Dam Scheduled For Dynamiting

SPOKANE (UPI)—The Washington Water Power Co. announced recently it plans to dynamite a dam out of the south fork of the Clearwater River in Idaho.

Company officials said Grangeville Dam, one of the oldest hydroelectric projects, will be blown out sometime next month.

The dam is being removed in cooperation with a steelhead restoration project of the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

John R. Woodworth, department director, said restoration of the steelhead runs will continue for at least five years. Fishways at the dam were destroyed by high water in 1949 and were not replaced.

George Brunzell, WWP president, said the dynamiting of the dam will be a "first" for both fish and game administrators and utility executives.

"To the best of my knowledge, an operating power plant has never been removed in the interest of a fisheries program," he said.

Brunzell said the age of the dam and the obsolescence of its equipment made its removal practical. The dam was put in service in 1911 and WWP took it over in 1937 from the Chelan Electric Co.

There is one major difference between the experts use of Blackwood and the average player's. The average player feels that he must use Blackwood to bid a slam.

response to the opening club bid. No expert would. The expert would reason that if partner showed one ace he wouldn't be sure that he could make six, that if partner showed two aces he wouldn't know about seven, and that even if partner showed no aces six might be cold.

Instead, the expert would probably make the bid shown in the box and jump right to six spades. He would reason that if his partner held two aces and the king of spades he would bid seven and he would reason further that irrespective of what his partner held there would be a good play to make six.

This time South makes six against an ace of diamonds opening and seven against any other lead. But even if South did not hold the king of diamonds he might make a heart or even a club or a spade whereupon South would romp home with a grand slam.

Pope Paul To Provide Meals For Convicts

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI will mark his coronation Sunday by offering special meals to prison inmates in Rome, Milan and other Italian cities, a high Vatican source reported Thursday.

The source said it was not immediately known who would represent the Pope at the luncheons in the prisons. The pontiff himself was not planning to visit any of the jails on his coronation day.

The gesture was reminiscent of the charitable interest in prisoners taken by Pope Paul's predecessor, the late John XXIII.

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
