lefty since 1951—and his nine strikeouts enabled him to regain the league lead with a season total of 111.

In addition, Koufax knocked the Giants from first to third place and permitted the St. Louis Cardinals to take over the top rung, seven percentage points ahead of the second-place Dodgers.

during which Bill White homered, Curt Flood had two doubles and Ken Boyer had three straight singles. It was Broglio's third straight win of the season over the Mets and the unearned run they scored against him in the seventh inning was their first against his pitching.

Roy Sievers' three-run homer, following a deliberate walk to Wes Covington, and Don Demeter's homer, both in the sixth inning, gave the Phillies their seventh win in 10 games with the Reds. Ryne Duren went six innings to win his second game with Jack Baldschun spinning three scoreless innings to clinch the Triumph. John Tsitouris suffered his second loss for the Reds.

Rookie Willie Stargell hit two homers and knocked in six runs and Bill Mazeroski and Bob Bailley also homered to lead the Pirates' 12-hit attack. Don Cardwell pitched an eight-hitter to win his third game. Hank Aaron, the major league leader, hit his 19th homer of the season for the Braves.

Regained Strikeout Lead

Koufax, who pitched a three-hit shutout against the Houston Colts last Saturday, now has pitched 19 consecutive scoreless innings. It was his second win of the season over the Giants—the other a no-hitter against them on May 11.

Ex-Yankee Bill Skowron's two-run double, which skipped through rightfielder Felipe Alou's legs, sent Maury Wills and Ron Fairly over the plate in the third inning with the runs which dealt Billy O'Dell his third loss compared to nine wins. The Giants filled the bases with two out in the second inning but Koufax fanned Jose Pagan to end the threat.

The Cardinals romped over the New York Mets, 8-1, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Cincinnati Reds, 4-2, and the Pittsburgh Pirates topped the Milwaukee Braves, 9-3, in other NL games. In the American League, the Cleveland Indians shaded the Washington Senators, 1-0, and the Baltimore Orioles beat the Boston Red Sox, 7-2.

Throw Five-Hitter
Ernie Broglio pitched a five-hitter for his eighth win behind a Cardinal attack that was concentrated in the first four innings.

Bevos Dropped To Third In PCL Losing 5-1 Decision To Seattle

To the idle go the spoils—or so it seemed in the Pacific Coast League Monday night.

Take Spokane, for example, while the Indians enjoyed a leisurely day off they jumped into second place in the Northern Division when second-place Portland dropped a 5-1 decision to Seattle. And in the Southern Division, the idle San Diego Padres moved

to within a half-game of pace-setting Dallas-Fort Worth which lost 5-2 at Hawaii, only the Denver Bears, who suffered a 9-4 setback at the hands of Salt Lake City, failed to capitalize on the Rangers' defeat.

Southpaw Bill Spangwick turned in one of his best pitching performances of the season in Seattle's victory. He pitched no-hit ball in all but one inning and that tainted frame was the seventh when Portland put together three consecutive singles for its only run.

Dave Hall provided Seattle's offensive punch with three hits and three runs batted in.

Herb Plews' inside - the park home run in the eighth with a runner on capped Hawaii's game-winning three-run rally. All three runs were unearned after the Rangers' first baseman, Ray Jablonski, committed a two-base error on a Tom Satriano hit.

Carlos Bernier accounted for Hawaii's first two runs with a home run that extended his consecutive game hitting streak to 15. George Banks had a two-run homer for Dallas-Fort Worth's tallies.

The best news of the night for Hawaii came at the turnstiles of Honolulu Stadium which admitted 2,850 fans to push the season's attendance above the 100,000 mark.

Bill Cowan and Bob Will each slammed home runs to pace Salt Lake City's 12-hit attack against Denver. The Bees erupted for five runs in the first inning and were never in serious trouble.

Catcher Phil Roof hit two home runs to account for three of Denver's four runs.

Tribe Continues Hot In AL Race

Jack Kralick is one of those fellows who is always being under-rated.

He's a fidgety, frail sort of fellow who was once placed on a vitamin diet to beef up his body and his fast ball. The Washington Senators gave up on him after two years and so did the Minnesota Twins despite the fact that he pitched a no-hitter for the Twins last Aug. 26.

Now he's with the Cleveland Indians and one of the big reasons why the Indians have surged into American League flag contention with five straight victories and 15 in their last 17 games. "We just put him on the firing line and turned him loose," said Cleveland pitching coach Mel Harder. "We haven't done a thing to change him."

The Indians acquired the 28-year old native of Youngstown, Ohio, May 2 in a deal that sent Jim Perry to the Twins. At the time Kralick's record was a mere 1-4 and it became 1-5 with the Indians before it started to get better.

Raised Season Mark
Now Kralick has won six in a row and raised his season mark to 7-5, including a five-hit, 1-0 victory over the Senators Monday night. In his last 44 1/3 innings, he's allowed only five earned runs and at the rate he's going he's quickly being recognized as the most effective lefty the Indians have had since Herb Score.

The victory and Baltimore's 7-2 win over Boston in the only other AL game Monday night put the Indians, Orioles and the Red Sox in a virtual three-way tie for third place. Only four percentage points separate the three teams, who all are three games behind the first place New York Yankees.

Kralick allowed five hits, struck out five and didn't allow a walk as the Indians continued to take advantage of a schedule quirk that has enabled them to beat the Senators eight out of nine games in the last 11 days. Kralick has scored four of the Indians' 15

wins since June 2 when they were in eighth place, eight games out of first place.

Balk, Error Help
The Indians scored the only run of the game in the eighth inning with the help of an error and a balk by Washington pitcher Jim Dackworth.

Duckworth, who suffered his fifth loss, threw wildly past first base on a bouncer back to the mound enabling Dick Howser to reach second base. Howser moved to third on Jerry Kindall's sacrifice and scored when umpire John Flaherty called a balk on Duckworth for stopping halfway through his windup and stepping back off the mound.
