Wall That Reds Built Is Rocked By Blasts In Greeting To Nikita

Russ Chief's Arrival Seen As Big Flop

BERLIN (UPI) — Anti-Communists rocked Berlin's Red-built wall with explosives today in an apparent gesture of defiance against Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Khrushchev arrived in Communist East Berlin Friday and was expected to hold an Eastern bloc summit leaders meeting there early next week.

The explosion blew a hole about two feet by seven feet through the six-foot-high wall at a point about 250 yards from the Checkpoint Charlie crossing point between West and East Berlin and only a half mile from the Soviet Embassy.

It was doubtful whether Khrushchev heard the explosion, however. He was visiting a machine tool factory in East Berlin at the time.

This was the 17th explosion at the wall since it was built Aug. 13, 1961.



The Communist-controlled East German press attempted in huge Red headlines to claim it was a "triumph for peace." But Western newsmen and the West Berlin newspapers were unanimous in agreeing that as a show intended apparently to "out-Kennedy Kennedy" it was a flop.

Two satellite Communist leaders arrived in East Berlin this morning. They were Czechoslovak President Antonin Novotny, and Hungarian Premier János Kadar.

Polish Communist party chief Wladyslaw Gomulka is due Sunday and Bulgarian Premier Todor Zhivkov also is on his way.

The only East bloc leader not mentioned as coming was Romanian Premier Gheorghiu-Dej.

The purported reason for this Eastern bloc get-together was to celebrate East German Communist boss Walter Ulbricht's 70th birthday Sunday.

Young GOP Elects Goldwater Booster

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The National Young Republicans today had a chairman who supports Barry Goldwater for president, agrees with the objective of the Liberty Amendment to abolish the federal income tax, and believes that the United States should pull out of the United Nations.

Donald E. (Buz) Lukens, 32, Washington, D.C., Friday edged another conservative, Charles McDevitt, 31, Boise, Idaho, after a wild three-hour convention battle that ended with a 318-305 vote for the winner on the second ballot.

McDevitt lacked only two ballots of winning a majority on the first ballot, but the tide turned when Robert Gaston of Los Angeles, the head of the California delegation, withdrew as a candidate himself and tossed his votes to Lukens.

Fighting Marks Balloting

The balloting was marked by several fights with sergeants at arms and a number of boisterous demonstrations. Squads of sergeants at arms had to protect the outgoing chairman, Len Nadasny of Minneapolis, Minn., on the rostrum from shouting, fist-waving delegates.

Although Lukens said after his election that he would back any GOP presidential nominee in 1964, he is definitely committed to Goldwater and thus becomes the first year chairman in recent history to name a preference before the nominating convention.

It was his "100 per cent" endorsement of the Arizona senator to the California delegation early Wednesday that was seen by observers as the reason for the California delegation's support for him Friday.

McDevitt, an Idaho state legislator who drew most of his support from the big industrial states, maintained the traditional neutrality as to his choice of candidates.

Call For Unity

Following the wild election battle, speakers on all sides early Friday called for unity in the fight against the Democrats.

ATHENS, Ga. (UPI)—A car veered out of control as it approached a bridge in a rainstorm Friday and plunged into the flooded Oconee River where 8 of its 10 occupants drowned.

Passing motorists jumped into the river and saved the driver of the car, Mrs. Montine Barnett, 50, and her grandson, Jerry Greene, 10. The rescuers talked to the other persons in the car but the swift current swept the vehicle away before they could be saved.

VISITS GRAVE

Kennedy Wraps Up Conquest Of Erin

WADDINGTON, RAF Station, England (UPI)—President Kennedy flew here from Ireland today to pay an unexpected visit to his elder sister Kathleen's grave before opening weekend talks with Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

The President's big Boeing 707 jet landed at this Lincolnshire bomber base at 3:22 p.m. (10:22 a.m. EDT) after a 395-mile flight from Shannon, Ireland.

Kennedy took off immediately by helicopter for the grave, which is located some 40 miles from Waddington in the village churchyard at Edensor, on the Chatsworth estate.

The President was returning to Waddington by helicopter after paying his respects. Then he was continuing his flight to Gatwick Airport where Macmillan was waiting to greet him.

Unscheduled visit to the grave came after another day of triumph in Ireland, where the President wound up a three-day visit with the strains of "Come Back to Erin" ringing in his ears and a promise to return some day in the future.

With the President in the helicopter from Waddington were his two sisters, Mrs. Jean Smith and Mrs. Eunice Shriver. Also along was Mrs. K. L. Billings, friend of the President from New York.

As Lady Hartington, the President's late sister, Kathleen was killed on May 3, 1948, when a chartered airplane in which she was riding crashed at Privus, France.

Her husband, the Marquis of Hartington and eldest son and heir to the 10th Duke of Devonshire, was killed in action in France in 1944.

Kennedy's trip to Kathleen's grave was strictly a private affair.

He wanted no advance notice and the few White House correspondents traveling on the plane to Waddington with him and in an accompanying press plane were not taken long to Edensor.

Autopsy Shows Strychnine Dose

The Oregon State Laboratory reports examinations of tissue of the body of Linda Marie Gaylor, 21, of Roseburg, contained lethal doses of strychnine. Medical Examiner Dr. A. B. Munroe has been informed.

Mrs. Gaylor, the wife of James Robert Gaylor, was found dead by her husband on his return from work at Glide Wednesday. An autopsy performed locally by Dr. Robert Swata failed to disclose a cause of death, so laboratory samples of tissue were sent to the state laboratory.

It probably will take a couple of weeks to get the full report, it was indicated. The sheriff's department found a bottle which is believed to have contained strychnine in the Gaylor home at 2877 Parker Rd.

Funeral services for Mrs. Gaylor will be held today at 4:30 p.m. at Wilson's Chapel of the Roses.

Self-Renewal Is Urged For R-C Chapter

Dr. Ben Padrow, a Portland State College professor and official of the Multnomah County Red Cross chapter, urged the Douglas County chapter Friday night to make itself a "self-renewing organization" in order to continue growth.

He was the featured speaker at the annual meeting of the chapter in the Elks Temple. The meeting was given double meaning because the American Red Cross movement is celebrating its centennial.

Padrow told the approximately 60 people present that Americans appear to be assuming "this free society is a free and easy society."

He said the self-renewing faculty depends on a process of renewal and rebirth—"one of new discoveries."

In order to avoid stultification, he said, the chapter must learn to avoid the things which work against rebirth. He cited them as lack of flexibility and "an underbrush of procedures and customs." If these had not been avoided, he said, Clara Barton would never have launched the Red Cross movement.

He said the factors leading to self-renewal are youth, vigor, enthusiasm and a willingness to learn. The meeting was also highlighted by the introduction of a new chapter chairman, Norman Thurnhofer. He succeeds Eldon Caley who held the post three years. Caley received a special citation for his years of service.

More Lurid Details Unfold In Vice Case

LONDON (UPI) — Party girl Marilyn (Mandy) Rice-Davies insisted in court today that she had sex relations with Lord Astor, despite defense assertions that Astor had made a statement denying the acts.

The 18-year-old blonde, testifying in the second day of the pre-trial hearing of vice charges against society osteopath Dr. Stephen Ward, refused to change her stand in the face of cross-examination by defense attorney James Burge.

When asked by Burge if she knew Astor had made a statement to police denying he had slept with her, the girl answered, "Well, he would, wouldn't he?" Laughter rocked the crowded courtroom.

Mandy testified Friday that she had sex relations with wealthy and influential Lord Astor.

"Miss X" Appears

Today's proceedings were further enlivened by the appearance of a "Miss X," who was allowed by Magistrate Leo Gradwell to omit making her name public.

Birch Chapter Demands Apology From Governor

Roseburg's Chapter 582 of the John Birch Society drafted a resolution this week demanding that Gov. Mark O. Hatfield either name names or "make a public apology" for a statement he allegedly made about the society recently.

In the resolution, Hatfield was quoted as saying at the recent Western Governor's Conference in Arizona that, "I'm not saying the John Birch Society is a fascist organization, but it has some individuals equally dangerous."

The resolution demands that Hatfield "name those dangerous individuals or make a public apology to the John Birch Society for his irresponsible, unfounded charges."

According to the resolution, Leslie Fleming, society coordinator for the state, has demanded the same action. It says Fleming insists it is Hatfield's "public duty, not only to the people of Oregon but to the patriotic members of the John Birch Society."

The resolution also says that members of the society have tried privately to find out from Hatfield who the individuals are "in order to protect the society if it has been infiltrated." It says the governor has refused to cooperate.

Denies Publicity Seeking

Mandy denied that she was seeking publicity in bringing up Astor's name. She said she met both Lord and Lady Astor early in 1961.

Mandy insisted that she twice had met American actor Douglas Fairbanks Jr., who is a favorite at Buckingham Palace. She did not elaborate.

Miss X related the events of a party which she, Christine and Mandy allegedly attended in Ward's flat. She said she was shown the "see-through" mirror by Ward.

"He would sit there and watch people," she said, "I should imagine making love—in the bedroom and he sort of made a little joke about it."

Miss X testified that she told Ward she would not be interested in watching. Under prodding by the magistrate she quoted Ward's reply as, "My darling, I don't want you to watch. I want you to perform."

Mandy had testified earlier that she destroyed a similar mirror in Archman's apartment after she had lived with him for six months.

Dancer May Testify

Mandy and Miss Keeler were the only two prosecution witnesses at the opening session of the hearing Thursday.

It was reported before today's session that the third prosecution witness might be a former Paris night club dancer named Ronna Ricardo. Miss Ricardo, 23, was said to have been alerted by Scotland Yard that she will be called to testify.
