Air Force Jet Plane Makes Forced Landing

PORTLAND (UPI)—A large Air Force jet plane was forced to dump its fuel over Portland Air Base and make an emergency landing shortly after takeoff Sunday morning.

Air base officials said the action was taken after a generator warning light on the four-engine jet indicated overheating.

The pilot, Capt. Richard G. Twining, dumped the fuel while circling the field and landed without incident.

The plane had brought Federal Civil Defense Director Stewart Pittman to Portland Thursday for talks with city officials. Pittman returned to Washington, D.C., Saturday by commercial airliner because of mechanical difficulties with the Air Force plane.

Church World Service Truck Due For Clothing Pick-Up On July 8

Roseburg is included in the route of a Church World Service (CWS) truck which will make a clothing pickup in Oregon during the week of July 8.

Dr. Eugene Gerlitz of the Roseburg First Baptist Church is in charge of local arrangements. Any church or organization desiring to contribute should bring the items (clothing and blankets) to the First Baptist Church at the corner of SE Rose and SE Lane by July 10.

An additional eight cents for each pound of clothing contributed is requested by CWS to pay the costs of processing the clothing and getting it from the collection center to the port.

Previously it has been necessary for churches to ship the clothing to a center at Modesto, Calif., Dr. Gerlitz noted. Now the truck will collect clothing at 11 key towns in

Oregon and transport the goods to a new center at 1911 Main St., Vancouver, Wash.

Last year Church World Service through the United Clothing Appeal in the United States sent 5.8 million pounds of clothing for use in overseas areas of need. Oregon was credited with 61,701 pounds. This year CWS has already received requests for 18 million pounds of clothing. Special needs are clothing for boys and men, Dr. Gerlitz said.

Shoes for men, women and children are also badly needed. Women's shoes should be size 5 and larger, no open toes, high heels or backless models. All items should be in good condition and ready to wear. All items should be packed in boxes or bags before being brought to the church.

JFK's Reason For European Trip Becoming More Clear

BONN (UPI)—President Kennedy's reasons for proceeding with his European trip, despite considerable advice to the contrary, are becoming increasingly clear.

The 12-day trip—with the exception of a sentimental sojourn in Ireland—is obviously a key element in his new "strategy for peace" which the President hopes may lead to some easing of East-West tension.

Kennedy apparently felt he would not be in a good position to take advantage of any opportunities stemming from the Soviet-Chinese Communist split until he first calmed the nervous Allies who fear some American deal at their expense.

Suspensions of Washington's intentions have been sparked by French President Charles de Gaulle's repeated assertions that Europe cannot always depend on the United States. But the sus-

picion that the United States, 18 years after the end of World War II, might be growing weary of its role of major protector was already here.

Ideal Platform

West Germany offered the ideal platform from which to launch this personal campaign of reassurance, and Kennedy is making the most of it. He restated the depth, breadth and permanence of U.S. military and moral commitment within seconds after arriving and has been developing the theme by the hour.

The Germans always have wanted frequent reassurance that the United States is not wavering on its firm commitment to Berlin, and will not abandon the country under Communist aggression.

However, his words are addressed to a wider audience. By the time he delivers the major

address of his tour—a speech in historic St. Paul's Church in Frankfurt Tuesday—he hopes to have rallied shaky NATO members to a fuller realization that they have nothing to fear.

One of the reasons Kennedy hurriedly summoned Foy D. Kohler, U.S. ambassador to Russia, to Bonn was to get a last-minute assessment of the possible course of Soviet policy in the wake of last week's Soviet Communist party meeting and next week's Russian meeting with high Chinese Reds in Moscow.

An exchange of views on this subject is being given an important place in Kennedy's discussions with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and his prospective successor, Vice Chancellor Ludwig Erhard.

Foreign Minister Gerhard Schroeder is being given particu-

lar attention in the talks because of the belief of some American officials that he may move into the chancellorship after a few months if Erhard proves as politically inept as Adenauer has always claimed him to be.

Administration officials are not at all certain that the growing Sino-Soviet split offers any real possibilities for tension-easing accommodations with the

Kremlin. But the Kennedy government intends to explore the field and wants to close ranks among the Allies before undertaking the experiment.

That seems to be the principal reason for the President's firm determination to let nothing delay or cancel the trip.

Earth Shocks Recorded

Seattle Welcomes Climber's Return

SEATTLE (UPI)—James Whitaker, the first American to conquer Mt. Everest, was scheduled to receive a hero's welcome here today.

Whittaker, who was to arrive at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport at about 2:15 p.m., was to be honored with a parade through the downtown area and a reception in the plaza of the city's Public Safety Building.

Scheduled to share the welcome with the 6-foot-5 mountaineer from nearby Redmond were two other members of the Everest expedition, Luther Jerstad and Barry Prather. Jerstad is a speech teacher at the University of Oregon and a native of Gig Harbor, Wash. Prather is from Ellensburg, Wash.

Jerstad was one of the five members of the expedition who reached the top of the world's highest mountain. Whittaker made his climb on May 1. The others reached the top in later assaults.

After a short vacation with his family, Whittaker is scheduled to fly to Washington, D.C., July 8 to meet President Kennedy.

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
