

Conference Play Being Considered By Oregon, OSU

PORTLAND (UPI) — When the Pacific Coast Conference exploded amid bitter charges of illegal recruiting, under-the-table payments and low scholastic standards after the 1958-59 school year, the University of Oregon and Oregon State University were hurled out into the cold world of independent.

Four years later their teams are stronger than ever, and their fans have set all-time attendance records.

But school officials still would listen intently to an invitation to join a strong athletic conference.

"I believe the coaches would prefer a conference and I feel quite sure the people would," says Oregon Athletic Director Leo Harris.

"I think a conference affiliation is a good thing," contributes his counterpart at Oregon State, Roy S. (Spec) Keene.

The word "conference" to most people means a reformation of the old PCC, although officials of both schools regard that phrase with about as much affection as the Justice Department has for Jimmy Hoffa.

AAUW Formed

Five of the old PCC schools formed themselves into the Ath-er-versities, more commonly known as the Big Five. It became the Big Six when they took in Washington State. Then Idaho found some playmates its own size, or perhaps smaller, and went off to join the Big Sky Conference. That left the two Oregon schools.

Harris has refused steadfastly to talk about the Oregon schools joining the Big Six, despite indications they may be invited to join.

"It was the presidents and the boards of regents who were responsible for breaking it (the PCC) up in the first place," he says, and as far as he is concerned they would have to put it back together.

Players Needed In Riddle Area

More baseball players are needed in the Riddle area for the Little League and Babe Ruth teams, reports correspondent Erma Best.

To date 60 boys have turned out for the summer program, but at least 15 more are needed in the age group nine through 12 in order to set up a four-team city league.

Beavers Lose Money

The situation at Oregon State proves that artistic success is not always profitable. The Beavers lost \$64,886 in 1961-62. Their football attendance this year was 254,476, including the Liberty Bowl and an all-time record of 259,598 watched the OSU basketball team. Home attendance for 12 games was 96,004.

"There won't be a big surplus, but there won't be a deficit either," Keene predicts.

The financial squeeze may become tighter at both schools. The State Board of Higher Education recently raised out-of-state tuition from \$870 to \$900 a year and boosted dormitory fees. Harris estimates it will take another \$26,000 to maintain the same amount of grants-in-aid next year. Keene estimates OSU will need between \$28,000 and \$30,000.

A conference, especially if it guaranteed a share of Rose Bowl receipts every year, might solve some problems.

McCovey Hits 14th Homer As Giants Dump Dodgers

Every night just before he goes to sleep, Willie McCovey says a prayer that nothing happens to Don Drysdale.

If it ever does, McCovey will automatically lose his No. 1 meal ticket in the National League.

The big San Francisco first baseman owns a fantastic .468 lifetime batting average against Drysdale and while most rival batters shudder when they see the Los Angeles right-hander warming up, McCovey can't wait to grab a bat.

That's how it was Wednesday, too, when Willie teed off for a two-run homer in the first inning against Drysdale to start the Giants to an 8-3 victory over the Dodgers before a day-time crowd of 41,384 at San Francisco.

It was the 14th homer of the season for McCovey, who has hit nine during his career off Drysdale.

Marichal Wins 11th

Juan Marichal, making his first start since his no-hitter against Houston last Saturday night, got his 11th victory in 14 decisions although Billy Pierce took over for him in the eighth after Ron Fairly's homer cut the Giants' lead to 6-3. Chuck Hiller had a two-run homer for the Giants in the bottom of the eighth. Willie Davis also hit a two-run homer for the Dodgers in the fourth.

The victory kept the second-place Giants within a half-game of the pace-setting St. Louis Cardinals, who downed the New York Mets for the 10th time in 13 meetings this season, 9-4.

In other National League contests, the Chicago Cubs drubbed the Houston Colts 9-1, the Pittsburgh Pirates mauled the Milwaukee Braves 6-2, and the Cincinnati Reds beat the Philadelphia Phillies 6-5 in 10 innings.

The New York Yankees maintained their one-game lead in the American League by defeating the Washington Senators 3-2 for their sixth straight victory, the Chicago White Sox crushed the Minnesota Twins 12-4, the Boston Red Sox handed the Detroit Tigers their ninth straight loss 9-2, the Cleveland Indians beat Baltimore 5-4 but the Orioles took the nightcap 6-2, and Los Angeles and Kansas City split with the Angels winning the opener 4-2, and the A's the nightcap, 4-3.

Knocks In Five

Bill White ruined the Mets by driving in five runs for the Cards with a grand slam homer and a double. White's 12th homer of the season off loser Tracy Stallard in the fourth overcame a 3-2 Cardinal deficit. Reliever Ed Bauta scored his third victory.

Ernie Banks raised his career total of runs batted in to 1,003 when he connected for his 15th homer of the season and two singles in the Cubs' victory over the Colts.

Earl Francis of the Pirates helped himself to his third victory by driving in three runs against the Braves with a double and two singles. Hank Aaron's 20th homer and Mack Jones' second accounted for Milwaukee's two runs.

Leo Cardenas' single with two out and the bases full in the 10th broke up a tie between the Reds and Phils that had existed since the sixth inning when Don Demeter hit his second solo homer of the game.

Lockwoods Team Faces Full Weekend Schedule

Sporting a 4-0 league mark and a 12-4 record on the season, Lockwood Motors faces a busy weekend with six games in three days. Lockwoods' Hitters Shine In Twin Win

"Runs to spare" was the motto of the Roseburg Legion crew Wednesday as it ran its Doug-Lane League record to 4-0 with a pair of decisive triumphs over the host Martin Bros. Signs team of North Eugene.

With Run Cool twirling a four-hitter in the opener, Lockwood Motors rolled to an 11-2 victory, then came back in the nightcap to post a 16-8 win.

Sluggers stole the spotlight from the pitchers as the winners banged out a total of 25 base raps in the two games.

Jerry Boucock had a perfect afternoon with three singles in the first game and a base rap in his lone official appearance in the second. Boucock also reached base on an interference play and walked three times.

Second baseman Lance Casebeer broke his slump with three hits in five at bats in the opener and collected two more hits in the second game.

Both pitchers swatted the ball at a deadly clip, with Cool going 2-2 and Dick Williams collecting a grand-slam homer and a double in three appearances. Catcher Jim Beamer collected four hits in the two games.

Cool set the Martin Bros. Signs team down with a minimum of trouble in the opening game. The flashy left-hander recorded 17 strikeouts, gave up four hits, walked two batters and hit one. Cool had a no-hitter going until the fifth inning when Gary Pack swatted a single to left. North Eugene picked up his two runs in the sixth when Cool was tagged for his other three hits.

North Eugene's Mike Snow was effective until the second inning when Lockwood Motors opened the scoring with a four-run outburst. Beamer struck out but was safe when the catcher bobbled the ball. Casebeer followed with the first hit of the game, a smashing single through the box. Don Evans slapped a grounder at the shortstop and on the throw to second North Eugene's second baseman juggled the ball as Beamer raced home.

Boucock kept the rally alive with a single to drive in Casebeer, and Evans scored on an unsuccessful fielder's choice on Dave Sevall's grounder. Cool fled out to right field with Boucock scoring after the catch.

Four more runs crossed the plate in the fifth for Roseburg on three hits, three walks and one error. Evans' triple was the big blow, bringing Beamer and Casebeer home, while Boucock drove Evans across. Boucock came around on a balk, a wild pitch and an error as the catcher failed to touch the plate on an attempted double play.

Roseburg wrapped up its scoring with three in the seventh on four hits, one walk and a sacrifice fly. Singles by Boucock, Sevall, Cool and Beamer sparked the rally.

With one away in the sixth, North Eugene struck as Larry Piquet singled and Tom Spear and Bob Lange followed with back-to-back two-baggers.

Williams had a shaky start and finish, but was strong in the mid-innings as he posted his fourth win of the season against one loss in the second game. The talented Roseburg hurler was tagged for 10 hits, struck out eight and walked two.

Williams' teammates provided him with a three-run bulge in the top of the first. Artie McDonald and Tom Morrison were walked to open the game and Bob Manning was safe on an unsuccessful fielder's choice to load the sacks. Casebeer drove in the lead two runners with a single to right-center and Manning came across when the throw to the plate got by the catcher.

However, North Eugene bounced back with three hits in the first inning for two runs. Spear led off with a sizzling double and was sacrificed to second. A fielder's choice which went astray and a double by Lange accounted for the runs. Bob Washburn followed with a single which moved Lange to third, with both runner dying on base.

North Eugene tied the count in the bottom of the second. John Miller singled, stole second and scored on Pack's base rap.

Williams blew the game wide open in the third when he blasted Roseburg's first grand-slam circuit clout of the season. Beamer had led off the inning with a double and Sevall was safe on an error. With two away Boucock was purposely passed to get to the pitcher. Williams picked on the second offering from Lange and sent the ball sailing high over the right-centerfield fence.

Five more tallies were picked up by Roseburg in the fourth, three in the fifth and one in the sixth as the local crew turned the game into a rout. Manning belted a solo homer in the fifth.

With a comfortable margin built up, Williams went strong from the third through the sixth frame. In the sixth Martin Bros. added two runs on three hits, then compiled

three more in the seventh on one hit, the two walks issued by Williams and two Roseburg errors.
