## Mets Bomb Yanks In Benefit Game

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Mets fans had a ball—from cheering Casey Stengel to booing Roger Maris.

The Yankee Stadium was their oyster for a night and they made the most of it as their ragamuffin heroes defeated the world champions 6-2 in a benefit game for New York sandlot baseball played before a crowd of 50,742.

In fact, about the only thing the Mets' wildly enthusiastic fans didn't make off with was the stadium's center field flag pole—and it wasn't because they didn't try. A small mob of 'em seemed bent on taking it home as a souvenir until Yankee Stadium special police gained control.

The Yankees shrugged it all off as just another exhibition game.

"That's the way I like to split a doubleheader," said manager Ralph Houk, referring to the fact the Yankees beat the Washington Senators 5-4 in an American League game Thursday afternoon. "Just look at the standings of the two teams and you'll see we didn't lose a thing."

Sunday the back-breaking weekend will come to a close when Roseburg travels to Camp White for a 1:30 p.m. doublebill against the Central Point Cheney Studs in non-league play.

The local crew will be seeking to avenge losses to Albany and Central Point in the tough weekend grind. Lockwood Motors and Cummings Movers of Albany split an earlier non-league doubleheader, while Roseburg has a 1-2 record against the Cheney Studs.

Going into tonight's game Roseburg is packing a 12-4 record for the season, and is leading the Doug-Lane League with a 4-0 mark. Snellstrom Lumber has a 2-1 league record and is tied with Springfield for second place in the current standings. Snellstrom's will be seeking to pick up its third league win today against Bethel Legion (Willamette).

The lone loss suffered by Sheldon came at the hands of Willamette, while Springfield dealt a 2-0 setback earlier this week when Pitchford's (South Eugene) Jerry Gjesvold tossed a one-hitter.

The entire Roseburg pitching staff is scheduled to get a workout during the busy weekend, with Ron Cool and Dick Williams the probable starters in Saturday's league encounter.

Ron Westbrook and either Jerry Boucock or Jon Burnham are set to handle the mound duties tonight. Westbrook packs a 2-1 record and has given up only one unearned run in his 17 2/3 innings. Boucock has a 1-1 mark and Burnham is 0-1.

Cool heads the Roseburg mound staff with a 5-0 record and has fanned 72 batters in 31 innings while being charged with five runs two of which have been earned. Williams has a 4-1 record for the year. Hard-hitting Jim Beamer and Mike Markham will share the catching chores during the six-game stint.

The tentative starting infield for Roseburg will find Dave Sevall at first, Lance Casebeer at second, Boucock or Bob Kinyon at third and Artie McDonald at short. In the outfield will be Mike Blomberg, Bob Manning and Tom Morrison. If Blomberg's arm is still bothering him Don Evans will probably take over in the outfield. Blomberg came up with a sore arm in practice before Wednesday's games at North Eugene.

## Summer Touch Football Program Offered To Glendale Younsters

Glendale boys who are interested in a summer recreation and physical fitness program are being offered a chance to play touch football on the high school field several evenings a week under a program which is planned by Bill Baxter, the new football coach and physical education teacher for the high school.

Mrs. Baxter is interested in sponsoring a soft ball program for girls and women of the community at the same time, reports correspondent Mrs. Gerald B. Fox.

Baxter, a member of the Riddle faculty last year, has called for all boys, 7th grade through 12th grade, who are interested in such a program, to meet with him at the high school Saturday at 7:00 p.m. If sufficient interest is shown,

he will continue to meet with the boys Monday evening through Friday evening of the succeeding weeks from 7 to about 8:30 p.m. The program will include training in the fundamentals of throwing, kicking, passing, catching, faking and blocking.

# Azcue Packs Mighty Bat In Tribe Victory

Somebody goofed on Jose Azcue, who might have wound up his career in the minors had he not been given one more chance by the Cleveland Indians a month ago.

Azcue had previous trials with the Cincinnati Reds and Kansas City A's, both of whom had written him off as weak hitter with only triple-A potential.

But the Indians acquired him from Portland of the Pacific Coast League in a trade with Kansas City a month ago and have been congratulating themselves ever since.

Taking over as Cleveland's No. 1 catcher when receiver Johnny Romano broke a finger in late May, the 22-year-old Azcue has fashioned a solid .303 batting mark that has helped make the Indians the hottest club in the majors for the month of June.

Azcue helped the Indians to their 18th victory in their last 21 games Thursday night when he drove in four runs with a pair of homers in an 11-8 decision over the Baltimore Orioles.

**Gain Five Places**

With Azcue behind the plate in practically all their games the last three weeks, the Indians have spurred from ninth place to fourth, only 3 1/2 games off the pace.

Even with Azcue's two homers Thursday night, however, the Indians still needed another grand slam homer by Max Alvis during a six-run seventh inning to overcome the Orioles. Woodie Held of the Indians and losing pitcher Dick Hall also hit homers during the contest.

Jerry Walker, who relieved starter Dick Donovan in the seventh inning, was credited with his sixth victory against one loss.

The Yankees rolled to their seventh win in a row by whipping Washington 5-4, the Minnesota Twins beat the Chicago White Sox 9-4, and the Boston

Red Sox handed the Detroit Tigers their 10th straight defeat 8-3 in the only other American League games played.

Bobby Richardson's two-run double in the ninth inning off ex-temmate Jim Coates enabled the Yankees to overcome a 4-3 deficit against the Senators, who lost their eighth in a row.

Homers by Harmon Killebrew and Earl Battey plus Zoilo Versalles' triple with the bases full were the key blows in Minnesota's victory over Chicago.

The Red Sox capitalized on home runs by Dick Stuart and Chuck Schilling to score five runs in the fourth inning and deal the Tigers their third straight defeat under new manager Chuck Dressen.

## Tacoma Nips Padres On Home Run

If the parent San Francisco Giants don't appreciate pitcher John Pregener's arm, maybe they had better give a look-see at his heavy bat.

Pregener, a 220-pounder who was sent to Tacoma of the Pacific Coast League by the Giants six weeks ago, socked the first pitch delivered by tiring San Diego pitcher Scott (Moose) Breeden over the left field wall in the 12th inning last night. The poke gave the little Giants a 3-4 comeback win over the Padres. It was Pregener's first PCL homer. He also picked up his sec-

ond win of his campaign without a loss after coming in to relieve in the 10th inning. Breeden (5-4) went the full 12 innings.

In other contests, the hitting and fielding of second baseman John Werhas carried Spokane to an 11-3 win and three-game sweep of Salt Lake City; Oklahoma City scored nine runs in the first four innings to defeat Denver 10-8 and three home runs propelled Hawaii to a 5-1 victory over Dallas-Ft. Worth.

Rain forced postponement of the Seattle at Portland game.

**Early Lead**

Gene Frenese's three-run homer and a single by Derron Johnson gave the Padres a 4-2 lead in the third inning. Catcher Tim Talton's two-run single in the first frame had given Tacoma a short-lived margin.

But the Giants pecked away at the lead and scored their third run in the third on a triple by Jimmy Ray Hart and Talton's sacrifice fly. The Giants tied the game in the bottom of the ninth on Bill Hain's single, a throwing error by Breeden and Gil Garrido's squeeze bunt to set the stage for Pregener's blast.

Werhas, who was batting .325 at the start of the week, crashed a 35-foot home run with two Indians on base. He also tripled and doubled. In addition, he came up with two sparkling catches at second base. He drove to spear a line drive about a foot off the ground in the third and raced down the right field line to one-hand a pop fly for the final out of the inning.

Al Ferrara of Spokane drove in two runs off starting Salt Lake

pitcher and loser Al Lary (5-6) to run his league-leading total to 65. Joe Moeller, who went all the way for Spokane, evened his record at 6-6. He allowed seven hits.

**Weekly Hitting**

Oklahoma City, behind the hitting of league-leader John Weekly and 2.07 batsman Jim Mahoney handed Denver its 13th loss in the Bears' last 15 games. Weekly had a two-run homer and a pair of singles to up his average to near .350.

Mahoney slammed two doubles to drive in three runs. Weekly also had three runs batted in.

Denver tallied four runs in the ninth, including a three-run blast by Corky Withrow. Lou Klimchok hit a bases-empty homer for the Bears.

Oklahoma City starter Jim Golden (4-3) was the winner but he needed help in the ninth from Dave Gerard, Dick Kelley (2-4), first of four Denver pitchers, failed to last an inning and was charged with the loss.

Hawaii's Carlos Bernier swatted two homers, one with a man on base, and outfielder Stan Plays, home run king of the PCL last year, hit another to sink the Rangers. Fred Newman (4-6) went all the way for the Islanders, allowing the Texans only four hits. Joe Bonikowski (1-4) was tagged with the loss.
