

# Cards Place Three On All Star Team; Pearson Given Nod

NEW YORK (UPI) — The St. Louis Cardinals placed three members of their brilliant infield on the National League All-Star team today while pint-sized Albie Pearson of the Los Angeles Angels was picked to replace Mickey Mantle on the American League squad.

First-baseman Bill White, shortstop Dick Groat and third-baseman Ken Boyer of the Cardinals were named to the NL starting team which also will include second-baseman Bill Mazeroski of the Pittsburgh Pirates, centerfielder Willie Mays and catcher Ed Bailey of the San Francisco Giants, leftfielder Tommy Davis of the Los Angeles Dodgers and rightfielder Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves.

The AL squad, with Pearson replacing Mantle in a unique "double vote," will open with the Yankees' Joe Pepitone at first base, Nelson Fox of the Chicago White Sox at second, Zoilo Versalles of the Minnesota Twins at shortstop and Frank Malzone of the Boston Red Sox at third.

The AL outfield will be manned by Pearson in center, the Angels' Leon Wagner in left and the Detroit Tigers' Al Kaline in right. Earl Battey of the Twins will be the catcher. The Angels and Twins are the only teams with more than one starter in the AL lineup.

The selections were made in league-wide balloting of the players, who were forbidden to vote for players on their own teams, and announced by baseball Commissioner Ford Frick. This year's All-Star game—there will be only

one this year as opposed to two in each of the last four years—will be played in massive Cleveland Stadium, July 9.

The pitching selections will be made by rival managers Alvin Dark of the NL and Ralph Houk of the AL a few days before the game. The 16 starters named by the players are required to play the first three innings, barring injury. The managers are free to fill out the remainder of the 25-man squads as they see fit although they almost invariably stick closely to the voting pattern of the players.

Second-place finishers in the player-voting, therefore, may be considered "automatic" selections to the squads.

AL players were asked to vote twice for a starting centerfielder—the first time on the assumption that Mantle would be able to play and the second on the assumption that he would not. Mantle was selected in the first vote but Pearson won easily in the second. It is definite that Mantle will be unable to play until July 11 or later.

Groat, the Pirates' MVP shortstop in 1960 who was traded to the Cardinals last Nov. 19, was the top vote-getter in both leagues with 238 of the 285 NL votes for shortstop. Aaron was a second in the NL with 230, followed by Mazeroski with 227, White with 220 and Boyer with 186. Kaline was the top vote-getter in the AL with 226 followed by Battey's 196 and Versalles' 183. There were 270 votes cast for each position in the AL.

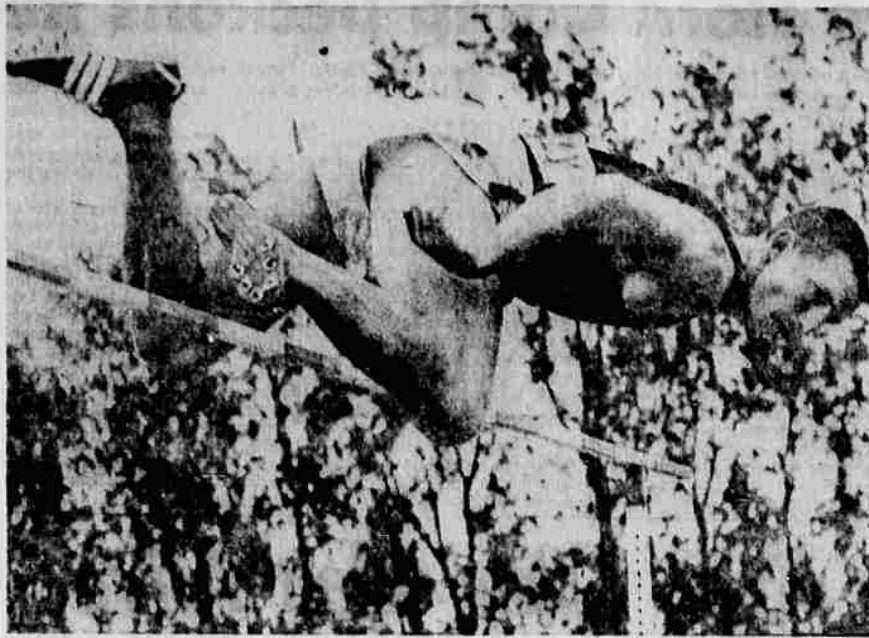

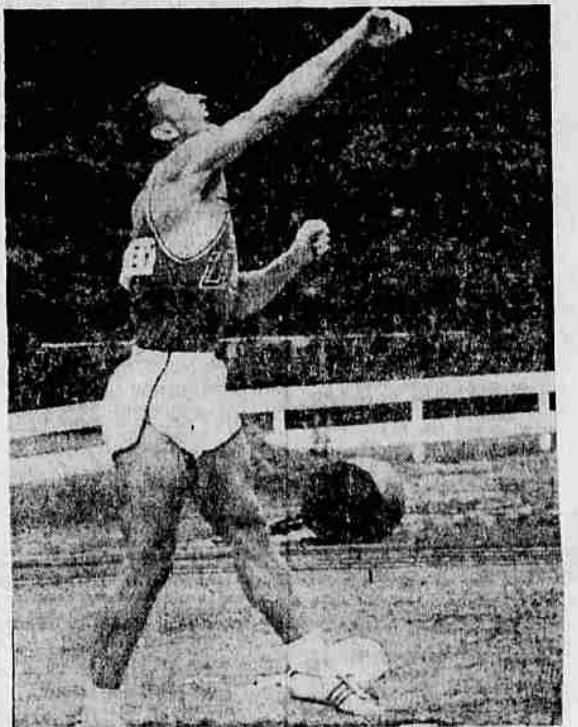

# Oregon AAU Track, Field Showdowns Set July 3-4

EUGENE — Half-a-dozen national AAU champions and a pair of NCAA titlists head up a classy field set to compete July 3-4 in the Oregon AAU track and field championships at Hayward Field.

Preliminaries will be run Wednesday (July 3) starting at 6:30 p.m. with finals in all 19 events scheduled for Thursday (July 4), starting at 1:30 p.m.

AAU titlists set to perform are Ellis Williams in the 400, Dyrrol Burleson in the mile, Brian Sternberg in the pole vault, Ralph Boston in the broad jump, Dave Davison in the shot put and Gene Johnson in the high jump.

In addition, meet director Bob Newland, has lined up 1963 NCAA champs Lew Hoyt in the high jump and Julio Marin, who captured both the 3-mile and 6-mile at Albuquerque.

Sternberg and Williams were also NCAA winners this year. Feature events figure to be the mile, 400, high jump and broad jump. The mile matches Burleson, former Oregon track great, against Cary Weisiger, Jim Grelle and Archie San Romani in a race that could well produce a sub-four-minute clocking.

In the 400, it's another renewal of the personal battle between Williams and world record holder Adolph Plummer, who established the current world standard of 44.9 this spring.

The high jump field features Johnson, Hoyt, Paul Stuber, second in the AAU and third at the NCAA meet, and Oregon's tiny Terry Llewellyn.

Boston tangles with Phil Shinnick of Washington in the broad jump with Darrel Horn and Charles Mosely ready to step in if either falters.

THEN WRAP 5 TURNS UP ON LINE, WRIP END UNDER AND TIGHTEN. TRIM END. THIS HITCH MAY ALSO BE USED TO ATTACH MONOFILAMENT "BACKING."

# Johnson Fires One Hitter For Oklahoma In Stopping Portland 3-0 In PCL Game

Spokane and Portland batters are wondering today how and when they're going to score some runs—or at least one—off Oklahoma City pitchers.

The 89er pitchers have zeroed the opposition in the past 23 consecutive innings. Friday night Ben Johnson fired a one-hitter in stopping Portland cold, 3-0. George Brunet shut out Spokane Thursday night and in the Wednesday game the Indians were held scoreless in the last five frames.

Johnson, a 13-year veteran, had his bid for a no-hitter spoiled by leadoff batter Chet Boak who singled sharply to left field in the eighth. However, Danny Murphy cut him down as he tried for a double with a perfect strike throw.

Murphy also helped the 89ers cause with a two run home run in the fourth frame.

Johnson faced but 29 men in winning his sixth game in nine decisions. He fanned five and walked two.

In other games, Spokane downed Dallas-Fort Worth 3-2; Denver outscored Seattle 10-9; San Diego downed Salt Lake City 3-1 and top-ranked Tacoma in the Northern Division copped a 3-1 tilt from Hawaii.

Giant Manager Andy Gilbert once again had to call an old reliable John Pregrezer to get his club out of hot water. He struck out Carlos Bernier, who had homered for Hawaii's only run in the sixth inning.

Another fine crowd of 8,002 fans saw Danny Rivas get the victory, his eighth against three losses. He fanned 12 and walked two in 8 2/3 innings.

Pregrezer now has struck out eight of the 13 men he faced in the series.

Consecutive singles by four Giants accounted for two tallies in the fifth and the final score came on a double by Bill Hain and a single by Jerry Robinson.

Spokane collected all of its hits and runs in the first three innings against Dallas-Ft. Worth with a key blow being George Banks 36-foot homer, his 12th of the season and second in as many games

for Spokane. Norm Koch won the game, needing help from Ken Rowe in the seventh. Koch's record stands at 6-4, while loser Gary Dotter has 4-4.

After holding down a 10-1 lead, Denver almost blew it in the seventh inning when Seattle pushed six runs across the plate before being retired. It was the fourth straight win for the Bears, who tallied five runs in the sixth on homers by Lou Klimchok and J. W. Porter.

Seattle's big seventh was topped by a bases-loaded triple by Stan Johnson. He also had two other hits and a brace of walks for a big evening at the plate.

Russ Heman was the winner and has a 1-1 mark while Guido Grilli was charged with the loss and has 11.

Catcher Jim Sual was the hero for San Diego when he belted a home run in the eighth with Chicago Ruiz on base. At the time the

score was deadlocked at 1-1. Ruiz scored the other Padre run in the first when he singled, stole his 25th base and scored on a wild pitch.

## Player In Tie

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Gary Player, Bo Winger and Tommy Aaron led by one stroke going into the third round of the \$100,000 Cleveland Open golf championship today in the tightest battle in professional golf history.

There were 75 players who survived the cut for the final two rounds and the last of them was only eight shots off the lead with a one-over-par score of 143 qualifying as they murdered par over heat-shrouded Beechmont Country Club.

All of them, with two rounds to play, had to be considered in a challenging position and, among the favorites, Jack Nicklaus was only one shot off the lead with favored Arnold Palmer only four strokes back.

As Palmer, who started out Friday's second round tied for 43rd place, remarked:  
"This is anyone's tournament—anyone who is putting, that is."

# Frank Baker Dies Friday

TRAPPE, Md. (UPI) — The last of Connie Mack's famed \$100,000 infield is dead.

Frank (Home Run) Baker, who earned his nickname by hitting nine home runs for the 1911 Philadelphia Athletics in the era of the "dead ball," died Friday at his home here at the age of 77.

Baker, who was voted into baseball's Hall of Fame in 1955, played third base with Mack's A's from 1908 to 1914, forming the \$100,000 infield with Stuffy McInnis, Eddie Collins and Jack Barry under manager Mack.

The New York Yankees purchased Baker's contract from the A's after the 1916 season and he helped form their original "Murderers Row" in 1921 with Babe Ruth, Wally Pipp, Roger Peckinpaugh and Bob Meusel. Baker called it a career after the 1922 season.

# All America Grid Contest Set Tonight

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI)—John McKay and Milt Bruhn — and their quarterbacks—renew a football rivalry tonight in the nationally televised third annual All-America game.

But unlike the Jan. 1 Rose Bowl collision between 1962 national champion Southern California and Big Ten powerhouse Wisconsin McKay's West team is classed as "second best" to Bruhn's gigantic East squad. The East is favored by one touchdown before an expected 30,000 in War Memorial Stadium.

Starting quarterbacks for tonight's American Football Coaches' Association game—to be presented by the American Broadcasting Co.—are Wisconsin's Ron VanderKelen of the East and Southern California's Bill Nelson of the West. "Vandy" led the futile Badger surge in Southern California's 42-37 Rose Bowl victory.

The West won the All-America inaugural, 30-20, and the East got even, 13-8, last June. The outstanding player in this year's game will receive the Ernie Davis Memorial Trophy, named for the late Syracuse football star who died of leukemia.

Davis' last football game was in the 1962 All-America clash when he played for the East.

Notre Dame's Daryle Lamonica, slowed by back spasms for a couple of days, will alternate with VanderKelen in a backfield composed of wingback Billy Gambrell of South Carolina and Penn State's Roger Kochman and Michigan State's George Saines.

McKay, whose "scrambling" attack evolves from the "I" formation, will have UCLA's Kermit Alexander, Baylor's Ronnie Goodwin and Nebraska's Bill Thornton under Nelson's direction.

Randy Gold of California is the reserve quarterback.
