Japan Friendship Brings Young Man To Canyonville HS

After living nearly a year with Western hospitality, Shinge Nishiyama, who has lived with Supt. and Mrs. Norman York and children and attended Canyonville High School, will leave his American home for Kawaguchi, a suburb of Tokyo.

Shinge will leave Canyonville for San Francisco June 23 where he will board a Japan-bound oceanliner June 25. He will enjoy a stop at Hawaii before reaching Yokohama. The trip will take 15 days.

Shinge's visit to Canyonville was sponsored privately between the Yorks, who spent several years teaching in Japan before coming to Canyonville. York, superintendent of schools, made the arrangements through Masazo Horuchi, head master of Sugamo Gakuen school for boys.

During his year in America, Shinge successfully became a part of an American family and an American community. In addition to his school work he played basketball and baseball, and he played with the Babe Ruth ball team during the summer program. Shinge traveled to Baker for the state playoffs at the end of the football season. With the Yorks Shinge visited Crater Lake, Diamond Lake, Portland, and in Eugene he tried for his driver's license.

Shinge is naturally eager to go home to his family in Japan but he spoke enthusiastically of all the new experiences and impressions he has received. He is very grateful for his stay in America and expresses his appreciation for all who welcomed him into American community life.

During his stay Shinge's feelings were that of a son to Mr. and Mrs. York and a brother to their children Chris York, 11, and Keith York, 7. Shinge says he will never forget his year in America and looks forward to visiting as a college student someday.

When he arrives home Shinge will attend summer school where he will enroll in classes of chemistry, English, Japanese and Chinese.

Shinge will again become a part of a conservative Oriental family, but he will have had a deep, enriching experience from living in the United States, which will have made an indelible imprint upon his life.
