

Kennedy Winds Up Historic Visit To European Capitals

Pope Paul Lauds Kennedy Efforts For World Peace

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI met today with President Kennedy and praised his efforts to obtain world peace and racial equality in the United States.

Kennedy, the first Roman Catholic president of the United States, spent 36 minutes in private audience with the newly crowned pontiff in the ornate papal library of the Apostolic Palace. Their discussion centered on their mutual hopes for peace.

Moose Lodge Sets Fireworks Display July 4

Roseburg area residents will again be treated to a free display of fireworks at the Douglas County Fairgrounds, a courtesy of the Roseburg Moose Lodge from funds raised by its numerous projects.

The display is scheduled for the night of July 5. A program of music and other entertainment, produced by Wayne Wagner and the Douglas County Musician's Union, will start at 7:15 p.m. This will continue until dusk, about 9:30 to 9:45, when the fireworks, under the direction of Dr. George Lenci, will get underway. The display will last about 1 1/2 hours. A patriotic theme, with presentation of colors is planned.

Vern Lorentz has been in charge of the Moose's program in making the big annual event possible, and his job has been continued by Roy Purcival.

The display will be similar to that put on last year, but will include a new assortment of fireworks. Dr. Lenci said 150 aerial pieces and eight ground pieces have been purchased, representing an expenditure by the Moose of \$800 to \$1,000.

Included will be three 30-inch aerial shells, which proved popular last year. The shells will be fired in salvos of two, three and four for effective display. Total of 19 mortars have been set in the ground to fire pieces effectively.

Irv Pugh will be in charge of the ground pieces in front of the stands, and Warren Woodruff will be chief assistant to Dr. Lenci. Total of about 20 persons will be working in keeping the fireworks display functioning.

All the set pieces have been purchased, except that Dr. Lenci has made or assembled Roman candles and "gerb" batteries (set pieces).

While the show is free, persons who wish to contribute to the cost will be given an opportunity to do so, as the only source of funds the Moose Lodge has for the project is through donated funds.

County Wins Court Order For Roadway

Douglas County Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodruff Monday granted Douglas County an injunction against Hiram B. and Melba L. Germond which will allow the county or its duly authorized agents to enter the Germond property for road construction purposes.

The Germonds had filed an appeal against the county plan to widen and realign the Hubbard Creek section of the Edenbow-Millwood Road where it involved Germond property. The Hubbard Creek Road is located in the Umpqua area, where Hubbard Creek joins the Umpqua River.

The injunction will allow construction of the road without a delay pending the outcome of civil action on that appeal. Judge Woodruff ruled the Germonds were not denied due process in the action leading up to the proposed road construction, and that they were unable to present evidence of having asked for a hearing.

Bids were opened on the project last week, with the Hamer Corp. of Portland turning in an apparent low bid of \$71,323 for drainage and grading on the 1.12 miles of the road. No contract has yet been let, pending outcome of the hearing on the County Court's petition for an injunction. The court now plans to have a contract ready within the next week. Construction is scheduled to start within 10 days of the contract awarding and to be completed within 60 working days.

The injunction handed down Monday came as the result of the case filed by the county. Action is still pending on the Germond appeal.

Winston Sanitation Vote Set Wednesday

Winston - Dillard area voters will go to the polls Wednesday to decide the fate of a proposed sewage disposal plant for Douglas High School.

Earlier a special levy of \$15,000 was passed to lay a sewer line from the school to the City of Winston. However, after an intensive study, it was revealed that a plant could be installed at the school more economically.

Wednesday's election is for the purpose of changing the purpose of the levy from construction of a sewage line to building a disposal plant. The estimated cost of building the plant is \$16,750. The additional \$1,750 will come from existing funds if the voters approve the change.

Sutherlin-Oakland Phone Digits To Get Prefixes For First Time

Preparations are complete for the start of all number calling (ANC) at 12:01 a.m. Sunday (July 7), according to Cliff Thomas, Pacific Northwest Bell manager here.

New phone books and number cards for phone dials are in the hands of most customers and are to be delivered to everyone by Saturday, Thomas said.

He urged residents to use their old phone books until midnight Saturday night, then throw them away since many numbers listed will change at that time. He suggested checking for "stray" \$10 bills before giving the old directories the heave-ho, however.

Numbers Listed

These are the seven-digit phone numbers for Central Douglas County. Roseburg, changing from OR 2 to 672 and OR 3 to 673; Winston and Dillard from OS 9 to 679; Glide from GY 6 to 496; Sutherlin and Oakland to 459.

The Sutherlin and Oakland numbers will include a prefix for the first time. The present four digits remain as they are but more pulls on the dial will be needed to complete calls after Saturday night.

Camas Valley phones will remain unchanged until November when a new central office building there is put into service.

One problem that will be eliminated by the all-number system is the confusion caused by look-alikes on the present phone dials, Thomas said. He explained the numeral "0" (zero) is mistaken for the letter O in the OR and OS prefixes. GY is often dialed G1.

Problem Avoided

Any translation of 445, the prefix which Camas Valley phones will start using in November, to a lettered prefix would involve the letter I, consistently mistaken for the numeral 1. Experience with the letter I in the Eugene-Springfield exchange, where prefixes DI and EI were used, showed this to be a persistent problem. That exchange and more than a dozen others in Lane County changed to seven-digit phone numbers June 30.

Thomas said all-number calling will bring no change in any local dialing areas. Long distance calling will remain unchanged. Calls to or from the So. Oakland exchange and Roseburg will continue to be placed through the operator.

Little Progress Noted In Strike

PORTLAND (UPI)—An employer spokesman reported "little or no progress" today following talks between the lumber industry's Big Six and the striking Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW).

The meeting was held Monday with a federal mediator present. No more talks are on schedule at present.

The LSW and the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) went on strike June 5 against two members of the Big Six, St. Regis Paper Co. and U.S. Plywood. The four other members—Weyerhaeuser, International Paper, Rayonier and Crown Zellerbach—then shut down plants where union members are employed, saying a strike against one was a strike against all.

The employer spokesman said employers had no change in their previous offer of about 22 cents an hour over three years and that the LSW still asked 60 cents an hour over the same period.

The talks were recessed subject to call by the Federal Mediation Service and either one of the parties.

The unions last week indicated they may spread the strike.

Macmillan Faces Another Scandal Over Defectors

LONDON (UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan angrily defended his part in the "third man" security case today in a bitter, name-calling House of Commons debate.

Opposition Labor party leader Harold Wilson enraged Macmillan by demanding he appoint a minister of security to end the nation's series of security scandals.

Macmillan pigeon-holed the demand and accused Wilson of "inveective and insolence."

The parliamentary battle erupted over Monday's revelation that Harold Philby, former British diplomat in Washington, was indeed the "third man" whose tip-off allowed turncoat diplomats Guy Burgess and Donald MacLean to skip behind the Iron Curtain.

Macmillan said the Burgess and MacLean flight occurred in 1951 under a Labor government. When Macmillan's Conservative party came to power, he said, Philby was "got rid of."

The Laborites derided Macmillan for denying in 1955 when Macmillan was foreign secretary—that Philby was the "third man" in the Washington Embassy who tipped off Burgess and MacLean. Today Macmillan said his 1955 answer was based on information then available.

The Laborites jeered.

Wilson charged that "American newspaper revelations" forced Macmillan's Lord Privy Seal, Edward Heath, to announce Monday that Philby was the "third man." Labor M.P. P. Arthur Henderson demanded to know if President Kennedy got a report from Macmillan on the Philby case and Britain's other security woes.

Macmillan referred Henderson to his Sunday joint communiqué with Kennedy. The communiqué did not mention any such item in their weekend talks at Macmillan's country house.

In another security case, Dr. Giuseppe Martelli, an Italian nuclear physicist, pleaded innocent here today to charges that he planned to spy for the Soviet Union. Martelli worked on an atom-for-peace program at the government's Harwell Nuclear Research Station.

Monday Heath told Commons that Philby, who vanished last January from Beirut where he had been working as a newsman, may have gone behind the Iron Curtain. He said Philby, a former first secretary of the British Embassy in Washington, was an ex-Communist and had been a Soviet agent before 1946 while working in the Foreign Office.

The revelation came as a new blow to Macmillan, whose government has been rocked by the sex-and-security scandal involving resigned War Minister John Profumo and call girl Christine Keeler.

The pre-trial vice hearing of society osteopath Stephen Ward, who introduced Profumo to Christine Keeler, resumes Wednesday. It has shocked the country and has so repercussions throughout high society and governmental circles.

Issues Call For Greater Allied Unity

NAPLES, Italy (UPI)—President Kennedy, fresh from a historic meeting with Pope Paul VI, today called for greater Allied unity in an apparent new challenge to French President Charles de Gaulle.

At the last stop on his 10-day European tour, Kennedy also urged an end to "self-sufficient" nationalism in a speech at NATO Southern Command Headquarters.

The President's visit to this southern Italy port city wound up a 10-day tour that took him to West Germany, Berlin, Ireland, Britain and Italy. He will fly from Naples to Washington tonight.

Spends Busy Day

In an action packed final day, President Kennedy:

—Met with Pope Paul VI in Vatican City and heard the new pontiff praise his efforts to obtain world peace and racial equality in the United States. It was only the third time a U.S. chief of state had met a Pope while in office. The late President Woodrow Wilson came to the Vatican in 1915 and former President Dwight D. Eisenhower met Pope John XXIII in 1959.

—Conferred anew over lunch with Italian President Antonio Segni. Kennedy and Segni then issued a joint communique in which they agreed that negotiations with the Soviet Union could and should be continued without weakening NATO and European unity can be achieved without lessening collaboration with the United States. The two leaders also agreed to continue studies on the possible development of a NATO multilateral nuclear force.

—Visited the North American Pontifical College in Rome where he was presented with some gifts the late Pope John XXIII had set aside to give him on his visit. The Pope died before he had a chance to present them so the gifts were presented by Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston. One of the gifts was a rare autographed copy of the Pope's encyclical message, "Pacem in Terris."

—Flew by helicopter from Rome to Naples where he visited NATO Southern Command Headquarters and delivered a major speech reviewing his findings and feelings after 10 days in Western Europe. He said he was "heartened" by his observations.

The President originally had been scheduled to return to Rome from Naples and leave for home Wednesday morning. But he decided to cut short his four-country tour and fly to Washington tonight.

Youth Charged On Reckless Driving Count

Russell Sherman Hunt, 18, of Fullerton Street is being held in the city jail, and a charge of reckless driving was filed in District Court today after unusual circumstances in which his car nearly struck a young mother late Monday night, city police report.

Investigating officers said Hunt's car made two complete turns on NE Stephens St., just north of its intersection with NE Winchester St., at the location where Mrs. Myra McAllister, 418 NE Jackson St., and her two boys and a daughter, ages 2 to 10 years, were attempting to cross the highway. The incident occurred at 11:42 p.m.

According to the report of officers, Mrs. McAllister and her children—her little girl pushing an unoccupied baby buggy—started to cross the street as Hunt came south on NE Stephens.

The officers said Hunt is reported to have stopped his car in front of them, then for no apparent reason made a left turn, causing his car to jump the divider at Winchester Street. The car made a complete circle and came across the street, again jumping the divider and coming in the direction of the mother and her children, as she frantically ran up the hill with them trying to get them out of the way.

Hunt's car then made another turn, ending up going south in the northbound lane, then down a ditch where the car came to a stop.

He was arrested by city police, called to the scene by a state policeman who happened along on his way to work. The district attorney filed charges in District Court, since part of the occurrence happened outside the city limits.

Hunt told officers that the foot feed on his car stuck and that he was attempting to free it, causing the strange antics of his car.

Dog Tag Check Due

Robert Hall, head of the Douglas County Dog Control office, reports that the annual license check throughout the county will begin in the near future.

The check will be operated on a door-to-door basis. Any owners having dogs with delinquent licenses will be charged a \$2 penalty.

Zoning Change Requested For Hucrest Development

A request by Cecil Hugh for a zone change to allow shopping center development on a section of property in the Hucrest area was considered Monday night by the Roseburg Planning Commission.

Several residents of the area attending the commission's regular meeting voiced objections to the proposal.

Hugh wants the section of land bounded by Garden Valley Road, Keasey Road, Evans Ave and Crest Court in the Northwest Roseburg area changed from residential to commercial classification.

Matter Referred

The matter was referred to committee for additional study. Public hearing on the proposal is planned at the commission's next meeting. Based on results of that hearing, the commission will draft its recommendation to the Roseburg City Council.

Residents protesting the zone change said they had acquired property in that area with the idea that it would remain residential. Another argument was that the area, in their estimation, is already adequately served by shopping places.

Also considered was a request for zone change from Lloyd Fromdahl involving property south of St. Joseph's Catholic Church and west of the Douglas County Housing Project. Following discussion, the commission advised Fromdahl to initiate his request with the City Council.

Fromdahl seeks a zone change from residential I to residential II to allow proposed development of a nursing home and apartment house in the area.

Ordinance Discussed

The commission also discussed the off-street parking ordinance in relation to situations where residential property owners convert garages and carports into living quarters and thereby eliminate their off-street parking space. The question was whether parking can be created within the front yard or front setback of the residence to satisfy the ordinance. The commission's finding was that it cannot. Ordinance requires that off-street parking must be within the side yard, rear yard or in a court.

There was also discussion on whether or not regulations should be established governing the parking of camp trailers, boats and similar units within the front setback. At present the city has no control over such parking.

The commission decided to obtain recommendations on the matter from the city manager, building inspector and city engineer and continue discussion at the next meeting.
