Shotgun Fire Wounds Negroes At Meeting

Five Negroes leaving a voter registration campaign meeting were wounded by shotgun fire Monday night at Canton, Miss.
Police Chief Dan Thompson said the men were not hurt seriously. He said an investigation of the incident was under way. The Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) has been conducting an intensive voter registration drive among Negroes recently in the town about 25 miles north of Jackson, Miss.
Federal Judge John N. Butner ruled at Richmond, Va., Monday that the U.S. government has the right to bring school desegregation suits in Prince George County, Va., because the county accepted federal funds to educate children from military bases.
The ruling is expected to have an effect on other segregated school systems near military establishments which get federal aid to defray educational costs.
At Mobile, Ala., Federal Judge Daniel H. Thomas ordered the Mobile County School Board to present a desegregation plan that would begin in September, 1964. It was the first integration edict below the college level in Alabama.
Nearly 1,000 Negroes and whites demonstrated through the streets of Los Angeles Monday against alleged de facto segregation in the schools. Their leaders claimed only partial success on their demands after attending a school board meeting. They were divided on whether more demonstrations would be necessary.
About 500 Negroes gathered in front of police headquarters at Savannah, Ga., Monday night to protest the jailing earlier in the day or more than 50 demonstrators. The group dispersed peacefully after hearing its leader, Hosea Williams, criticize Savannah's segregation customs.

Hospital Board Approves Plans For New Facilities

The Douglas Community Hospital board of directors has approved plans for some 36,000 square feet addition of new and remodeled space, and plans will be completed by architects Wicks & Brown, Astoria, this week.
Bids will be received by the chairman of the building committee, Kenneth Ford, at the hospital, 738 W. Harvard Ave., until 2 p.m. July 18. When the additions are completed, the hospital will have about 136 beds compared to the 80 currently available.
Facilities Due
The new facilities will be added on to wings of the existing hospital. Included will be an administrative wing, new obstetrics wing (including delivery, labor and nursing suite), addition of new storage area over the existing mechanical room, new pediatrics wing of 22 beds and 34-bed nursing home with four private and the balance all semi-private rooms.

JFK Pledges To Defend Allies

State To Ask Full Penalty For Beckwith

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) — The state will seek the death penalty for a white segregationist charged with the sniper slaying of Negro civil rights leader Medgar Evers.
The suspect, Byron De La Beckwith, was scheduled to appear before City Judge James Spencer today at 4 p.m., EDT, in a preliminary hearing on a murder charge.
Dist. Atty. William Waller said Monday night he would ask the Hinds County grand jury when it convenes next Monday to indict Beckwith for murder.
"I will ask for the death penalty if, and when, he is indicted and tried," Waller said.
Beckwith, 42, of Greenwood, was turned over to Jackson police Monday afternoon by U.S. Commissioner John R. Countiss III on instructions from the Justice Department.
He is charged with the June 12 sniper slaying of Evers, who was state field secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).
Beckwith was arrested by the FBI last Saturday night at his attorney's office in Greenwood on a federal warrant. He had been held since early Sunday as a federal prisoner.

Park Road Meet Set By Council

The Roseburg City Council plans a special meeting Wednesday noon to discuss a proposed program of road improvements in Stewart Park.
Decision to set up a separate meeting for the park road consideration came during Monday night's regular council meeting after it became apparent the councilmen had not unified their thinking on the nature and extent of improvements needed.

Teamster Boss Pleads Innocent Of Conspiracy

CHICAGO (UPI) — Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa today pleaded innocent to charges of conspiring with seven other men in a \$20 million fraudulent loan scheme.
The other seven men indicted with the Teamsters boss also pleaded innocent.

LSW-TOC Talks Break Off Monday

PORTLAND (UPI) — Talks between the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) and the Timber Operators Council, which represents some 196 employers, resumed and then broke down again Monday. Spreading of the current strike appeared possible.
The TOC offered the union a 20-cent hourly wage hike over the next three years. This was rejected by the union which reiterated its demand for a 60-cent an hour raise over the same period.
A federal conciliator called a caucus for each side and then talks were resumed.
A union spokesman said he considered the talks at an impasse and added the negotiating committee "may take selective economic action" against one, two or three members of the TOC.
In Kalispell, Mont., a temporary restraining order which had barred the LSW from striking against the L. Regis Paper Co. at Libby and Troy was vacated by Judge Frank Haswell.
The LSW and the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) were struck St. Regis and U.S. Plywood and four other members of the Big Six employer group shut down in retaliation.
A spokesman for the TOC said he thought the offer made Monday to be "very fair."

Board To View Plans For New Community Hall

Eugene architect John Briscoe is scheduled to present plans to the Roseburg School Board Wednesday night which will outline the cost of a 1,500 to 2,000-seat capacity community auditorium.
The community auditorium plan, which is only in the tentative formulation stage, would call for some type of joint financing between the schools, the city and county.
The School Board's purpose in having the cost estimate made was to enable backers of plans for such a building to present the plan to the public and get an indication of public interest in the project.
If the public appears interested in such a building, plans will then be advanced to the stage of figuring out methods of financing. If the plan appears feasible, it will then again be presented to the public.
This is not a school project, as such, but the School Board has the facilities and the services of its architects to bring the proposal to a cost stage.
Also on tap at Wednesday night's School Board meeting is the opening of bids on the addition to Melrose School.

3 Airmen Cleared In Profumo Scandal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department today cleared three U.S. Air Force men who were flown home from Britain for questioning in the Profumo sex and security scandals.
The airmen were not identified. But the department said investigation had shown that none was "involved directly or indirectly in any way, or had any knowledge" concerning the case.
It did say, however, that two of them had met a girl named "Christine". This was presumed to be party girl Christine Keeler around whom the British scandal has centered.
But the department added: "They had no intimate contact with her and didn't even know her last name until they read the publicity concerning her in the newspapers."
In answer to questions, Assistant Defense Secretary Arthur Sylvester said the airmen "had no immediate contact with her either physically or socially — the word is used in its broadest sense."
The announcement was issued after the men had boarded planes to return to their base in England.
It said they had been flown to Washington for questioning Friday "because of rumors and queries indicating that three U.S. servicemen might have been involved in the Profumo case."
The investigation was described by the Pentagon as "an effort to ensure that the security interests were properly protected."

Wounded General's Condition Critical

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — Air Force Maj. Gen. Thomas J. Gent remained in critical condition today with a bullet wound in the head and military authorities planned to question his 52-year-old wife.
Gent, outgoing commander of the 32nd Air Division, was shot early Monday with a 25-caliber automatic pistol in the couple's quarters at Tinker Air Force Base.
The shooting occurred less than 24 hours after Gent's wife, Martha, was arrested for drunken driving, resisting arrest and assaulting an officer. She was free on bond.
Military authorities said their investigation would take at least three days. They said they hoped to question Gent later this week.
The bullet entered Gent's left temple, traveled almost a straight line and came out the right side of his head. He was rushed to an Oklahoma City hospital in critical condition, but he improved during the day and hospital spokesmen said they were optimistic about his chances of recovery.
His wife was taken to the Tinker Air Force Base Hospital in a state of shock. She was under heavy sedation and authorities were unable to question her Monday.
Although authorities disclosed few details surrounding the shooting, they did say it was believed to be accidental.

Landslide Buries Kojima Island City

SEOUL (UPI) — Landslides following heavy rains buried the village of Changungpo on Kojima Island today, killing at least 71 persons, it was reported here.
Floods and landslides elsewhere in southern Korea had caused 41 deaths this week.
Details of the Changungpo tragedy were scanty, because communications between the island and the mainland had been disrupted by two days of torrential rain.
First reports said 62 villagers were entombed in a great heap of earth 120 feet high early this morning. Police rushed to the scene, and nine policemen were buried by a second landslide.
Kojima, about 30 miles southwest of the southern port of Pusan, was the site of a prison camp during the Korean War. Communist prisoners confined there staged a number of bloody riots.
The danger in Changungpo had been foreseen, and police moved residents out of the village Monday night. The night passed uneventfully, and the villagers began returning home shortly before the landslide struck.

Agents Break Huge Bogus Money Ring

DURHAM, N. C. (UPI) — Secret Service agents early today arrested a fourth man on a charge of belonging to an alleged counterfeiting ring which produced more than \$1 million in bogus \$20 bills.
The man, Haywood Forbush, 43, a South Boston, Va., restaurateur, was brought here for a hearing today.
Agents first announced the break in the ambitious counterfeiting ring Monday night with the arrest of Roy Lee Matthews, a 33-year-old Durham used car salesman, and two other men.
Federal agent George Dipper said a week-long investigation was climaxed when Matthews sold an unidentified undercover agent \$30,000 in bogus money in a hotel room here.
Dipper said an additional \$70,000 in counterfeit money was found in Matthews' car and that the alleged counterfeiter, agents to his home and produced three boxes containing \$800,000 in bogus money from underneath his bed.
Agents then arrested Robert S. Ferguson, owner of Ferguson Printing Co., and his assistant, R. B. Poole, also of Durham.
Poole said Forbush had \$34,000 in counterfeit \$20 bills on him when arrested in South Boston.
Matthews, Ferguson and Poole were arraigned before U.S. Commissioner Henry Bane late Monday night and bound over to U.S. District Court. Bond for each was set at \$5,000.
Both Dipper and Vernon Spicer, agent in charge of the Secret Service bureau in Charlotte, declined to say whether more arrests were expected.
Both said, however, that they doubted that any of the bogus money had gotten into circulation.

Navy Delays Second Dive Of Trieste

ABOARD THE USS FORT SNELLING AT SEA (UPI) — The Navy called off today's scheduled dive by the bathyscaphe Trieste in search of the nuclear submarine Thresher because of minor difficulties.
The dive, second by the bathyscaphe, was rescheduled for 9 a.m. EDT Wednesday.
Capt. Frank A. Andrews, in charge of the search operations, said the problems were breakdown of a transistor unit in a sonar facility on the Trieste, a delay in recharging the Trieste's batteries, and an injury suffered by a member of the Trieste's crew.
Navy Lt. Cmdr. Donald K. Keach, 34, of San Diego, Calif., the pilot of the bathyscaphe, and a civilian assistant, Kenneth V. MacKenzie, 51, also of San Diego, had been scheduled to make today's dive.
Both Keach and MacKenzie made the first dive Monday. Navy Lt. George W. Martin, 30, of San Diego was to have replaced Keach today but suffered a sprained ankle Monday night while transferring from one small boat to another. Because of this officials felt it was better that he not be kept confined in the tight quarters of the Trieste's gondola today.
Officials said "nothing significant was noted" during the 1 1/2 mile plunge, the deepest controlled dive ever made in the Atlantic.

Paulskirche Talk Aimed At Critics Of U.S. Veracity

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI) — President Kennedy pledged today that the United States would risk its own cities to defend its allies.
"A threat to the freedom of Europe is a threat to the freedom of America," the President said in a speech at the historic Paulskirche (St. Paul's Church), which is regarded as the cradle of German democracy.
A million cheering Germans greeted the President as he arrived here to make the speech that was billed as the major address of his 12-day tour of West Germany, Berlin, Ireland, Britain and Italy. Reporters who have traveled with Kennedy said he was perhaps the most enthusiastic welcome he has received abroad.
An Enthusiastic Welcome
The 20-mile route from Hanau, where the President reviewed 15,000 American servicemen, was lined three to five persons deep all the way.
The crowd in front of Frankfurt's city hall, where the President climbed out of his bubble-topped car and went inside to sign the famous "golden book" of celebrities, was so enthusiastic in its welcome that it almost got out of hand.
While he emphasized defense matters, the Chief Executive also called for economic unity and common political purpose as requisites to successful Western resistance to Communist penetration.
The White House staff regarded Kennedy's prepared Paulskirche speech as the most important utterance of his four-day visit to West Germany, the first stop on his 12-day European tour.
Aimed At Critics
The main thrust of the speech was aimed at international critics who have forecast that the United States ultimately will wish on defense commitments to its Western Allies and revert to what the President scorned as "narrow nationalism."
The President, who came here from two days of talks in Bonn with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, vowed that American defense commitments to protect "common freedom and safety" were assured "by one great fundamental fact — that they are deeply rooted in America's own self interest."

Khrushchev To Visit E. Berlin To Counter Kennedy Claims

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev is going to East Berlin on Sunday to try to offset whatever encouragement West Berlin derives from President Kennedy's visit Wednesday, foreign observers said today.
The official Soviet Agency Tass took both Russians and foreigners here by surprise early this morning with its announcement of Khrushchev's weekend trip.
Foreign observers said the hurriedly scheduled visit was intended in part to aid East Germany's Communist boss Walter Ulbricht, who has been waiting for years for the Kremlin to make good on promises to end Western occupation in Berlin and to sign a peace treaty with Red-held East Germany.
The Tass announcement said Khrushchev officially is going to East Berlin to observe Ulbricht's 70th birthday. Khrushchev's presence undoubtedly will be a welcome birthday present for Ulbricht.
Observers said that what Khrushchev has to say in East Berlin will depend chiefly on Kennedy's action in West Berlin.

River Fall Claims Man

BROOKINGS (UPI) — A lifelong resident of the Brookings area, Elmer Hanscom Sr., 73, fell from the rocks of the south jetty on the Chetko River and drowned Monday afternoon.
