Oklahoma City's Brunet Fires Shutout Against Spokane In Pacific Coast Game

Pitcher George (Hooks) Brunet of Oklahoma City has finally found himself. If he continues the type of mound performances he has shown in his last four outings, he'll be due for a return ticket to Houston of the National League.
Thursday night he fired his third shutout of the current Pacific Coast League campaign and second on a row. He gave but five hits in winning his sixth decision in eight starts. His latest victim was Northern Division's second place Spokane to the tune of 4-0.
Earlier in the year he had a shutout, then had another on June 16 and on June 22 gave up a single run to Denver. So, in his last four games he has given up but one run.

Gary Player, Eggers, Winger Take Lead In First Round Of Cleveland Open Tourney

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Gary Player, who always is in contention, and two dark horses, Bill Eggers and Bo Winger, led the field by a stroke going into the second round of the \$110,000 Cleveland Open golf tournament today with Jack Nicklaus and favored Arnold Palmer trailing by two and five strokes, respectively.
The little South African, the red-haired Eggers and the 40-year-old Winger fired five-under par 68's—all of them wielding hot putters—in the first round Thursday to lead former PGA champion Lionel Hebert, Moon Mullins and Dave Hill by a shot.
The golf was as hot as the heat which seared the 6,618-yard Beechmont Country Club course as 42 players in the 150-man field broke par 35-36-71 and 27 equalled it.
Player felt he would have shot a 26 going out except for bogeying the ninth hole.
"I was putting the best I've ever putted and I really felt like I was going to have an exceptional round," he said. "But then I three-putted from 20 feet on the ninth hole and wound up paring the 10th when I should have had a birdie."
"That bogey on the ninth really upset me and I really never got going again."
Player had five birdies and two bogeys on the front nine for a 32 and two birdies on the back for a 34. The 30-year-old Eggers, using a 19-year-old brassie given to him when he was a boy, overcame the putting jitters which used to bother him as he carded a 33-33 while Winger, whose golfing luck has turned better after an African elephant safari last fall, had nines of 34 and 32.
Their total of 66 put them two shots ahead of Nicklaus, Tony Lema, Mike Souchak, Sam Snead, Jim Ferrier, Gordon Jones, Chi Chi Rodriguez and Frank Boynton.
U. S. Open champion Julius Boros, Jacky Cupit, Art Wall, Bob Goalby, Jackie Burke and Doug Ford were among 11 tied at 69 while the 70 group included former U.S. champion Gene Littler, Canadian Stan Leonard, Billy Maxwell, Jay Hebert and Jim Ferrie.
While the trio of leaders putted superbly, Palmer couldn't get his putter going as he was bracketed with 26 others at even par 71.
"The whole answer," he said, "is I've got the putting jumps."
Eggers, from Portland, Ore., had 33 on each nine. Bob Dudeney and Bob Rosburg of Portland had 71's and Tom Shaw a 72.

Berth On "Russia Team" To Be Won At Corvallis

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — A national championship and two berths on the U.S. track team which will compete in Moscow next month were the prizes sought by 25 athletes as the national AAU decathlon championships opened today.
Most track experts predicted a four-man battle among Paul Herman of the U.S. Army, Steve Pauley of Oregon State University, Dave Edstrom of the Air Force and Phil Mulkey of Birmingham, Ala.
The meet lost some of its glamor when world record-holder C. K. Yang of UCLA withdrew last weekend to take part in a European tour for his native Formosa. Yang's action undoubtedly made the championship battle much closer, however.
None of the entrants is expected to approach his world record of 9,121 points. Herman's 8,061 is the best this year by any of the competitors.
Mulkey, the former Memphis State star, scored 8,709 in 1961 but finished second to ex-Oregon Spike star Edstrom in this spring's Kansas Relays.
Competition was to be held in the 100 meters, broad jump, shot put, high jump and 400 meters today at Oregon State University's Bell Field. Saturday's schedule includes the pole vault, the 110-meter high hurdles, discus, javelin and 1,500-meter run.
Cool, partly cloudy weather with a possibility of showers was forecast both days.

Yang Sets Six European Meets

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Decathlon star C. K. Yang of UCLA and Bruin coach Ducky Drake leave Saturday on the first leg of their flight to Europe where the Nationalist China athlete will compete in six meets.
The pair will depart New York by plane Sunday. First competition for the world's record holder in the decathlon will be Zurich, Switzerland, Tuesday.
Yang, bothered by injuries in recent weeks, will compete in three events—the high hurdles, pole vault and javelin—during the two weeks in Europe. Other countries include Germany, Sweden and England.

Synthetic Runway Due For Test At Harness Racing Card Tonight

WASHINGTON, Pa. (UPI) — Harness racing experts from throughout the world will be on hand tonight to study a synthetic runway at the opening of The Meadows, the first pari-mutuel race track in western Pennsylvania.
Johnny Simpson, a driver, said after a recent tryout that the track surface amazed him. He is a three-time winner of the Little Brown Jug, which is the Kentucky Derby of harness racing.
"I liked the surface when I first rode on it in its experimental stage, and I like it even better on a full track," Simpson said.
The \$15,000 Arden Downs Stake for three-year-old pacing colts is the highlight of the 10-card program tonight. Officials at The Meadows believe the winning time for the feature will be under two minutes because of the synthetic surface.
Simpson will drive Gene Hill, a colt which ran the mile in 2:03 3-5 last week.
Two trots and seven paces also are on the card.
Other entries in the feature race are George Sholly driving Delightful Time, Del Insko behind Meadow Hal, Lou Huber Jr. driving Diamond Sam, Bill Houghton guiding Max Hanover, Stanley Dancer with Majestic Hanover, Harold Warner behind Tarpot Doug, and Harold Beissinger driving Parking Time.
Diamond Sam, third choice in the betting for tonight's feature, has been clocked in 2:02 on a mile track.
The favorite, Majestic Hanover, won seven events in a row as a two-year-old last year before suffering an injury. He underwent surgery and will be making his first start of 1963. Oddsmakers rate him at 3-1 in the Arden Downs Stake. Max Hanover is listed at 7-2 and Diamond Sam at 4-1.

Buffalo, N.Y. (UPI) — The American Football League moved into the potential "trading" phase of its three-day summer meeting today after repeating a pledge to help revitalize the weakened New York Jets and Oakland Raiders. Coaches and general managers met with Commissioner Joe Foss, and the possibility of several player trades loomed large. A league official said the fact "no-body was saying anything" indicated that numerous changes in personnel were in the works.
In May, the league initiated an equalization program aimed at building up the two cellar-dwelling clubs. A special draft proved disappointing and the second part of the equalization plan—giving New York and Oakland first choice of players released by the American, National and Canadian leagues—brought rumors of discontent within the AFL.
Thursday, following a 9 1/2-hour non-stop meeting, Foss silenced those grumblings.
"There is no change in the original format drawn up at New York May 11 in which New York and Oakland will have 30 days to accept or reject castoffs from any professional league," Foss said.
Speaking for the owners, Foss said the future of the league is "terrific." The general feeling after three years of operation is one of solidarity, he said.
