Yankees Back In Control; Angels Sweep Doublebill

Little man, what now?

A good question American League fans ask about Albie Pearson, the pint-sized outfielder who performed a herculean feat for the Los Angeles Angels.

Five-foot, 5-inch, 141-pound Albie is a cinch to be one of the American League's starting outfielders in this year's All-Star Game because if his rivals can overlook his tiny physique they can't overlook his .313 average.

But what's more important to the Angels, struggling to surge back into the thick of the American League pennant race, is that 22-year-old Albie from Alhambra, Calif., delivers when the team needs it most.

Like Wednesday night when the Angels whipped the Baltimore Orioles, 3-1 and 3-2, in a two-night doubleheader and vaulted past Cleveland and Baltimore into fifth place, 6½ games off the lead, Pearson singled and scored the Angels' first run of the opener and then tripled home the tying run and scored the winning run in the eighth inning of the nightcap.

Wins First Start
Paul Foytack, making his first start since acquired from Detroit, went 8 1/3 innings to win the opener and then Ken McBride pitched a three-hitter and struck out seven to score his ninth victory in the second game.

The New York Yankees took a one-game grip on first place as they beat the Chicago White Sox, 3-2, the Minnesota Twins downed the Detroit Tigers, 6-1, and the Boston Red Sox nipped the Cleveland Indians, 6-5, in other American League action.

Washington at Kansas City was rained out.

Bob Rodgers homered for the Angels in the first game and Leon Wagner hit No. 16 of the season and his first at home for Los Angeles. Pearson, who's had his ups and downs since winning the AL rookie of the year award in 1958, is batting .313 with 82 hits and 37 runs scored.

First Of Season
The Yankees beat the White Sox for the first time this season after four straight losses with the help of homers by Roger Maris and Tom Tresh. It was No. 16 of the year for Sir Roger, and Tresh also contributed a double to the Yankees' seven-hit attack on Gary Peters and Jim Brosnan. Whitey Ford, aided by Hal Reniff in the last 2 1/3 innings, got his 11th win of the season against three defeats.

Bob Allison of the Twins hit a pair of homers to take over the AL leadership with 19 homers, 52 runs batted in and 53 runs scored, and Earl Battey hit his 16th homer of the season in an attack that enabled Dick Stigman to score his sixth win. Gus Triandos homered for the Tigers' run.

Eddie Bressoud's second homer of the night came in the ninth inning and lifted relief pitcher Jack Lamabe to his fourth win without a loss for the Red Sox. Russ Nixon and Chuck Schilling also homered for the Red Sox while Joe Adcock connected for the Indians.

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)—Two of the last six American survivors in the men's singles division of the Wimbledon tennis championships crossed rackets today when Chuck McKinley met Arthur Ashe in a fourth round match.

It figured to be an interesting battle despite the fact McKinley is ranked No. 1 and Ashe is 18th in the current American rankings.

Ashe, the first American Negro male ever to play at Wimbledon, is a fast-rising court star. In last week's U.S. NCAA championships at Princeton, N.J., he dropped a thrilling, five-set semi-final match to Dennis Ralston, the eventual champion, who was eliminated in the third round here Wednesday.

Frank Froehling of Coral Gables, Fla., Jack Frost of Monterey, Calif., and Tom Edleson of Los Angeles were the other Yanks from an original 20-man entry who reached today's fourth round.

Froehling was pitted against Australia's Bob Howe today. Frost plays Britain's R. Taylor, and Edleson meets Jan Erik Lundquist, veteran Swedish Davis Cupper.

The sixth U.S. survivor, Herb Flam of Beverly Hills, Calif., resumes his third round match against Adrian Bey of Rhodesia. It was deadlocked in the fifth set when darkness halted play Wednesday.

Five of the seven Americans remaining in the women's singles also were scheduled to play today.

Seeded number one and two are Paul Herman of the U.S. Army, who won the rugged 10-event grind in 1961, and Steve Pauly of Oregon State. These men represented the United States in the meet against Russia at Stanford last summer.

Seeded third and fourth are Dave Edstrom of Oxnard AFB, and Phil Mulkey of Birmingham Ala. Edstrom, former Oregon star, named Mulkey at this year's Kansas Relays.

The large entry list has forced meet officials to run the competition in four flights, two each in the morning and afternoon.

The four top-seeded athletes will run in the last flight Friday and Saturday along with Dick Emberger of the Camp Pendleton, Calif. Marines and Russ Hughes of Oxnard Air Force Base.

Friday's slate will include the 100-meters, broad jump, shotput, high jump and 400 meters. While on Saturday, the events are 110-meter high hurdles, discus, pole vault, javelin and 1500 meters.

Strong Oregon Wrestling Team Begins Training
PORTLAND (UPI)—The strongest schoolboy wrestling team ever assembled in Oregon will gather at Clackamas High School Sunday (June 30) to begin training for international competition.

The 10-man squad will leave July 9 aboard Pan American jet transportation for a three-week tour of Japan in a cultural exchange program that will include nine competitive bouts.

A rugged two-day tournament earlier this month at Corvallis thinned a field of 46 qualifiers down to the chosen 10 for the trip. They will be accompanied to Japan by Coach John Duncan, Marshfield, and DeLancey Dunstan, Klamath Falls.

The contingent includes seven present and past state prep champions and six winners from the high school division of an AAU freestyle wrestling tournament at Corvallis in March.

One of the youngsters is of Japanese descent and two are foreigners. Rich Henjyoji, representing Oregon at 110 pounds, is the son of a Buddhist bishop of Portland.

Grant Humphrey, 130, was born in England and is the son of a Klamath Falls railroad engineer. And Henk Schenk, a rugged 180-pounder, is a native of Holland and son of a Silverton-Mount Angel area dairy farmer.

Lebanon boasts the only double representation. The state team champions landed Don Dykstra at 130 pounds and Don Kauffman at 190. There are 3 wrestlers from the Portland Interscholastic League one from suburban Portland and others from Rainier and Canby.

None have ever been to the Orient and few have wrestled internationally. Schenk was one of the few Oregon wrestlers to claim a win over his Japanese opponent last winter when a team of national champions toured this state.

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Dodgers, Cards Post Crucial Wins



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Gilliam Slaps Clutch Double As LA Trips Red-Hot Reds

Jim Gilliam resents being called "Junior" and so his Los Angeles Dodgers teammates refer to him simply as "the cool man."

No nickname could be more appropriate for a fellow who takes the world in stride. He's played in at least 144 games in every year he's been with the Dodgers since 1953, and yet every spring it seems he has to win his job all over again from some highly-touted newcomer.

Come the middle of a hot pennant race, however, and Gilliam is not only in the lineup day in and day out but also delivers the clutch hits that win important games. The kids who thought they had him beat out of a job in the spring read about 'em in the newspapers of minor league towns.

The National League pennant race is about as hot as it can get and so it's no surprise that Gilliam is red-hot. The Dodgers have won four straight games and Gilliam has delivered the game-winning blow in three of 'em, including Wednesday night when his two-run eighth-inning double sparked Los Angeles to a 5-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds. The victory completed a Dodger sweep of a three-game series—the first time they won three in a row in Cincinnati since 1953.

Wins Eighth Game
Left-handed relief ace Ron Peranoski shut out the Reds for the last 2 2/3 innings to win his eighth game against two losses.

Jim Maloney, seeking his 12th win, struck out 11 batters and went into the eighth inning with a 2-2 tie but a walk to Perranoski and Gordie Coleman's wild throw on a sacrifice attempt set the stage for Gilliam's big blow.

The victory enabled the Dodgers to remain a half-game behind the first-place St. Louis Cardinals, who topped the San Francisco Giants, 6-5. The Houston Colts beat the Milwaukee Braves, 7-2, in 13 innings, the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-2, and the New York Mets defeated the Chicago Cubs, 8-6, in other National League games.

Charlie James singled home George Altman with the winning run for the Cardinals. Bobby Shantz pitched to only one batter but picked up his third win. Ken Boyer drove in four runs with a homer and two singles for the Cardinals while Orlando Cepeda homered and Joe Amalfitano had three hits for the Giants.

Carl Warwick started the Colts' game-winning 13th-inning rally with his fourth single of the night and scored the tie-breaking run on Bob Lillis' single. The Colts, who snapped a 10-game losing streak, went on to add four runs and sew up Hal Woodeshick's seventh win. The Colts ended a string of 30 consecutive scoreless innings when Al Spangler homered in the sixth. Frank Bolling had three hits for the Braves.

Cal McLish pitched a six-hitter to win his sixth game for the Phillies and led Pittsburgh's Bob Friend his sixth defeat against nine wins. McLish, Johnny Callison, Tony Gonzalez and Frank Torre had two hits each in the Phillies' attack while Donn Clendenon and Bill Virdon had two hits each for the Pirates.

Diamond Lake Angling Remains Excellent
PORTLAND (UPI)—The weekly report on fishing conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

Northwest: Spring Chinook tapering off in Tillamook Bay but reported in larger tributaries; trout angling only fair in most streams and lakes in coast area; McKenzie River recently stocked; Cascade lakes have been slow.

Southwest: Diamond Lake remains good; summer steelhead angling in North Umpqua only fair; Loon Lake producing limits of rainbow and cutthroat with triple teaser lures; upper Rogue above Gold Ray good for Chinook; lower Rogue poor for salmon.

Central: Deschutes has been poor to fair in Maupia area; Clear Lake has been fair to good; Prineville Reservoir slow; Crooked River good for evening fly fishing; East and Paulina lakes fair to good; Crane Prairie good trolling flies.

Northeast: North Fork John Day River above Dale good for planted rainbow; Mayague Lake good in evenings; McKay Reservoir good for small trout; Imnaha River high and angling slow.

Southeast: Upper Brownlee Reservoir slow; stream fishing good in Harney district.

Oregon's Bighorn Herd Grows Rapidly
Almost one lamb of each bighorn ewe is the report from this year's bighorn sheep counters according to the Oregon Game Commission.

Dave Luman, chief big game biologist for the commission, and four other commission personnel made the annual count on June 20. After traversing the 1,000-acre pen on Hart mountain and the adjacent rimrocks, the hikers
