Congress Ends First Half

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress went into the second half of the year today with the outlook for legislation action confined largely to two major issues — civil rights and a tax cut.

More and more members are agreed that nothing much will be done before adjournment late this year except in the civil rights and tax fields.

The lawmakers will enact the usual appropriations measures and pass a number of other bills, but some of President Kennedy's priority items appear likely to go down the drain.

Included among these are medical care for the aged, mass transit, depressed areas, youth employment and a domestic Peace Corps. College aid also could get lost in the shuffle.

On the positive side, Congress already has approved several important measures. If they are not overshadowed by the civil rights and tax cut issues, their passage might have been hailed as signal events.

The legislative accomplishments to date include extending the draft law for four years, raising the national debt limit, giving women workers the same pay as men get for the same work, and continuing the excise tax and corporate tax rates for another year.

Attorney General Opposes 'Watering Down' Of Civil Rights Legislation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said today he opposed any changes in the administration's civil rights bill that would "water down" the proposed ban on discrimination in public accommodations.

Kennedy said a federal ban was needed to stop "one of the most embittering forms of racial discrimination" that stamps a "badge of inferiority" on Negroes.

"White people of whatever kind — even prostitutes, narcotics pushers, Communists or bank robbers — are welcome at establishments which will not admit certain of our federal judges, ambassadors and countless members of our armed forces," Kennedy said.

Kennedy told the Senate Commerce Committee that he and the President "emphatically" wanted the seven-point rights legislation passed this year.

His strongly worded statement was regarded as a rebuttal to Republican charges that the administration was ready to sacrifice the public accommodations provision to get the rest of the bill through Congress.

The attorney general dismissed as a "smokescreen" the arguments raised by some Republicans and southern Democrats that the bill would seriously infringe on property rights.

The President's brother threw his full support behind the proposal to outlaw discrimination in hotels, theaters, restaurants and stores and other facilities open to the public.

Kennedy urged passage of a separate accommodations bill just five days after he appealed to the House Judiciary Committee to enact the entire civil rights package.

Notes Celler Proposal
Kennedy took note of the proposal by Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., of the House Judiciary Committee that Congress should exclude business establishments from coverage if their volume of sales was below a certain point.

He said the standards for coverage would be covered if the bill would seriously infringe on property rights.

"We intentionally did not make the size of a business the criterion for coverage because we believe that discrimination by many small establishments imposes a cumulative burden on interstate commerce," Kennedy said.

Test For Coverage
Kennedy said public accommodations would be covered if they met the following tests:
—Public lodgings, if they are public and the lodgers are transients.
—Place of amusement, if they are customarily present entertainment which moves in interstate commerce.
—Restaurants and retail stores, (1) if a substantial part of their business is with interstate travelers or (2) if a substantial part of their wares has moved in interstate commerce or (3) if their activities substantially affect interstate commerce or (4) if they are an integral part of another business covered by any of the provisions listed above.

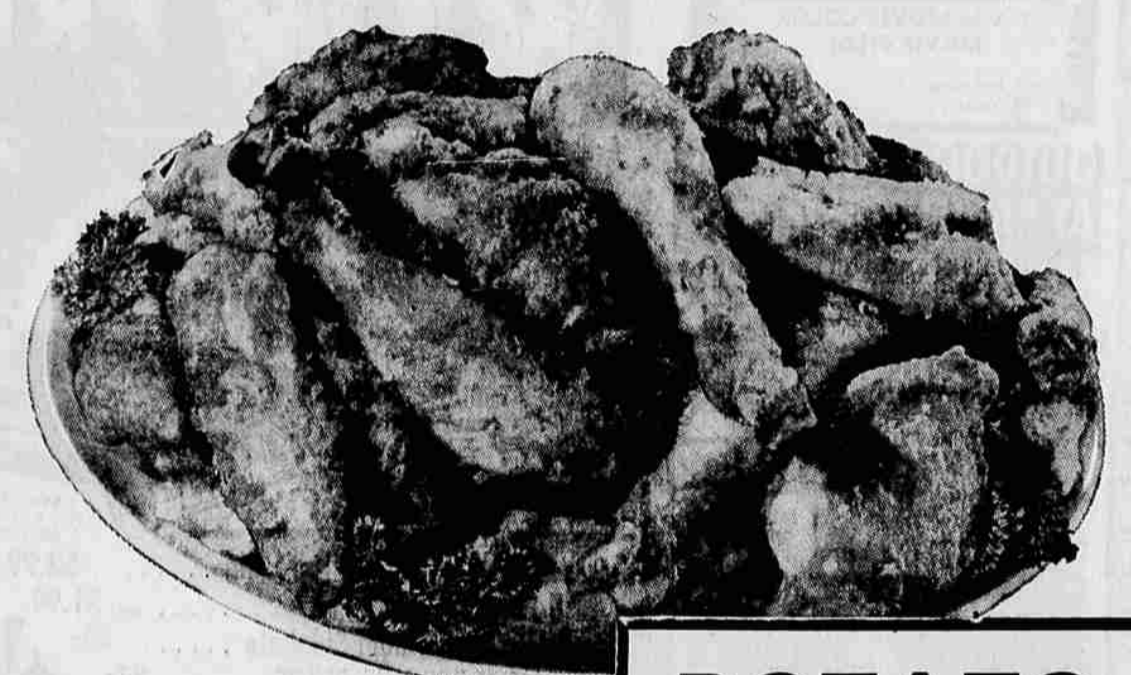
