Roseburg Women Honored Recently

Two local teachers attending the state convention of the Oregon Music Teachers Association at Eugene last week were gratified to learn that they had been awarded the Certificate of Professional Advancement, highest rating given any member by the association. The two recipients are Gladys Strong and Ruth Trued, both local music teachers.

In the atmosphere of an Emmy Award presentation in Hollywood, there was a hushed silence when the certification chairman, Joseph Brye of Oregon State University, read off seven names which the examining board had selected and passed as worthy of this highest distinction, the two local teachers being among the seven for the entire state. A lesser award of certification called the Certificate of Experience was received by 30 some members. This award encompasses certain educational requirements, teaching experience, syllabus exams, public performance and applied music, as well as a thorough knowledge of history, pedagogy and theory.

The Certificate of Professional Advancement comprises all this and more in order to be eligible for the highest distinction. First, the candidate must be 31 years or over — to which status both local teachers prudently admitted — and then must equal the stature of a master degree. However, a masters degree alone will not qualify for an award. The candidate must have contributed to the profession in one or more of the following accomplishments: Public performance of a formal nature, publication of a treatise on music or similar authorship, structure of composition, research, pedagogically capable of instructing teachers, showing exceptional skill in the art of teaching and contributing dis-

tinguished service to the teachers association and the music profession. In other words, the Music Teachers National Association, of which the Oregon association is a part, recognizes certain incontrovertible standards to which the profession must subscribe in order to elevate the art to its highest potential of achievement, hence these certifications of merit. Every teacher aspires to a certification of this high excellence.

Both Miss Strong and Mrs. Trued have prepared students for syllabus exams for many years with a remarkable record of well over 60 per cent in the superior classification. Both are engaged in successful teaching careers, producing students who themselves are now either teachers, performers or organists or engaged in educational work. Many have qualified for scholarships and some have entered the vocal field, some singing in opera. All this is the result of thorough preparation and assiduous effort. Students are usually grateful for a dedicated teacher's skill and ability, because if the modern concept of more application in each field is to be realized, more stress must be laid to the qualifying for teachers — which includes music.

In the matter of formal education, Miss Strong was graduated from Linfield College, The New England Conservatory of Music under Arthur Foote, and received special training in piano with Edwin Hughes of New York, and with Margaret Melville Liszewska and Lillian Paige and others.

Mrs. Trued is a graduate of Millard College, with graduate work at the University of Nebraska. She had special training with Dr. Mathew Lundquist, Albin O. Peterson and Dr. J. Frank Frysinger.
