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Goldwater Raps Moral Bankruptcy Of Liberal Politicians

Party Girls Admit Affairs With Profumo, Ivanov, Astor

LONDON (UPI) — Playgirls Christine Keeler and Marilyn Rice-Davies told a court today they had sexual relations with Britain's war minister, a Soviet diplomat and Lord Astor.

Miss Keeler, 21, testifying at a sensational pre-trial hearing of vice charges against society osteopath Dr. Stephen Ward, said she had sexual relations with resigned War Minister John Profumo and on "one occasion" with former Soviet Naval Attache Capt. Eugene Ivanov.

She said Profumo gave her gifts and money "for my mother."

Her friend, 18-year-old Marilyn, then testified she had had sexual intercourse with Lord Astor, 55-year-old son of Virginia-born Lady Nancy Astor.

The testimony of the two girls provided shocking new details of a scandal that has shaken the upper structure of British society.

Miss Keeler, 21, a central figure in the Profumo scandal that has rocked the British government, was the first witness called by the prosecution in the vice trial of Dr. Stephen Ward, a society osteopath and artist.

Thousand Screaming Teen-Age Girls Mob Kennedy In Ireland

CORK, Ireland (UPI) — President Kennedy flew to this former hotbed of rebellion today for another rousing welcome by Irishmen trying to outshine each other in honoring a "favorite son."

Anything Dublin can do, Cork can do better," one Cork resident said as the President arrived by helicopter from Dublin.

At least 60,000 persons — three-fourths of the population of Ireland's "second city" — turned out to cheer and wave Irish and American flags at a smiling, happy Kennedy.

Viet Nam Post Due For Lodge

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy is sending a leading Republican to a diplomatic post in a country regarded by the State Department as one of the decisive battlegrounds of modern history.

Kennedy announced Thursday in Dublin that he intends to nominate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., former U.N. ambassador and 1960 GOP vice presidential candidate, as American ambassador to Viet Nam.

Lodge will take over the post in Saigon this fall, succeeding Frederick E. Nolting Jr.

State Schedules Highway Project

SALEM (UPI) — The State Highway Commission Thursday announced plans to reconstruct the Pacific Highway — Interstate 5 — from Roberts Mountain to Myrtle Creek in Douglas County.

The proposed construction is 9.18 miles long.

Plans call for revising of interchanges at Clarks Branch Road, Dillard Highway, Boomer Hill Road and Myrtle Creek.

Young Tobacco Man Guilty In Death Of Negro Waitress

HAGERSTOWN, Md. (UPI) — The youthful operator of a big tobacco farm was found guilty Thursday of manslaughter and assault in the death of a Negro waitress he cussed and cursed at a society ball.

William Devereaux Zantinger, 24, accused of striking the woman with a toy cane and using abusive, profane language to address her, was convicted by a three-judge circuit court panel sitting without a jury.

Attorneys for the husky Zantinger, who runs a 1,200-acre farm at Mount Victoria in southern Maryland, were given until Tuesday to file motions for a new trial. The court deferred sentencing until they took the action.

West Officials Alert For Red Surprises

LONDON (UPI) — U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk and top British officials, alert for possible surprises from Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, today worked on an agenda for the weekend "summit" meeting between President Kennedy and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Rusk planned to meet Foreign Secretary Lord Home for a "working lunch" at the latter's private residence.

Other ministers and top officials, including the President's assistant for security affairs, planned to fly in from Paris to participate in preparations for Kennedy's 23-hour visit with Macmillan at Birch Grove, Kennedy will arrive from Ireland on Saturday.

Five Persons Killed In Leap From Building

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI) — Five persons died jumping from windows of a burning 22-story office building today in the heart of Rio's movie district.

Firemen rescued scores of persons from the blazing building but said others were trapped inside.

The fire broke out at noon on the seventh floor and flames rapidly isolated upper floors. Three men and two women, all identified as Brazilians, were killed when they jumped but missed firemen's nets.

Pope's Message To Khrush Asks Contribution To Peace

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope Paul VI has told Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev in a message made public today he prays that the Russian people may make an important contribution to world progress and peace.

The Pope, in a message made public today, made the statement in reply to one from Khrushchev congratulating the new pontiff on his election last Friday. The Vatican press office released the Pope's message today but said it did not know when it was sent.

Marvin Williams, business agent for the International Woodworkers of America in Roseburg, said today the IWA will begin taking applications for strike relief by employees of U.S. Plywood Corp. in Roseburg on July 1, 2 and 3.

U.S. Plywood Corp. has been the only plant in the Roseburg area that has struck in the Roseburg area. Workers at the U.S. Plywood plant left their jobs and began picketing the plant June 5.

U. S. Has Deserted Rebels Says Castro

HAVANA (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro declared Thursday night that his army is launching a "final sweep" against rebels in Cuba who he said have been "abandoned" by the United States.

"They who believed that imperialism (the United States) would arrive to impose its rule, have been abandoned to their fate," Castro said in an hour-and-46-minute speech broadcast by Radio Havana.

Unions Threaten Spread Of Strike

PORTLAND (UPI) — Leaders of two Northwest lumber unions threatened more strikes today in a lumber industry dispute that already has idled some 19,000 workers.

The announcement was made after the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) reported no progress in contract talks with the "Big Six" employer group, composed of St. Regis Paper, U.S. Plywood, Weyerhaeuser, International Paper, Crown Zellerbach and Rayonier.

IWA Regional President Harvey Nelson told newsmen Thursday his union modified its demands on travel time for loggers during Thursday's talk. He said the union also rejected an employer offer concerning weekend working hours. There was no mention of wage discussions.

The meeting was recessed subject to call by either side or by federal mediators.

Unions Stick Together

Officials of the IWA and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW), which also is involved in the dispute, said the two unions would work together to bring the strike to a successful conclusion.

They struck St. Regis and U.S. Plywood plants in Oregon, Washington and Northern California June 5 and the other four members of the "Big Six" shut down in retaliation.

Senator Says City Machines Are Disgrace

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — It had all the flavor and color of a Republican presidential nominating convention.

"The man who" was there. Delegates roared their approval of him. They brandished banners, buttons and books during repeated interruptions of a speech by the nation's conservative standard bearer, Sen. Barry Goldwater.

Goldwater, addressing the national Young Republican convention Thursday lashed out at liberals and President Kennedy.

"It is the moral bankruptcy of the liberal politicians which is causing the young people to move toward the Republican party," the Arizona Republican senator said.

"They are the reactionaries. They haven't had a new idea for 30 years."

He said the liberals are obsessed with economic solutions for all problems and have entered into a "cynical alliance" with big city political bosses.

Goldwater also aimed a gibe at the President's trip to Europe. He noted that the leader of the Frontier is in Ireland. "I don't know what troubles they have there, but we have a lot of 'em here and he ought to be home taking care of them."

He told the crowd between cheers that America's military chiefs should be asked for their opinions on the U. S. nuclear test ban proposals.

Goldwater's speech followed a prediction by former California GOP Sen. William F. Knowland that the Republicans could carry the South in the next election and did not need to win either New York or California to elect a president.

Knowland, editor and assistant publisher of the Oakland (Calif.) Tribune, told the convention that "there is no Southern state we need to concede to the New Frontier."

The Young Republican convention, now in its final day, was scheduled later today to elect a new national chairman to succeed Len Nadassny of Minneapolis, Minn. The two principal candidates were Charles McDevitt of Boise, Idaho, and Donald Lukens of Washington, D.C.
