

Italian Government May Be Short-Lived

ROME (UPI)—Emergency Premier Giovanni Leone Monday began his government's first—and possibly last—full week of official activity.

The chances appeared better than even that his minority government would fall soon after President Kennedy leaves town July 2. Kennedy is scheduled to arrive in Rome Sunday evening.

Leone was expected to go before Parliament Thursday or Friday to ask for a vote of confidence for his cabinet, which is composed entirely of Christian Democrats.

Political observers said debate on the confidence motion is likely to be broken off Saturday night and not be resumed again until after Kennedy's departure.

The experts complicate Blackwood by employing another convention known as Gerber along with it. Blackwood-Gerber players use four clubs as Gerber when it is apparent that they want to use four no-trump as a strong bid in no-trump.

bid the immediate raise to four no-trump is just a raise. The immediate bid of four clubs asks for aces.

Gerber after a no-trump opening has another advantage over Blackwood. Sometimes you will want to sign off at game of your partner doesn't show enough aces for a slam.

After North opens with one no-trump South wants to be in a small slam if North holds three aces and a grand slam if North holds all four of them and has a perfect hand to ask for aces by Gerber. It is not a perfect hand

Hoffa To Consider All Tax Angles In Wage Demands

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Teamsters' president James R. Hoffa said Monday he would weigh tax angles carefully before presenting wage demands to trucking firms this fall because union drivers are moving into higher tax brackets.

Hoffa said in an interview that he might await congressional action on President Kennedy's tax cut proposals before deciding how much of a pay increase to seek at the opening of negotiations in October.

If taxes are lowered, he indicated he might seek more pay and fewer fringe benefits in forthcoming bargaining.

Fringe benefits—pensions, medical care and similar contract provisions—often represent a better deal for a worker who pays a high percentage of income in taxes, Hoffa said.

"Our guys are going home with \$200 a week in their pockets," Hoffa said. "It may be better to put most of any increase we negotiate into fringes instead of wages."

Minimum Wage Set
The head of the nation's largest union said a nationwide minimum for truck drivers of \$3.03 an hour has now been established. Many road drivers could earn \$200 by working longer than 40 hours. Overtime is common in the trucking industry.

Hoffa showed no concern over his recent indictment on fraud and conspiracy charges in connection with loans made by the Teamsters' Central States Pension Fund.
