Ranch Ramblings

Thursday and Friday this week we are shipping the first shipment of wool from the Douglas County Wool Pool for 1963.

We hope that by early July we will be able to ship all of the wool in the pool. We expect to pay out 56 cents a pound on the wool pool this year. The pool sale price was \$56.29 a hundred pounds, and the 29 cents a hundred pounds will cover all the costs of pooling, including loading the cars, postage and other sale costs.

Those of you who are in this first shipment should receive your checks sometime next week for the wool. The First National Bank of Roseburg does the job of bookkeeping for us, and consequently, tries to fit it in with our other schedules, so sometimes we don't get them out right away, but it shouldn't be over a few days.

Feeder Sales Due
Tomorrow, June 28, is the first of the feeder sales sponsored by the Livestock Association. It will be held at the Douglas Livestock Market in Wilbur. We will be sorting for both fat and feeder lambs, and we'll sell ewes and yearlings. The feeders will be sorted into "light" and "heavy" feeders.

We intend to hold a second feeder sale, and probably will decide at a later date where we will locate the sale. But we do plan to hold one on Thursday, July 18. Each man's consignment will be sold separately. The association is hiring Prosser, Clark of Benson, Bodine & Clark, and Al Burda of Allstot & Jensen of Portland to sort the lambs for the sale. They will be responsible for sorting all of the lambs in the sale.

Sale time is at 1 p.m. We hope you will get your lambs in early. We will try to sell them in the order in which they come in. If you have any questions, feel free to call on either the Livestock Association at OR 2311 Extension 46, or the Douglas Livestock Market at OR 24071.

Time Probably Best
Part of our reason for holding this late June sale is that we feel that many of our growers would be better off to get rid of all of their lambs around the end of June and the first of July. In most cases, when the feed starts to dry out, the lambs don't do very well, and leaving them on the ewes past this time often drags the ewe down to the point where she doesn't do as well next year. Also, the lambs are eating feed that could just as well be going into carrying more ewes.

It isn't very often that an increase in price after this time will make the feeders more valuable than they are now. While there is an increase in price around the first of September to the first of October, most of the lambs lose enough weight during this period of time that there isn't any money made. Remember the dates of those feeder sales, Friday, June 29, and Thursday, July 18.

The Livestock Association is also sponsoring a Ram Sale with the Lane County Livestock Association, and this will be held in Roseburg on Saturday, July 13.

Oakland residents are urged to support the drive by contributing old or unneeded clothing.

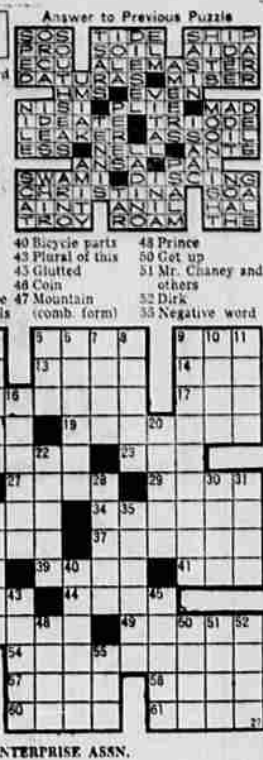
CAB CUTS SUBSIDIES
