

Koufax Gets 5-3 Win Over Cards; Giants Lose 6-3

Sandy Koufax' left index finger has come around so well that he now uses it to form a circle with his thumb.

That's the sign everything is perfect again and it also could be a sign the Los Angeles Dodgers are on the way to their first National League pennant since 1959.

Koufax' finger probably cost the Dodgers the pennant last year when a circulatory ailment in it forced the left-handed fast-pitcher to the sidelines during July.

But the digit doesn't seem to be bothering him now and if there's any question about it, Koufax can point to his record of 11 victories against only three defeats.

He pitched the Dodgers within a game-and-a-half of first place Friday night when he beat the St. Louis Cardinals 5-3 for his fourth victory in a row.

Koufax struck out nine and had a four-hit shutout going until the ninth when a single, a walk and Tim McCarver's two-out homer brought reliever Ron Perranoski in from the bullpen to get the final out.

Davis Hits Homer
Bill Skowron singled home two runs in the first inning off loser Curt Simmons (7-3) and after the Dodgers added another run in the seventh, Tommy Davis drilled a two-run homer in the eighth for what proved to be the decisive margin.

The Cardinals, however, still retained their half-game hold on first place when the Milwaukee Braves beat the second-place San Francisco Giants 6-3. Cincinnati made it four in a row with a 3-0 win over Houston, the New York

Mets defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 3-1, and the Chicago Cubs beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 6-3, in 10 innings.

In the American League, the Boston Red Sox snapped the New York Yankees' seven-game winning streak 7-4. Detroit broke a 10-game losing slide with a 6-4 triumph over Kansas City, the Chicago White Sox blanked the Cleveland Indians 2-0, the Los Angeles Angels beat the Washington Senators 1-0, and Minnesota topped Baltimore 5-2 in the first game but lost the second one 10-2.

Get Only Three Hits
The Braves were held to three hits by the Giants but still won despite Orlando Cepeda's 13th and 14th homers. Milwaukee clinched the game with six runs in the fifth. Joe Torre's homer and Lee Maye's three-run triple were the key blows. Tony Cloninger was the winner and Bob Bolin the loser.

Jim Maloney gained his 11th victory for the Reds with a four-hitter over the Colts. Loner Ken Johnson matched Maloney until the eighth when the Reds rallied for all their runs.

The Mets managed only four hits against the Phillies but capitalized on two Philadelphia misplays to beat Cal McLish. Frank Thomas double home two runs in the sixth following an error by third baseman Don Demeter and the Mets scored again in the seventh when Roy Sievers neglected to cover first base. Al Jackson hurled a seven-hitter and had two hits himself.

Andre Rodgers' single with the bases full in the 10th against the Pirates gave the Cubs their fourth straight victory. Don Elston was credited with his third triumph while Joe Gibbon suffered his fifth setback.

Early Wynn didn't win his 300th but he did win the right to try again.

"It's entirely up to him when he'll pitch again," said Cleveland manager Birdie Tebbets after the 43-year-old veteran lost a 2-0 heartbreaker Friday night to his former Chicago White Sox teammates.

The veteran right-hander, signed by the Indians three weeks ago after being let loose by the White Sox last fall and falling to regain a berth with them this spring, puffed and perspired through a scoreless eight-inning duel with Juan Pizarro Friday night.

Wynn held the White Sox to six hits until Floyd Robinson opened the ninth with his third single of the game and moved around to third on a passed ball and a sacrifice.

Calling on all his craftiness, Wynn then made Dave Nicholson his fifth strikeout victim of the game but Ron Hansen followed with a home run over the left field fence for the only runs of the contest.

It marked the fourth time Wynn had been frustrated in his effort to become the 14th pitcher in major league history to win 300 games. He tried three times in vain with the White Sox last season and had remained in training four months for Friday night's effort.

The victory boosted the second-place White Sox one game behind the league-leading New York Yankees, whose seven-game winning streak was snapped by the Boston Red Sox 7-4.

Detroit ended its 10-game losing streak and posted its first victory under new manager Charley Dressen with a 6-4 decision over Kansas City, Minnesota took the first game of a twin-biller from Baltimore 5-2, but lost the nightcap 10-2, and the Los Angeles Angels shaded the Washington Senators 1-0.

Frank Malzone boosted his batting mark to .343 when he collected two hits and drove in three runs for the Red Sox in their victory over the Yankees. Dick Sturart also aided Bill Monbouquette to his 10th triumph by driving in three runs on two hits.

However, some of them got anxious and started to bet too soon. Word leaked out and by the time of the race, the odds had dropped to 13 to 5. Sidereal won and paid off \$770,000 to Rothstein, but to his dying day, Rothstein would fly into a rage at the mention of the race and curse the agents who had disobeyed his orders. . . .
