WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House passed and sent to the Senate recently a bill which would extend for another two years liberal home financing mortgage insurance now available to low-and-moderate-income families.

Under the law, such families can obtain loans insured by the Federal Housing Administrator for up to 40 years with a minimum cash payment of \$200. Action on the bill came by voice vote.

SETS NEW DATE

NEW YORK (UPI) — Navy Yeoman I.C. Nelson C. Drummond will go on trial again July 8 for passing defense secrets to members of the Soviet delegation to the United Nations.

The date was set by federal Judge Thomas F. Murphy, who had originally scheduled Drummond's retrial for June 24. The previous trial resulted in a deadlocked jury.

Drummond, 34, was arrested last September as he was about to pass defense documents to Soviet representatives at a Larchmont, N.Y., diner, according to the indictment.
