## Roseburg B Team Scores A Crew Before Losing Out In 4-3 Thriller

Roseburg's B team turned out to play ball Monday — and that was just what it did in coming close to scoring an upset of the power-packed Lockwood Motors A team. The spunky B crew led through three and a half innings, and did not fall behind until the sixth frame in losing a 4-3 decision.

In spite of ending on the short end of the score, Jerry Droscher's nine earned a lot of fans and all but stole the show from the A crew. Jumping on the A team in the first inning the B crew built up a three run lead. Dan Withers led off the game with a base on balls

It also gives him good reason to claim he's the best relief pitcher in the senior circuit. A 6-foot, 3-inch, 200-pound left-hander who failed in previous major league trials with Cleveland, Detroit and Washington, Woodeshick has been shooting bullets in relief all season. He's pitched in 27 games and allowed only 10 earned runs in 68 innings. Woodeshick raised his season record to 3-3 Monday night when he yielded one run in three innings to gain credit for the Colts' 4-3, 11-inning win over the St. Louis Cardinals. It was the Colts' second straight victory over the Redbirds and sliced their NL lead to a half-game.

**In Extra Innings**  
What makes Woodeshick's record even more distinctive is the fact the Colts don't score many runs and he's had to battle for his wins in extra innings. The Colts have won six of their last seven extra-inning games, and Woodeshick has been the winning pitcher in every one of them.

Bill White doubled home the tying run against Woodeshick in the ninth inning Monday night but then Hal stopped the Cardinals cold and Colts finally won out in the 11th on Rusty Staub's two-out single which scored Ernie Fazio. Fazio led off the 11th with a bunt single and a moved to second on Johnny Temple's sacrifice.

The Dodgers moved to within a half-game of the Cardinals when they beat the Milwaukee Braves, 2-1, the Cincinnati Reds defeated the San Francisco Giants, 4-3, and the Philadelphia Phillies scored an 8-1 victory at Wally Moon's double. Johnny Podres pitched a five-hitter and struck out 12 to register his fifth win of the season. Frank Howard homered for the Dodgers and Gene Oliver connected for the Braves.

Home runs by Tommy Harper and Ken Walters paved the way for Cincinnati's Jim Maloney to score his 12th victory against three defeats. Ed Bailey homered for the Giants, but Billy O'Dell suffered his fourth loss compared with 10 wins.

Don Cardwell pitched a four-hitter and struck out eight to win his fourth game for the Pirates when Bill Virdon singled home Ron Brand with two out in the ninth inning.

and Chuck Person followed with a base rap. Mike Cashner then rapped a sharp grounder at the shortstop with Bob Manning tossing to Wally Moon's double. A double play, however, threw out a double from the second baseman as Withers crossed the plate and Person moved to third.

Cashner got on his horse and took off for second base on the next pitch. The throw got away from Manning. Cashner went to third on another bobble and scored when Ray Shepherd drilled a single past second base.

The A team battled from behind with one run in the bottom of the first inning as Mike Blomberg doubled and Manning singled.

In the fourth the No. 1 Roseburg Legion crew tied the count with four consecutive base hits. Manning started the rally with a double and Tom Morrison followed with a triple. A single by Mike Markham tied the game at 3-3.

Bruce Wasson followed with a base blow, and both he and Markham took an extra base when the ball got by the outfielder.

However, with runners on second and third and no outs, Russ Hubbard settled down and got the next two batters to pop up, then after walking Ron Westbrook to load the bases, he retired the side by getting Jerry Boucek to hit a pop fly to third base.

The winning run scored in the sixth inning when Wasson doubled, moved to third on a wild pitch and scored on an error at the plate after Jon Burnham had fled out to short right field.

The B team threatened to score in the fifth and seventh frames, but could not manage to find the necessary power. In the fifth with two away three successive singles by Person, Cashner, and Steve Young had fans cheering, but Person was tagged at the plate when he tried to score from second on Young's base rap to left field.

With two away in the seventh the B team got the tying run to third before a fielder's choice ended the game. Withers walked and Person was safe on an error which allowed the lead runner to go to third. Cashner then sent a hard-hit one-hopper at Markham who knocked the ball down and tossed to Manning covering second to force Person.

"From tee to green, I played the best I have all year," said Palmer, who had taken four weeks off the tour to rest after a sorry showing in the Colonial at Fort Worth.

## Palmer Captures Cleveland Open; Shoots For Third British Crown

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—Arnold Palmer, with a new money record of \$85,545 in the bank, today planned a "vacation" during which he will shoot for his third straight British Open golf championship.

"I guess I've proved I could come back," said the guy who apparently had never been away from the manner in which he ripped Tony Lema and Tommy Aaron in a playoff for the \$22,000 top money in the \$110,000 Cleveland Open golf championship.

He was the Palmer of old as he fired a four-under-par 32-35—67, despite a non-existent bogey on the final hole, to win by three unpressed shots and break his all-time money record of \$81,448, which he set last year.

Whatever he wins in the British Open next week will not count in the "official" money winning records kept by the Professional Golfers Association.

But Palmer doesn't mind, for in the last three weeks, and all of them playoffs, he has picked up \$54,000. That doesn't include the \$1,500 bonus he received in the U.S. Open playoff or the approximately \$3,000 he received as his share of the gate receipts in Monday's playoff over the sunbaked, hot and humid Beechmont Country Club course.

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## Host Roseburg Favored To Emerge Victorious In Holiday Tournament

Four of the top Legion baseball teams in the state will be in action at Legion Field during the big Fourth of July Tournament scheduled to get under way Wednesday.

In the opening round of play Jefferson of Portland will meet The Dalles and Bend to square off against the host Lockwood Motors team in the nightcap. Action Wednesday will start at 6:30 p.m.

The tournament will wind up Thursday with the losers playing for third place at 1:30 p.m. and the winners of Wednesday's games meeting for the championship at 3:30.

The host Roseburg team will be favored to win the title on the basis of their 18.5 season record which includes a victory Monday

over the Roseburg B team. Jefferson of Portland, one of the stronger teams from the metropolitan area, is billed as the team most likely to provide trouble for the host crew, while Bend and The Dalles are perennial powers in Legion play and will be tough for the co-favorites in the opening round. Bend is the defending champion in the tournament.

In an effort to keep the first place trophy in Roseburg, coach Bill Harper probably will send ace lefty Ran Cool to the mound in the opening game against Bend, with Dick Williams set to throw in the second outing.

Cool has posted seven wins in as many starts for Lockwood Motors. The Drain southpaw is the strike-out artist of the staff having fanned 97 batters in 43 innings. The talented lefty has been tagged for 16 hits and has been charged with 17 walks.

Williams has a 5-1 record on the mound, with his lone loss coming in his opening game. The classy Roseburg right-hander has struck out 43, been tagged for 35 hits and issued 15 bases on balls in 42 innings.

Strong relief will be the key for the local team if it is necessary. Ready for action will be Ron Westbrook (2-2), Jerry Boucek (2-1), Rajallo Gutierrez (1-0) and Jon Burnham (1-1). Burnham's win came Monday against the local B team.

Veteran catcher Jim Beamer

will work behind the plate for Roseburg during the tournament. Beamer, rated as one of the best prep backstops in the state, is currently hitting the ball at a .318 clip and leads the team in RBIs with 18.

With Lance Casebeer out of action due to a broken heel, the second base slot will be filled by either Mike Markham or Rick Abrahamson. Other tentative starters in the infield include Dave Sevall at first, Artie McDonald at short and Boucek at third.

McDonald is also on the ailing list after being struck on the knee by a ball thrown to second by Beamer, and if he is not ready for full time duty Bob Manning will come in from centerfield to fill the gap at shortstop.

Regulars in the outfield include Mike Blomberg in left, Manning in center and Tom Morrison in right. If Manning is in the infield Harper will move Morrison to center and Bruce Wasson will start in right field.

Following the tournament play, Lockwood Motors will host the strong Medford crew in a pair of non-league outings Saturday at 6:30 p.m., then will return to Douglas Lane League action Sunday with a doubleheader at Willamette High against the Bethel Merchants (Willamette).
