

Three-Way Playoff Set To Decide Golf Winner

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—Tony Lema, who sank a pressure putt, Arnold Palmer, who missed one, and Tommy Aaron, who birdied four holes in a row, met today in a playoff for the \$22,000 first place money in the Cleveland Open golf tournament.

In the closest and most pressure-packed tournament in PGA history, they tied for first place with 11-under-par totals of 273 Sunday over the sun-baked and heat-seared Beechmont Country Club course.

There were actually 12 players in contention in the fourth round, but one by one they fell by the wayside until Lema and Palmer, who led most of the way, charged to the wire to tie Aaron.

The 26-year-old Aaron, who just a week ago finished last in the U.S. Open after shooting a third-round 91, was sitting in the clubhouse after shooting birdies on the final four holes when Palmer and Lema, playing in the final threesome, teed off for the final three holes. They were 11 under par, the figure at which Aaron, atoning for his sorry open showing, had finished.

It didn't look too good for Aaron after both parred the 16th, because the 17th and 18th are relatively easy birdie holes.

For Lema, it looked like cur-

tain on the par-four 17th when his approach shot buried in a sand trap. But he blasted out to within 10 feet of the pin and sank what he called "a real money putt" to stay in contention.

Palmer, meanwhile, parred the hole, so they teed off for the final hole, needing pars to tie Aaron and birdies to beat him. Playing with them was Jackie Burke, just one stroke off the pace.

Burke hit the rough with his drive, put his second on the green of the par-four 385-yard hole, 12 feet from the pin. Lema, in the fairway, went to the fringe of the green. Palmer, who outdrove them all, flipped his second shot 10 feet from the cup.

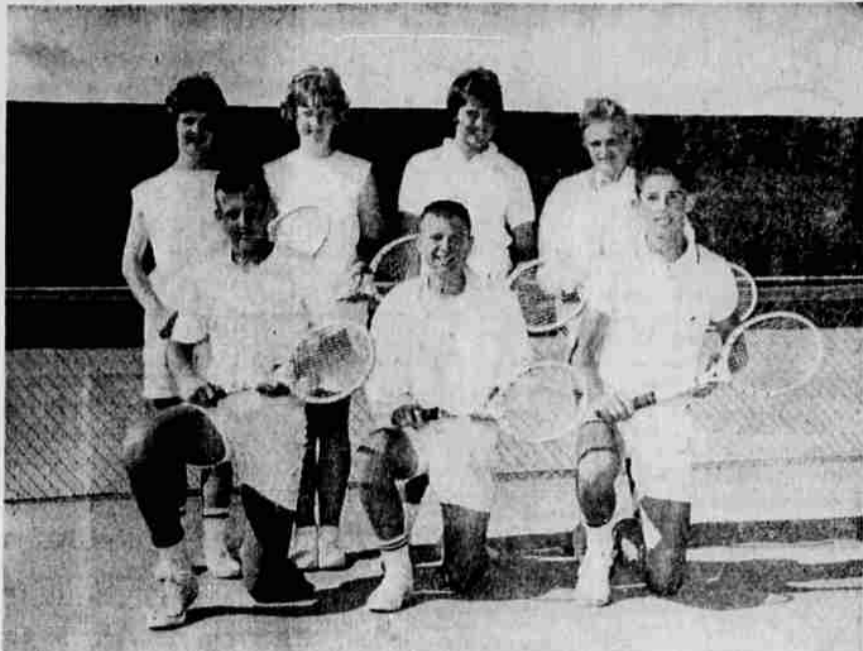
Lema putted first and went two feet past the hole. He tapped it in, tying him with Aaron.

Then Burke, with a chance to tie, rimmed the cup and was out of it.

That left it up to Palmer, golf's "money bags."

His putt went on the high side and missed. So, for the third time in three weeks, he found himself in a playoff.

Last week, he lost to Julius Boros in the U.S. Open; the week before he had beaten Paul Harney on the first extra hole of a sudden death affair for the \$25,000 first-place money in the Thunderbird at Rye, N.Y.

Sevall, McKee Triumph In State JC Tournament

Sherry Sevall and Bob McKee earned trips to the National Jaycee Junior Tennis Championships by emerging with the state crowns in their divisions at the Oregon State Championships held at the Stewart Park Courts over the weekend.

Medford netters dominated the action, grabbing four of the eight crowns, while Roseburg and Salem each captured two titles.

Miss Sevall ran off with top honors in the girls open division with a hard-fought 6-3, 6-4 triumph over Springfield's Jill Izett. To reach the finals, Miss Sevall defeated Becky McClean of Prineville, by a 6-4 score. However, McKee came back to win an extended 8-6 decision and even the count.

In the decider McKee displayed his championship form with a rapid 6-3 triumph. To reach the finals, McKee had rolled to a semifinal victory over teammate Don Mulkey after drawing a first round bye.

Salem's Dave Shuford impressed local tennis enthusiasts as he rolled to a decisive victory in the final mens open bracket. Shuford whizzed through the tournament with a minimum of trouble winning four straight matches. In the finals he bombed Medford's Mike Naumes, 6-1 and 6-0.

Other newly-crowned state Jaycee Junior Tennis champs include: Craig Cooley, Salem, in the boys open division; Kathy Smith, Medford, in the junior mens open division; Ken Myers, Medford, in the boys novice class; Mary Gordonier, Medford, in the girls novice class; and Jeanne Salade, Medford, in the junior womens novice division.

The winner in each of the eight divisions is now qualified to compete in the National Junior Chamber of Commerce Junior Tennis Championships at Provo, Utah. The national championships will be staged July 14-20.

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OSU's Pauly Ponders Future After AAU Decathlon Triumph

CORVALLIS (UPI)—America's newest decathlon champion, Steve Pauly, plans to consider his athletic future after he returns from carrying his country's colors in the U.S.-Russia meet in Moscow July 20-21.

The June graduate of Oregon State won the 1963 national AAU title and one berth on the U.S. team here Saturday by scoring 7,852 points in the two-day, 10-event test.

"I don't believe I've ever seen a better effort on the basis of his own abilities, coupled with the terrible weather," Phil Mulkey, the sixth-place finisher, said of Pauly's victory.

The 6-4, 190-pounder planned to attend dental school this fall, but those plans may be postponed.

"I might come back here and take a few hours so I could train for 1964," Pauly said after the victory. He lettered three years each in basketball and track at OSU.

Pauly also was unsure of his status on the U.S. team. He plans to compete in Moscow, but the bridegroom of three weeks said he may be able to get away from his summer job with a construction firm for only a week, not enough time to make the full European tour.

He came within 18.2 seconds Saturday of being one of the few men in modern decathlon history to reach the 8,000-point mark, mark and his point total has been surpassed only by C. K. Yang, Rafer Johnson and Bob Mathias in winning this meet in the last 25 years.

He needed a 4:35.4 clocking in the 1,500 meters to break the 8,000

point mark.
"I didn't feel very good but I thought I could do it," Pauly said. "I kept up with the pace until the third lap and then I fell behind."
In other events, he recorded 11.3 for 100 meters, 22 - 10 in the broad jump, 47.0 in the shot put, 6-0 in the high jump, 49.6 in the 400 meters, 14.7 in the 110 meter hurdles, 149-1 1/2 in the discus, 12-11 in the pole vault and 241-3 in the javelin.
The weather that caused Mulkey's comment included temperatures in the 50s with highs of 58 Friday and 56 Saturday during the meet, frequent rain storms and a cold wind. Only 1,516 fans braved those conditions in the two days.
The final 1,500 meter race also gave Dick Emburger of the Camp Pendleton, Calif., Marines second place and the other berth on the U.S. team for the Russian meet.

Pee Wee Schedule Revised For Week

Scheduling problems arose in the Roseburg Pee Wee program for the opening week, with three changes announced by director Darl Thornton from the original plan listed in Friday's News-Review.

Tuesday at 8 a.m. at the Fullerton field the Fullerton Reds will meet the Green Huskies rather than the Fullerton Phillies, with the Phillies playing the High School Giants at the same time at Riverside field. Wednesday the Reds and the Huskies will again battle at 8 a.m. at Fullerton, with the 11 a.m. game being played between the Fullerton Cubs and the Eastwood Athletics rather than the Cubs and the Huskies.
