

# Legion Divides Twin-Bill With Strong Central Point

 After being stymied by the wet weather, the Roseburg Legion crew traveled to Camp White Sunday to divide a non-league twin-bill with the host Central Point Cheney Studs.

Roseburg rallied in the seventh inning to squeeze out a 4-3 victory in the seven-inning opener, then lost the five-inning nightcap on a 1-0 thriller.

The Cheney Studs surprised the invaders in the first inning of the opener by getting to ace lefty Ran Cool for three hits and two runs. From this point until the three-run rally in the seventh, Lockwood Motors found itself battling from behind.

Cool, after the shaky start, settled down to scatter six hits and three walks over the seven-inning game, and was sacrificed to third by Dave Twedell. Neal Ellis slashed a single to right and Alvarez scored the first run. With two away Neil Ribenberg singled to center with Ellis moving to third. Ribenberg and Ellis then executed a double steal, and as Ribenberg slid safely into second the second run of the inning scored.

Roseburg bounced back with a single run in the third when Bob Manning collected a sizzling triple to deep left and Jim Beamer followed with a single.

The host team hit paydirt again in the fourth. Wayne Clay led off with a single and Mike Ahorn

worked his way for a free pass. Bob Corliss laid down a bunt, with Beamer attempting to get the runner at third. However, Beamer's throw missed the mark and Clay continued around to score, with the left fielder throwing Ahorn out at the plate. A classy double play stopped the rally.

With one away in the seventh Lockwood Motors started a rally which provided it with the victory Mike Blomberg was hit by the pitcher and Manning drew a walk.

A wild pitch moved the runners up before Beamer belted a single to score the tying runs. Lane Casebeer singled and the Cheney Studs sent their third pitcher to the mound.

Mike Markham worked his way for a base on balls to load the sacks and a strikeout eased the pressure on the home team. With a 1-1 count on McDonald the Crater hurler let fly with an inside pitch which hit McDonald to force the winning run home.

Beamer and Blomberg led the hit-parade for the winners with 2-4 and 2-3 records. Beamer led in RBIs with three.

Central pointed started the second game with a single run in the initial frame, and as Larry Mason hurled a nifty one-hitter made the run stand up to record their third triumph over the Roseburg crew in five meetings.

Alvarez led off with a double, and with two away Neal Ellis and Willie Jones banged back-to-back singles to score Alvarez. A double play ended the inning with Ellis stranded at third.

Mason set Roseburg down in order for the first three innings, then had some control trouble in the fourth frame. Tom Morrison ruined Mason's perfect game with

a walk to lead off the fourth and Casebeer sacrificed Morrison to second. After a strikeout Beamer was intentionally passed and Boucock flied out to centerfield to end the inning.

Mason's no-hitter was ruined when pinch-hitter Blomberg singled to the second baseman with one out in the fifth. Bob Kinyon then walked, but Dick Williams sent a sharp grounder at Alvarez at short who turned the play into a twin-killing to end the game.

Mason fanned nine batters in five innings, gave up the scratch single to Blomberg and walked three batters. Ron Westbrooks was charged with the loss as he was tagged for three hits and struck out three in three innings. Williams pitched the final inning.

Tuesday the Roseburg crew is set to take on Grants Pass in a pair of non-conferences at Legion Field. Game time Tuesday is set for 6:30 p.m.

## Boros Captures U. S. Open Title

**BROOKLINE, Mass. (UPI)** — Julius Boros, getting his second golfing wind at 43, thanks Arnold Palmer and Jacky Cupit today for his second U.S. Open victory.

"First I want to thank them for the way they played the 17th hole in the final round on Saturday," Boros said. "And then I want to thank them for taking a lot of strokes out there Sunday. They encouraged me a lot."

The oldest player ever to win America's premier golf tournament, Boros made a shambles of the playoff with Cupit and Palmer by shooting a one-under-par 33-37-70. That put him three strokes ahead of the 25-year-old Cupit, who had a 37-36-73, and six in front of Palmer, who, suffering from dysentery, carded a 38-40-76.

It wasn't the 17th hole that counted Sunday, though. For Palmer it was the 11th, where he blew any chance he had by coming up with a triple bogey. In Saturday's two final rounds he had triple-bogeyed and bogeyed that par-four 445-yard hole.

For Cupit it was the third hole, where he double-bogeyed.

## No. Umpqua Summer Steelhead Run Sets Record-Breaking Pace

A record summer steelhead run on the North Umpqua River appears in the making as 1,002 of the fighting game fish have been reported at the Winchester Dam counting station to date.

During the period of June 1-15 a total of 290 steelhead were counted. The 1,002 steelhead puts the count through June 15 well ahead of the number of these fish recorded at the dam through the same period for the past 10 years.

In addition to the summer steelhead, 1,628 chinook salmon and 246 jack salmon crossed the counting racks during the first two weeks of June. The chinook count for the year now stands at 8-344 and the jack salmon count at 1,188—both well above the counts for the past 10 years.

However, the late run of chinooks and jacks will not give the anglers any action in the North Umpqua as the season has been closed since June 3.

## Giardello To Test Skill Of Aging Robinson In Week's Top Fight

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — Joey Giardello, third-ranking middleweight contender, meets the once-great Sugar Ray Robinson at Philadelphia Monday night in the week's outstanding fight.

Their 10-round at Philadelphia's Convention Hall will not be televised nor broadcast.

Giardello is favored at 7-5 to beat New Yorker Robinson, who wore the welterweight crown once and the middleweight diadem five times.

An impressive victory for 32-year-old Joey over 42-year-old Robinson would help Giardello's campaign for a shot at the title.

Promoter Herman Taylor expects a crowd of at least 9,000 and a gate of about \$75,000.

There will be no Saturday-night television fight. The sponsors have preempted this Saturday's "TV time" for the football game at Buffalo, N.Y.

Stable, 22, won a unanimous decision over 27-year-old Scott of Philadelphia at Madison Square Garden: 8-1-1, 5-4-1, 6-4.

Promoter Harry Markson of the Garden said today: "We were so impressed with Stable's great fight — under heavy fire from Scott's left hooks — that we would like to use him with Griffith, if possible. Otherwise with former champion Luis Rodriguez."

Stable was favored at 13-5 as he and Scott entered the ring. Each weighed 147 pounds, the class limit.

"That really hurt," said Cupit. "But I thought even on the 17th green that I still could tie Julius — until he knocked in his putt for a birdie. I knew I was gone then."

The victory climaxed six weeks of golfing gold for Boros, who at 43 years and 112 days was three days older than Britisher Ted Ray when he won the Open in 1920.

Starting with the \$12,000 he won by capturing the Colonial Invitational at Fort Worth on May 12, Boros has picked up \$44,155 in that six-week span.

That doesn't count the \$1,500 bonus which he and Cupit and Palmer received for Sunday's playoff before 12,500 on the hot, exacting country club course of Brookline.

"But I'll take it," Boros said, "for it's spendable."

He credited his wedge shots out of the rough for his victory.

"I always practice getting out of the rough for the Open, and Open courses usually have heavy rough," Boros said. "I was in the rough around the green four times Sunday and each time got down in two. The rough is where you can waste shots. I don't waste many that way, and that's why I have been pretty lucky in the Open."

He won it the first time in 1952 — "My biggest golfing thrill, for it was my first tournament victory," Boros pointed out.

Since that time, he has finished in the top five eight times in 10 Opens. He missed last year's Open when he failed to file his entry on time, and in 1960 failed to make the cut.

Asked to explain how he suddenly regained his touch, the stone-faced belter from Mid-States, N.C., replied:

"I just go out there and hit the ball. When I hit it well, I lose. When I don't hit it well, I win. It's as simple as that."

He said he felt sorry for Palmer in the playoff "because I know he had a bad night and felt horrible out there."

Palmer paid his own tribute to Boros.

Brian Phillips and Bob McKee also finished second in the boys 18-and-under doubles bracket.

It was just a little more than a year ago when Houk was forced to decide between a peagreen rookie and the veteran Robin Roberts. He went for the "kid" and let Roberts go.

If your memory is as good as you think it is you'll recall what a ruckus that move caused, especially after Roberts caught on with the Baltimore Orioles and proceeded to win 10 games.

Young Jim Bouten — the "kid" Houk kept instead, struggled to a not-too-impressive 7-7 season and was earmarked for the bullpen when the 1963 American League season began.

The 24-year-old right-hander did such a good job in some early-season relief roles that Houk promoted him to a starting berth. That was back on May 12 against the Orioles. Since then, Jim has won eight of nine decisions, including a sparkling four-hitter Sunday that paced the Yankees to an 8-0 victory over the Boston Red Sox and increased their AL lead to two full games over the Chicago White Sox, who split a doubleheader with the Cleveland Indians, winning the opener, 2-1, and dropping the nightcap, 2-0.
