

Two New SIAC Members Sworn In By Hatfield

SALEM (UPI)—Two new industrial accident commissioners were sworn in today by Gov. Mark Hatfield, who then made an unprecedented appearance before commission employees and urged them to "continue working forward, onward and upward to make this the best program in the nation."

The action came on the heels of Monday's public hearing on charges of "inefficiency in office" against commissioner Emily P. Logan.

Four DFPA Lookout Stations Manned

Four of 15 Douglas Forest Protective Association lookouts are manned already and the rest will be manned this week and next.

This was the report today from John B. Richards, district warden. He also said that all the wardens' stations are now manned and that fire suppression crews will go to work July 1.

In preparation for what many consider one of the worst potential fire seasons in history, the DFPA district fire school was held last week at the Roseburg headquarters.

Activity included instruction in map reading, preliminary lookout training, basic fire behavior and smokehazing for new personnel. New wardens were given instruction in large fire organization, line location and construction with bulldozers, hand line construction, control of small fires and effective use of water. The experienced wardens received a course in use of dozers on fires.

The training took place both in the classroom and in the field. Taking part were nine new wardens and eight new lookouts.

The school was climaxed Saturday by a talk on policies by Richards and a picnic which drew about 100 people. Instructors for the fire school were from the district and state office.

City Awards Contract For Sewer Extensions

Two sanitary sewer extensions were included in a group of six contracts awarded Monday night by the Roseburg City Council.

Collins Construction Co. submitted low bid on both projects. The firm bid \$3,987.20 for NW Lynwood sewer work and \$11,457.10 for an extension in the W. Pilger Street area.

Contract to furnish the city with ethyl gasoline for the 1963-64 fiscal year went to Tidewater Oil Co., which bid 27.29 cents per gallon for gas at the pump and 24.02 cents for tank delivery.

Rhoads Cleaning Service was awarded the janitorial service contract for the new fiscal year and the council accepted a \$1,495 bid from Air Mac, Inc. of Medford for providing the city police department with a Cushman "truckster" which will be used to transport the meter maid in her meter enforcement rounds.

Trowbridge Electric Co. won contract for maintaining city-owned mercury street lights and traffic signals.

Truck Spills Gasoline On Sutherland Street

The Sutherland Fire Department was called out at 2 p.m. Monday to flush gasoline from E. Central Avenue, where it had been spilled when a Martin Bros. Container and Timber Products Corp. truck turned over.

The lumber truck, en route from the Martin Bros. plant at Oakland to their Sutherland plant, had just begun its turn off Central Avenue onto the firm's private road when the load shifted and caused the truck to turn over on its side, correspondent Mrs. Jerry Demuth reported.

The driver, Harley Brown, was uninjured. The load had to be cut loose so the truck could be righted, but no major damage was reported.

Freedom Bond Drive Goal Near In Roseburg

With a week and a half to go, the Freedom Bonds sales are within \$3,000 of the goal set for the current Freedom Bond Drive in Roseburg.

Local banks report sales for last week amounted to \$3,506.25. Since May 1, the sales in the city have totaled \$52,316.25. The goal, which leaders hope to see reached by July 4th is \$57,000.

Grass Fire Doused

The Roseburg City Fire Department quickly extinguished a small grass fire at noon Monday at 1008 SE Flint. No damage resulted from the fire and no cause was listed by the firemen.

At 2:10 p.m. the firemen investigated smoke in a house at 416 NE Jackson, and at 6:10 p.m. answered a call on a clothes dryer smoking at 2931 West Harvard. No damage was reported at either site.

Logan. Mrs. Logan refused to answer charges at the hearing, and termed the affair a "kangaroo court."

Her attorney, Ernest Bonyhadi, questioned the legality of procedures followed by Hatfield, and said he had not yet decided whether to take the issue to the courts, or to answer the charges in a public statement.

Mrs. Logan and Commission Chairman Sidney B. Lewis received dismissal notices, effective today, on June 11. Monday's hearing was set in case either wanted to dispute the charge.

Lewis resigned Friday, and a few hours later Wilfred A. Jordan, Coos Bay Republican, was named to succeed him.

Shortly after Monday's hearing, Hatfield named Grants Pass Mayor Charles B. Gill Jr., a Democrat, to succeed Mrs. Logan.

Jordan was sworn in at 7:55 a.m. today, then in a move that surprised several members of the governor's staff, Gill was sworn in at 8 a.m.

As soon as the ceremony was over, Hatfield asked if commission employees could be called together.

The governor, accompanied by the new commissioners and a dozen commission staff officers, strode to the labor and industries building.

Hundreds of employees were standing in the conference room when the party arrived. Hatfield thanked the workers for carrying on during the recent difficult times.

"We have a chance to begin anew to make this the best program in the country."

"Today is a pleasant day in contrast to yesterday," Hatfield remarked. He then introduced the new commissioners.

As the governor left the room a workman was pulling nameplates from the offices formerly occupied by Lewis and Mrs. Logan.

Hatfield commented "I wanted to help settle the staff down, naturally they've been in turmoil." Monday's hearing was held because Mrs. Logan refused to resign.

She arrived at the board of control room for Monday's hearing three minutes ahead of time. Hatfield entered the room six minutes later.

Escapee Returned To State Prison

Roseburg City Police took into custody over the weekend Ellis B. Thompson, 34, an escapee from the Oregon State Penitentiary, who has been returned to the prison.

Thompson escaped June 15 and had come into Roseburg after a 1950 pickup truck he was driving became involved in a minor accident near here, police report.

Police received a call on a suspicious check, passed at Howard's Men's Store, for \$21.16. The suspect received in exchange merchandise and cash. He then went across the street and obtained additional merchandise, paying cash at Howard's temporary store during remodeling.

Another check report came to officers from the Rexall Drug Store.

Thompson was located and questioned regarding the checks. He admitted to officers he was a prison escapee.

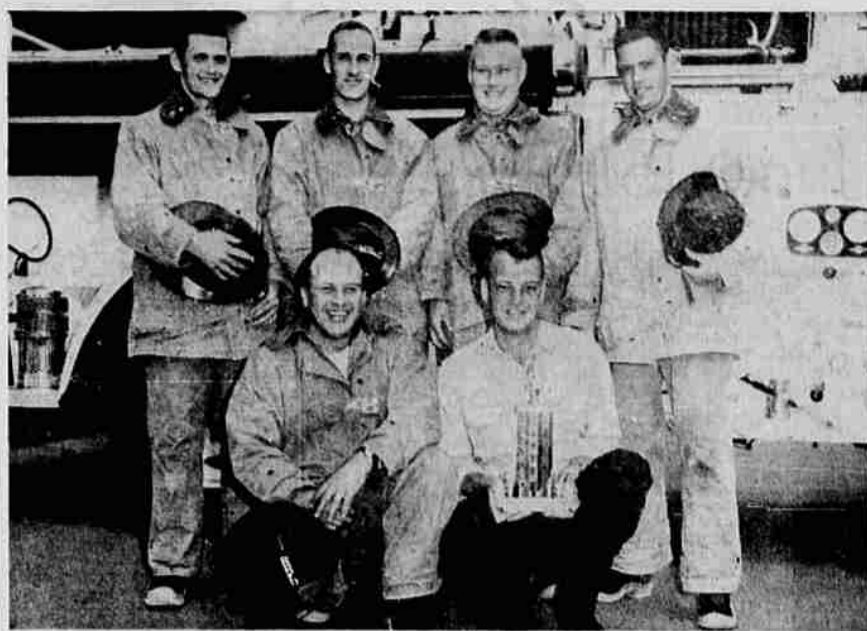
Accused Man Requests Preliminary Hearing

Public Hearing Set On Budget

A public hearing on the proposed Douglas County budget for fiscal 1964 (beginning July 1) will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday in the County Court auditorium.

There will be no election requirement on the county budget, as there is no tax levy outside the 6 per cent limitation.

Cutbacks in the Road Fund, as well as a \$106,000 cutback in the General Fund are noted in this year's budget. Prime cause of the cutbacks has been Hurricane Freida, which put a great deal of slowdown timber on the market and reduced the O&C payments to the county.

Major expenditure increases are in the juvenile department, for the pilot boys camp project at Winchester, and in the Health Department, for installation of sanitary landfills throughout the county.

Sidewalks Talked At Council Meeting

The poor condition of sidewalks in some areas of Roseburg came up for consideration at the City Council session Monday night.

What prompted the subject was a letter from Mrs. Lester Gale complaining about hazardous sidewalk conditions in an area south on SE Jackson from NE Klamath. Mrs. Gale said break-up of the walks caused by tree roots has made it dangerous for persons to use the walks. She said the dangerous sidewalk conditions have caused her to fall down three times in that area.

The council instructed City Manager Craig McMicken to investigate the complaint. City Attorney Paul Geddes pointed out the city has an ordinance requiring residents to keep walks in repair. Under this ordinance, the city can notify a property owner of a sidewalk condition which requires correction. If the property owner fails to comply within a reasonable length of time, the city can perform the work by its own action and charge the cost to the property owner.

It was noted, however, that conditions of sidewalk disrepair are prevalent in many areas of the town and a general improvement program is needed. But it was agreed that property owners should be required to repair those sidewalk conditions which are "clearly dangerous."

Feeder Sales Due

Wayne Mosher, secretary of the Douglas County Livestock Association, reports that the site for second of two feeder sales scheduled within the next month has not yet been selected.

He said an announcement would be made on the site in the near future. Meanwhile, the first of the sales will take place at the Douglas Livestock Market at Wilbur June 28.

Judge Hayes said this practice is common. Judges usually pile up a backlog of cases that they do not want to hear, because knowledge of the circumstances or acquaintance

with the participants might tend to admit prejudice. Also, the participants often want an outside judge to hear a particular case to eliminate possible partiality.

The practice is to accumulate such cases to be tried during a given period by outside judges on an exchange basis.

Outlook Improves For Water Supply

The water supply outlook for the Umpqua River basin has improved considerably from early in the year because of the comparatively late winter which hit the county.

The report comes from the U. S. Soil Conservation Service with offices at Oregon State University. Now it has been declared "about average" for lands served by stored water supplies.

However, late season water shortages are still expected for the county.

The late rains had the tendency to melt the already slim snow pack high on the watershed.

The North Umpqua River below Lemolo Reservoir is forecast at about 80 per cent of the May-September average.

The U. S. Navy Recruiting Station in Roseburg today announced a new recruiter will be reporting for duty in Roseburg.

The new recruiter, Chief Frederick J. Stoe, and his wife and four children are expected to arrive here early in July, Chief Bill Strika, officer in charge of the recruiting station, said.

Chief Triska will be reassigned to duty on the East Coast in October and Chief Chuck Dornis will become officer in charge of the Roseburg station.

the Tiller area were sold by the Umpqua National Forest supervisor's office Monday for slightly above the appraised prices.

The first was the Upper Boulder Sale on 128 acres 29 miles northeast of Tiller. Winning bidder Paul B. Hult Lumber Co. of Dillard paid \$189,685 for the tract appraised at \$189,570.

The bid was the appraised \$20.85 per thousand for 7,700,000 board feet of Douglas fir and \$9.05 per thousand for 2,500,000 board feet of white fir and other species appraised at \$9. The tract has a total volume of 10,200,000 board feet.

Other bidders were Coning Corp. of Roseburg and Oregon Veneer Co. of White City.

The second tract, the French Ridge Sale, was won by National Plywood Inc. of Roseburg. The tract contains 8,700,000 board feet and is located on 140 acres 39 miles northeast of Tiller.

The company paid the appraised \$21.65 per thousand for seven million feet of Douglas fir, the appraised \$5.60 per thousand for 1,450,000 board feet of sugar pine and other pine species and \$9 per thousand for 250,000 board feet of white fir and other species appraised at \$8.95.

Other bidders were Coning, Green Valley Lumber Inc. of Myrtle Creek, Oregon Veneer Co. and Sun Studs Inc.

Three more sales are being held today.
