

## Roseburg Adventist Pastor Moving To Medford Church

Elder A. P. Ritz, pastor of the Roseburg Seventh-day Adventist Church since July 1960, has accepted an appointment to pastor the Adventist Church at Medford. He will assume his duties about Aug. 1.

Elder E. Brown of the North Spokane Adventist Church will assume his pastoral duties here about that same date.

Elder Ritz preached his final sermon here last Saturday. He, his wife and daughter, Karen, are on a brief vacation this week prior to attending the camp meeting at Gladstone in July. The Ritz's came

to Roseburg from the Gold Beach district.

**Leadership Grows**  
Under Pastor Ritz's leadership the church membership has grown

from a little less than 400 to more than 500. The new church on Garden Valley Blvd., built under the leadership of Elder W. R. Riston (who was transferred to Portland), was completed and dedicated after Elder Ritz became pastor.

The Adventists currently have under way the large project of building a new elementary school plant on NW Calkins Road. This is scheduled for occupancy in time for school opening in September.

The Ritz family spent 20 years in Seventh-day Adventist mission work in the Orient — six in Malaya and 14 in Thailand. He has served 35 years in the gospel ministry, besides having taught in the church's schools five years, sandwiched in with his training at Walla Walla College as a minister.

**Experience Varied**  
Mrs. Ritz, a registered nurse, besides assisting her husband, has helped part-time at Riversdale Sanitarium. She is a graduate of the Portland Sanitarium and Hospital's School of Nursing. In the Orient she had charge of the surgery department of Penang Hospital for four years and a year in the Adventist hospital in Singapore. She taught surgical nursing in the church's training school in Bangkok, Thailand.

The Ritz's have a son, Halden, in California; a daughter, Mrs. James (Janice) Jay, whose husband has just completed his medical training at Loma Linda University, Calif., and is assuming his work as an intern at Portland Sanitarium and Hospital July 1, and Karen Lotus, a junior at Milo Academy last year.

## United Nations Still Has Many Financial Woes

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) —Diplomats agreed today that the financial formula adopted by the General Assembly failed to settle many problems that will plague the United Nations again in six months.

Secretary General Thant scheduled a news conference today, and he was expected to express his opinions on the emergency fiscal plan approved by the 11-nation assembly Thursday.

The news conference was scheduled for 11 a.m., EDT.

The most obvious problem left unsolved was the adamant refusal of Russia and its Communist allies to pay for the Congo and Middle East peace-keeping operations despite the overwhelming assembly acceptance that such payments are binding on all members.

The communists and France were the only serious dissenters Thursday when the assembly approved the seven-part financial program, winding up a 45-day special session called to deal with the money crisis.

The program, aimed at erasing the \$100 million deficit and improving peace-keeping financing in the future, included resolutions which:

—Declared that the financing of peace operations is collective responsibility of all members, and set forth other principles for the future.

—Appropriated \$42.5 million to continue the Congo and Middle East operations until the end of this year.

—Sought to collect the arrears of approximately \$100 million owed by delinquent members for peace activities.

—Extended the sale of U. N. bonds until next Dec. 31.

—Asked Thant to study establishment of a "peace fund" open to subscription by governments, institutions and individuals.

—Continued a 21-nation working group with instructions to report to the 1964 assembly on a permanent plan for financing peace operations.

The 11-nation Soviet bloc vote was solid, opposition on each measure, France voted with the Communist bloc on most issues.

## Roseburg Area Phone Books To Be Delivered Next Week

The 1963-64 telephone directory for Camas Valley, Glide, Roseburg, Sutherlin, Oakland and Winston-Dillard will be delivered next week, starting Wednesday, according to Cliff Thomas, Pacific Northwest Bell manager here.

Some 16,400 copies of the directory will go to Douglas County homes and businesses in the four-day period ending Saturday (July 6), in time for the start of the all-numeral phone numbering system at 12:01 on July 7.

**Cards Due**  
Also going to subscribers, via the mailman, are new seven-digit numbers will have the prefix 459 dials. These should arrive by the

end of next week also, Thomas said. The adhesive cards are designed to be placed on the phone right over the old number in the center of the dial.

The cards will convert phone numbers from the present letter-numeral combination to seven numerals in Roseburg, Glide and Winston-Dillard.

Sutherlin and Oakland phone numbers will have the prefix 459 added to their present four digits. Camas Valley phones will remain as they are until November when a new dial central office building goes into service there.

**Scenes Shown**  
The cover of the new phone book features fill color scenes of the vista from Otter Crest, a fisherman on the Deschutes and the colorful John Day canyon. They combine to urge Oregonians to "See all of Oregon."

Thomas urged everyone to jot police, fire and other emergency service numbers in the spaces provided inside the front cover of the phone book. Small pictures of appropriate emergency vehicles have been printed next to these spaces to aid quick identification.

## Udall Says Kennedy-Goldwater Contest Might Be Beneficial To United States

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Interior Secretary Stewart Udall feels a 1964 contest between President Kennedy and Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., "might be a healthy thing for the country."

The resulting battle for the presidency would be "an old-fashioned campaign between conflicting political concepts, something we haven't had for some time," according to Udall.

The interior secretary, a liberal Democrat from Goldwater's home state, told a news conference Thursday that the Republican party might do well to nominate the conservative GOP senator.

Udall said selection of Goldwater "would pit a true conservative — a nominee carrying a conservative banner — against our President and the record he has made."

He said Goldwater "apparently represents the view of the party" and nomination of such a candidate by the Republicans would be something the GOP "hasn't done in 20 years."

Udall's comments came while the senator was in San Francisco to speak to the national Young Republican convention, which has demonstrated strong backing for Goldwater.

Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., meanwhile told a news conference Thursday that whoever seeks the GOP nomination "will find it desirable and even necessary" to have the backing of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Republican National Chairman William E. Miller also said at a Senate hearing he hoped there would be another series of televised "great debates" between the Democratic and Republican candidates next year.

Miller testified in favor of suspending the "equal time" provision of broadcast laws to make this possible. Kennedy already has said he will debate the GOP candidate on television as he did with Vice President Richard M. Nixon in 1960.

**Declines Senate Race**  
Udall's comments on Goldwater's candidacy came when he was asked whether he planned to run for the Senate against the

Republican senator next year. The interior secretary said he had no such plans. "I am very happy where I am. I am not expecting a change in my status here," he said.

Goldwater's Senate term expires next year, and he has said he will announce his intentions sometime early in 1964.

Scott called Eisenhower the head of the GOP and said an endorsement from the former president would prove valuable to anyone hoping to win the nomination. He intimated Eisenhower would be active in the 1964 GOP campaign, but refused to say what part the former president would play.

**Lists Candidates**  
Scott listed eight GOP candidates he said might run for president: Goldwater, Gov. George M. Romney of Michigan, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, Sen. Thurston B. Morton, Ky., Gov. William W. Scranton of

Pennsylvania, Gov. Mark A. Hatfield of Oregon, Gen. Lucius Clay and former NATO commander-in-chief Gen. Lauris Norstad.

Regarding Scranton, the Pennsylvania senator said he believed the governor "prefers to limit his activities to a favorite son status" to keep the state delegation independent until it decides on a national candidate.

In Harrisburg, Pa., Thursday, Scranton denied that a favorite son role for himself would be designed to prevent Goldwater from winning the Pennsylvania delegation.

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## White City Bidder Gets Umpqua Tract

An Umpqua National Forest timber sale in the high country Thursday brought a bid almost \$80,000 above the appraised price from a White City bidder.

Steve O. Wilson offered a total bid of \$277,630 for 12,500,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$198,630. The tract was the Clear Creek Sale 70 miles east of Roseburg on 203 acres.

Appraisals for the different species were: 7,100,000 board feet of Douglas fir, \$18.50 per thousand; 600,000 feet of white pine, sugar pine and ponderosa pine, \$20.15; 2,100,000 feet of Shasta red fir and Noble fir, \$8.70; 2,700,000 feet of white fir and other species, \$7.80.

Wilson bid \$28 per thousand for Douglas fir, the appraised \$20.15 for the pine group; \$13.50 for Shasta and Noble fir and \$13.60 for white fir and other species.

The only other bidder was Douglas Vener Co. of Roseburg.

Three more sales are scheduled today.
