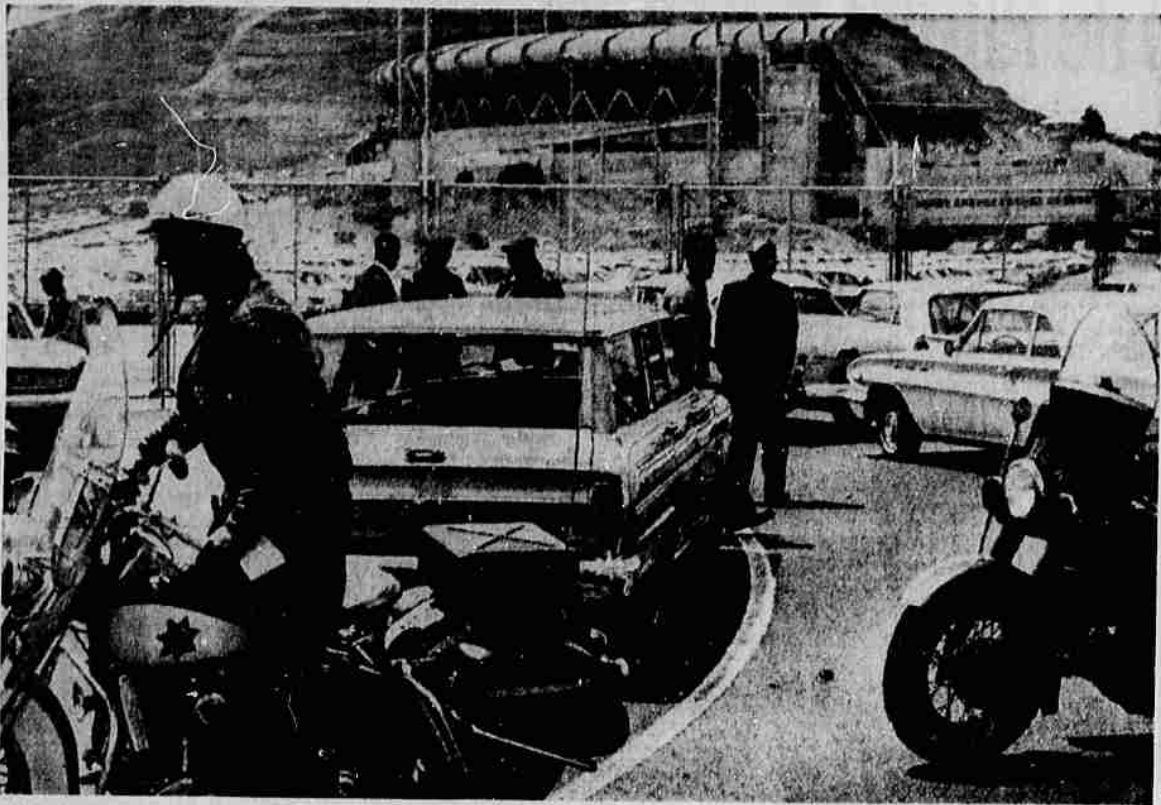
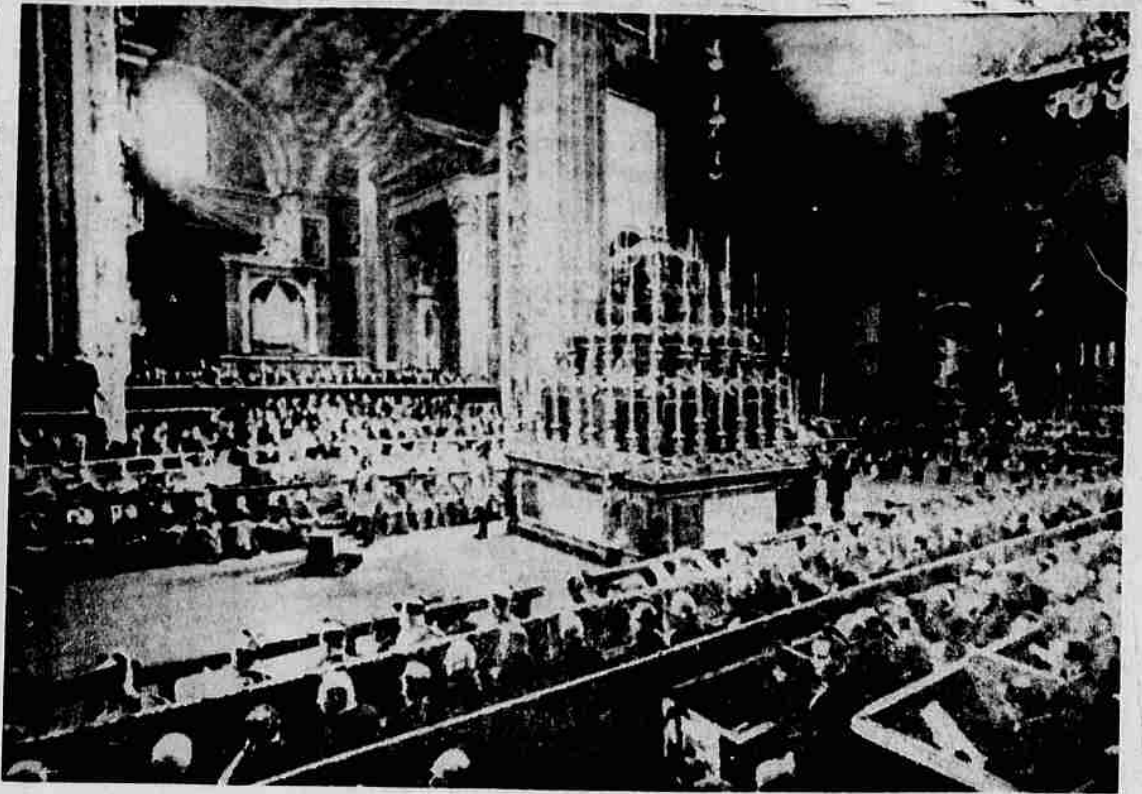

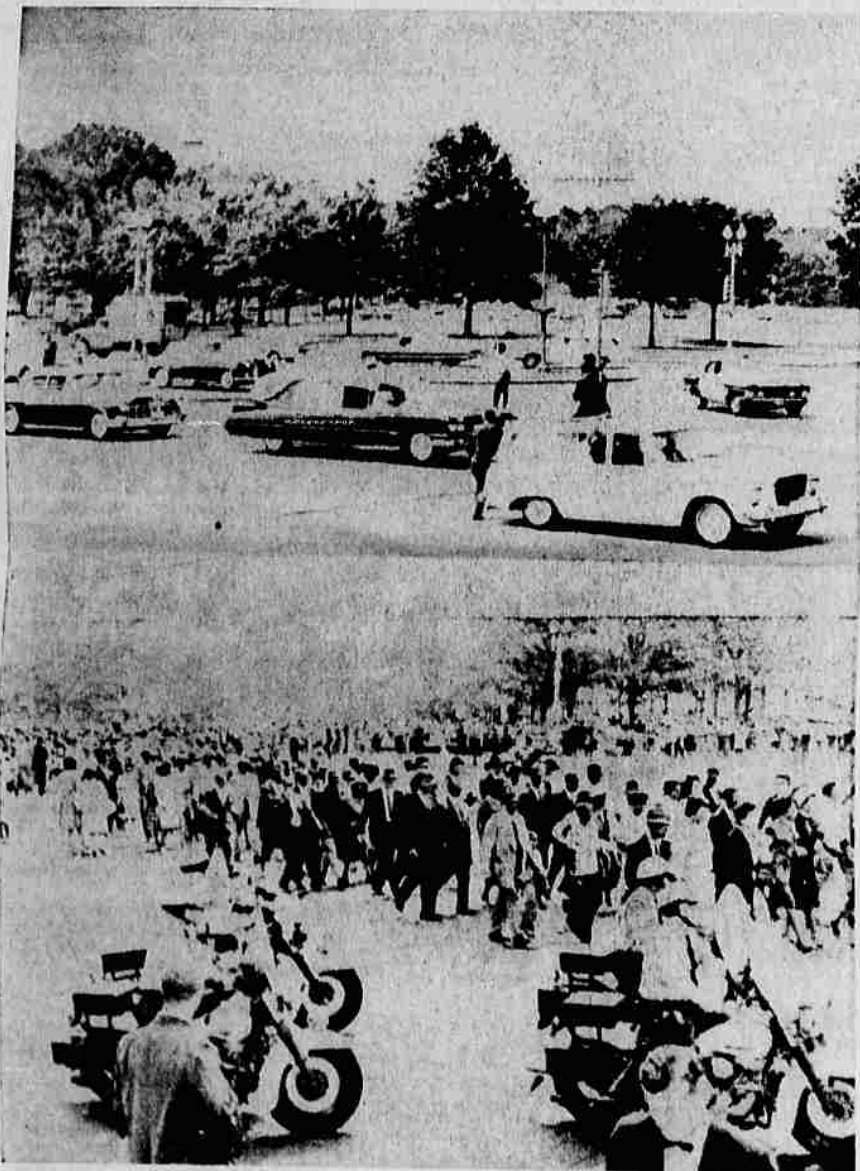

Basilica, Rome, Italy, Monday. Churchmen and politicians from all over the world, including U.S. Vice-President Lyndon Johnson, attended the rites.

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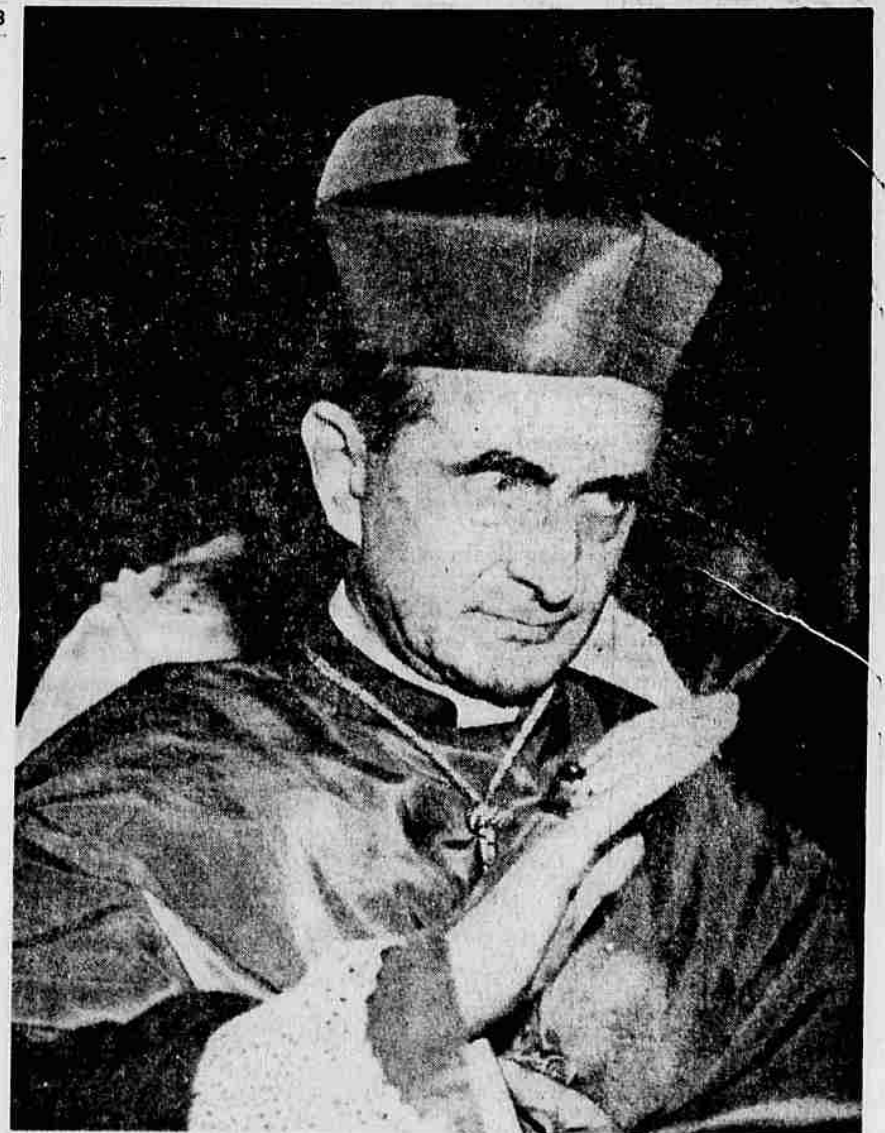

Bracero program, it is felt that production will be cut back and prices will rise. Labor union activity to organize farm laborers also was expected to pick up following the end of the program.
