

# Timber Sales Hike June Total

Two more tracts of Umpqua National Forest timber were sold Friday to raise the total sold for the month of June to more than 190 million board feet.

With the June sales, most of the Columbus Day blowdown timber was out of the way, according to a representative of the Roseburg supervisor's office.

The winning bidder on the two sales Friday were National Plywood Inc. and Douglas County Lumber Co., both of Roseburg.

**Sole Bidder**

National Plywood was unopposed for the Honker Salvage Sale on 115 acres 45 miles northeast of Roseburg. It paid \$26,811.20 for the two million board feet in the tract appraised at \$26,711.20. The total was based on \$12.50 per thousand for 1,680,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$12.45 and \$6.55 for 320,000 board feet ap-

praised at \$6.50.

Douglas County Lumber paid almost \$10 over the appraised price for Douglas fir to claim the Wash-Freida Salvage Sale. The tract is located on 50 acres 47 miles northeast of Roseburg. Containing 575,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine and 25,000 feet of white fir and other species, it was appraised at \$12,413.75. The bid was \$18,106.25 based on \$31.05 per thousand for Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$21.15 and the appraised \$10.10 for the white fir.

**Other Participants**

Other bidders were Dwight L. Tinker of Roseburg and Paul B. Hult Lumber Co. of Dillard.

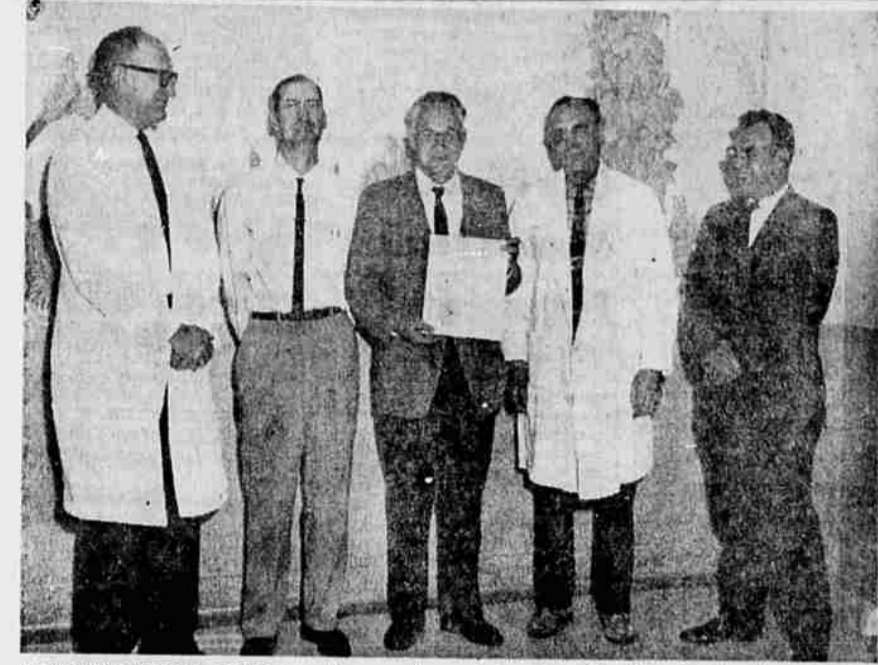
Meanwhile, the One-Elk Salvage Sale 35 miles northeast of Tiller drew no bids. It contains 190,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$24.90 per thousand and 120,000 feet of white fir and other species appraised at \$11.45. Total appraisal is \$6,105. It will remain available at the appraised price.

The next Umpqua National Forest sales are slated July 9.

## 20 Unemployed Persons To Train In Forestry

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Twenty unemployed persons will be trained as foresters during a 37-week training session in Oregon in September, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare announced Friday.

The project, which is approved under the manpower Development and Training Act, will cost the Federal government around \$19,000. Training will be held at the Technical Vocational School in Eugene.

## Orientation Session Staged For Ranger District Crews

Cow Creek Ranger District at Tiller held its annual orientation session this week to acquaint summer crews and new permanent employees with the over-all work program of the organization. Attending were 31 persons, including 21 participating for the first time.

District Ranger John O. Wilson and each member of his administrative staff outlined his individual duties and explained how his work dovetailed with the work of others to carry out the many facets of the Forest Service program. Represented were departments handling timber management, engineering, timber stand improvement, fire control, other forest resources and clerical duties.

Safety received special stress, as most of the summer crews are made up of college forestry majors or recent high school graduates planning to study for a forestry career. Many come from the central and eastern part of the United States and lack previous experience in handling tools and performing outdoor tasks such as their present jobs require.

When indoor sessions were completed, the group moved to the rear of the ranger station grounds for instruction in use of equipment. Ira B. Poole, fire control officer, and Bill Finch handled demonstrations and instruction in use of motorized equipment, pumps and other paraphernalia. Homer Radford demonstrated proper use of hand tools.

Wilson explained that the orientation session is designed to provide better understanding of the work of the various departments and to emphasize the necessity of each job in the smooth operation of the district's work schedule.

## Backers Rush Barry Draft

WASHINGTON (UPI)—While supporters of other Republican presidential hopefuls are biding their time Goldwater boosters are actively in business.

The national Draft Goldwater Committee has set up headquarters a few blocks from the White House and it already has more political bustle about it than the GOP and Democratic National Committee offices combined.

If Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., should drop by—and he hasn't so far—he would see a glamorous lifesize picture of himself dressed in his Air Force flying togs.

Beneath the photograph at the entrance of the headquarters is a desk with a sweet voiced receptionist who greets telephone callers with: "Good morning—Draft for Goldwater."

On her desk are draft petitions for the senator which ask for a one dollar contribution; brochures on "How Goldwater Will Win the Presidency" and pocket book copies of "Conscience of a Conservative" written by the Arizona senator.

Callers can also dip into large vases for a Goldwater button with the senator's picture and the slogan "Goldwater in '64." Above them, signs on the walls read: "America Can't Wait—88's Too Late," and "We Have Not Yet Begun to Fight."

The headquarters was set up June 10 by Texas Republican state Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr., and Indiana National Committeewoman Mrs. Ione Harrington to whip up grass roots support for their candidate.

The attention at headquarters is focused mainly on the mammoth draft Goldwater rally to be held at the National Guard Armory here on July 4.

Goldwater will not attend. Speaking in his behalf will be Republican Sen. John G. Tower of Texas, Rep. John Ashbrook of Ohio and Arizona Gov. Paul Fannin. Also featured will be Hollywood stars Walter Brennan, William Lundigan and Efrim Zimbalist Jr.

Tickets are free to the rally which will be staged like an old fashioned political convention with brass bands, bunting, lemonade and no air conditioning.

## Green Predicts Rights Measures

PORTLAND (UPI)—Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., said Friday that race problems have given a "sense of crisis" to Washington. She predicted that strong civil rights legislation would be passed this session of Congress.

Mrs. Green is spending a few days in Portland during the July 4 recess of Congress.

Trouble is brewing just beneath the surface in the nation's capital and "in cities like Chicago where unemployment among Negroes is high," she said.

She said there is a probability that no domestic legislation would be passed until the civil rights problem has been disposed of.

The public accommodation proposals of President Kennedy will be far reaching, she said, but added there would be no real improvement until employment, education and housing for Negroes are improved.

## Five Killed When Auto Is Hit By Earth-Mover

VANCOUVER, B.C. (UPI)—Five members of one family were killed Friday night when their car collided with a huge earth-moving machine on the Trans-Canada Highway 85 miles west of here.

The victims were identified as Mrs. Rita Cyr, 37, of Millardville, B.C., and four of her children, Alrian, 19, Leo, 12, Diane, 8, and Leonard, 5.

Police said the giant earth-mover, operated by Frank Nagy of Abbotsford, B.C., careened out of control while traveling downhill and met the Cyr car head-on.

Nagy and Romeo Cyr, the driver of the demolished car, were taken to a hospital in the nearby community of Hope, where they were reported to be in satisfactory condition.

## Diver Is Treated After Suffering Attack Of Bends

BROWNLEE DAM, Idaho (UPI)—A 20-year-old Montana skin diver was in an Idaho Power Company decompression chamber today for treatment of the bends suffered while searching a Montana lake for a missing boy.

Ron Koppang, Columbia Falls entered the chamber about two miles from here at 3 p.m. Friday. He will stay there until early Sunday. He must remain in the chamber for 38 hours so his body pressure slowly can arrive at what it was before he suffered the bends.

The young skin diver had gone into the depths of Lake McDonald in Glacier National Park to look for Gregory Trenor, 6, who drowned Thursday.

His partner in the search, Thomas Dumay, also Columbia Falls, drowned while searching for the Trenor boy. Koppang, a worker at the Anaconda Aluminum Company was flown here in a private airplane.

The building has been erected by contractor Jack Mathis on low bid of \$68,165. Cost of land, furnishings and fixtures are in addition to this figure.

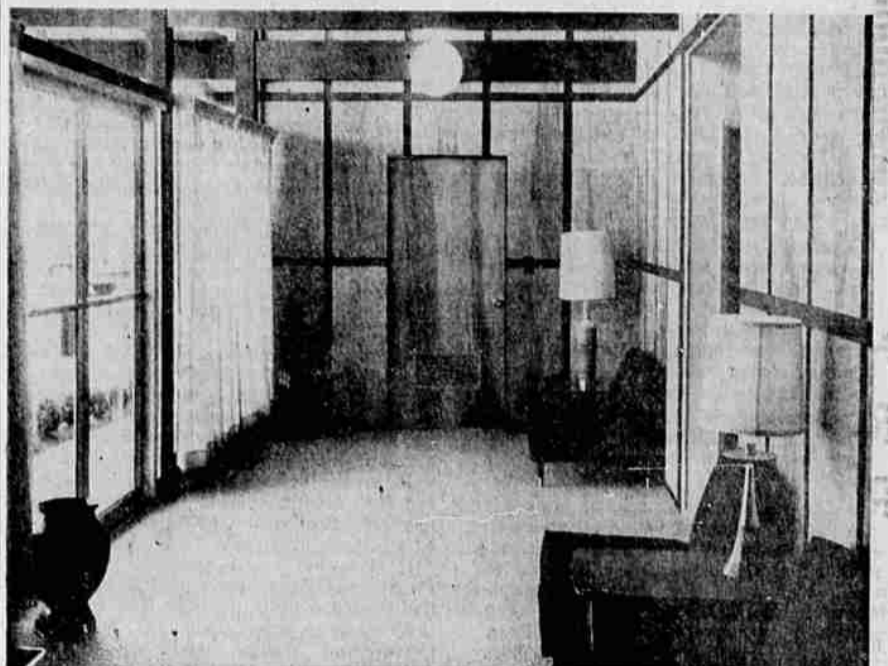

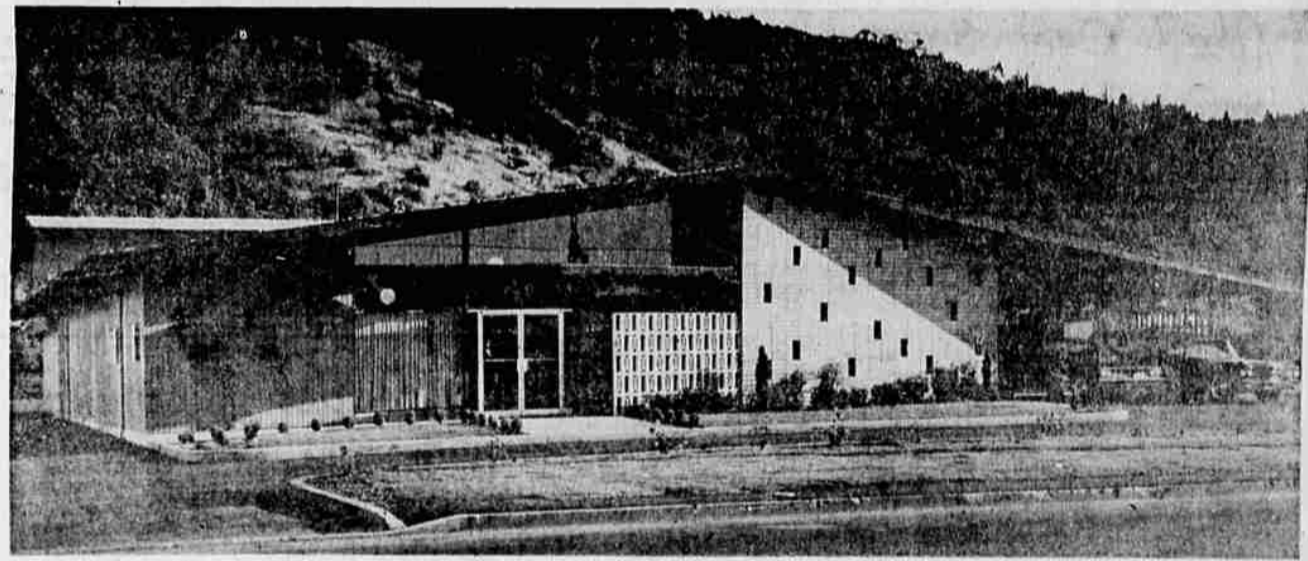
