Caribbean Tour, College Scholarship Offered As Top Prize In Wool Contest

Young fashionists, 13 through 21, who head for their sewing machines this summer may be stitching their way to a 14-day tour of the Caribbean, a college scholarship, or a share of \$35,000 in prizes to be awarded in the 17th national "Make It Yourself With Wool" contest, says Mrs. Charles McCord, Dillard, district contest chairman.

This year's contest is off to its earliest start on record with entry forms now available from Mrs. McCord and the Douglas County Extension Office. Forms may also be obtained at Ruth's Fabric & Notions, Miller's Department Store, Singer Sewing Machine Co. and Neechi-Elea Sewing Circle.

Last year, 311 girls entered the state contest, and Oregon's senior

winner, Miss Sandra Olson of Salem, was runner-up to the national winner.

The "Make It Yourself With Wool" home sewing contest for school girls, young marrieds and career girls is the major project of the Women's Auxiliary of the Oregon Wool Growers Association. Contests are scheduled in 16 districts throughout the state with the state finals slated in Portland, Nov. 3 and 4. Locally the district finals will be staged Oct. 19.

The national finals with the ultimate award of the Caribbean trip via Pan American jet clipper, savings bonds, scholarships, will be held during the convention of the National Wool Growers in Albuquerque, N.M., on Jan. 2.

The "Make It Yourself With Wool" home sewing contest has only one intent, according to Mrs. McCord: To acquaint young seamstresses with the characteristics that make wool a joy to sew and to wear.

The contest levels are geared to the sewing skill of seamstresses, 13 through 21. For instance, the very young and beginning seamstress gains confidence in the "Sub-Deb" class held on the district level for girls, 14 through 17, and the "Senior" division for girls, 18 through 21, the entries may be a dress, coat, suit or ensemble.

The only prerequisite, the chairman said: "The entry must be made of 100 per cent wool loomed in America."

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Attorney General Makes Appeal For Bipartisanship On 'Rights'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy stepped into a Democratic-Republican squabble over civil rights appealing for a bipartisan approach to the administration's proposal to ban discrimination on hotels and restaurants.

Kennedy sounded the call for a cooperative effort during his second day of testimony before the Senate Commerce Committee on public accommodations section of President Kennedy's civil rights package.

The attorney general's remarks followed an exchange between the committee and the chairman, Sen. Warren Magnuson, D-Wash.

Sens. Winston Prouty, Vt., and Hugh Scott, Pa., served notice that any compromise amendments to the bills would have to come from the Democratic side.

The GOP senators said they felt any Republican action would be interpreted as an attempt to weaken the bill. The attorney general Monday urged against any move that would weaken the proposal.

Kennedy told the committee today he felt the bill, as drafted in general terms, was satisfactory but "if you want to define it specifically we will be happy to cooperate."

Scott said this was the responsibility of the majority party. Magnuson remarked that every senator on the committee "has a responsibility to offer amendments" and said Republicans have done so on almost every bill before the group.

"To pass the buck would be to presuppose that you have no responsibility to make better legislation," Magnuson said to the Republicans.

Scott replied that any GOP amendment would be interpreted as a move to cripple the measure.

Prouty then said he would favor an amendment to make the anti-discrimination provision apply initially only to businesses doing over \$1 million business annually, and then graduate it over a five-year period until it applied to all businesses.

"This would give some assurance to the Negro community that we are making an effort to end discrimination in this country," Prouty said.

Calls Suggestion Fantastic

Sen. John O. Pastore, D-R.I., broke in to call Prouty's suggestion "fantastic." Pastore told Prouty, "If you believe it, you should offer it."

Prouty has made it clear before today's second round of hearings got under way on the accommodations ban that GOP members of the committee felt Democrats should take the lead in any compromise. Sen. Norris Cotton, R-N.H., also endorsed Prouty's statement.
