NEW YORK (UPI)—Now that summer vacation time is here, so also is the time for exercise of the fine art of place-dropping. For, no expert in the art of place-dropping ever opens a conversation suddenly with "Well, the wife and I are just back from Paris and Rome, and I tell you, the prices!"

The skilled one waits until the other person in the conversation mentions that he or she just loved the Louvre and it was better to see the Mona Lisa on home ground than when it was on loan to those museums in Washington and New York.

Before The Kennedys

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Doctors Give A New Spleen To Youngster

DENVER (UPI) — A 10-year-old patient at Colorado General Hospital had a new spleen Monday following a historic transplant operation performed during the weekend.

Both the boy and his mother, the donor of the organ, were reported in "fair" condition after surgery, but the youngster still faces a crisis, probably some time this month, when his body is likely to attempt to "reject" the spleen as foreign matter.

The operation was the first spleen transplant in history. The mother and son are from Pueblo, Colo. They have not been identified.

Doctors said the boy was suffering from a disease which depleted the supply of antibodies in his blood. Antibodies fight infection, and because he did not have enough of them, he was chronically ill.

A team of surgeons which has performed kidney and liver transplants here in recent months undertook the spleen operation. Their idea was that the new spleen, an organ which produces antibodies, would provide the boy with more immunity from infection.

A normally healthy person like his mother can get along without a spleen because antibodies also are produced by other organs—the thymus gland and lymph nodes.

In past transplant operations involving other parts of the body, a crisis period usually comes within 10 to 30 days after the surgery. A spokesman for the surgeons said it was possible that the boy's transplanted spleen would produce antibodies during that period which would attempt to "reject" the spleen itself. Powerful drugs will be used to try to prevent this.

The boy's own defective spleen was not removed from its position behind the left ribs, the new spleen was inserted in the right side of his pelvic cavity.

New Federal Building Considered For Portland

PORTLAND (UPI) — Construction of a "federal square" in Portland costing \$15.5 million is being considered in Washington, D.C., it was reported recently.

The Oregon Journal said such a project would allow abandonment of the U.S. Custom House and the Pioneer Post Office. The Custom House is 62 years old and the Pioneer Post Office is 88 years old.

A site has yet to be picked, but it probably would be in the area of the Interior Building near the east side Lloyd Center, the newspaper said.

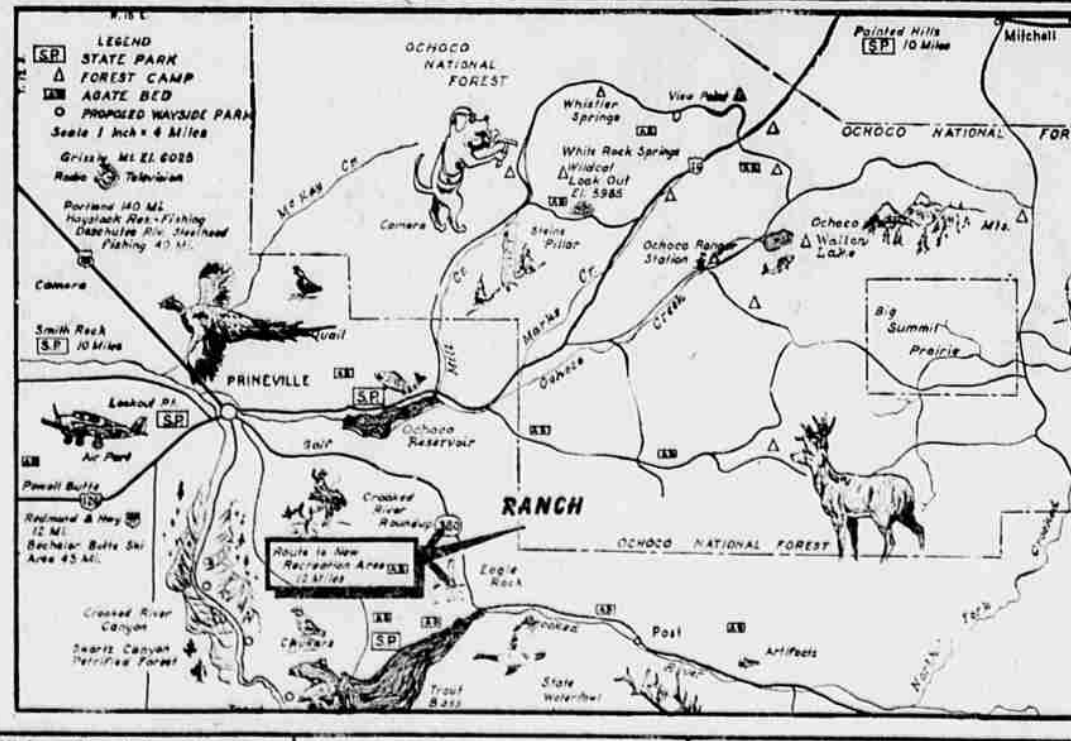
