

# Spokane's Indians Top Dallas Texans In PCL Twin Bill

A tested baseball formula for winning pennants is to beat the top teams and win the close games.

The Spokane Indians have suddenly found the secret to that formula and are looking more like the potential Pacific Coast League champion every day.

Spokane took over the top spot in the PCL's northern division Monday night by sweeping a doubleheader from Dallas-Fort Worth, which entered the twin-bill as the southern division pacesetter.

And Tuesday night the Indians lengthened their Northern Division lead by rallying for two

runs in the ninth inning to extend Hawaii to extra innings and then winning the game in the 11th inning 6-3 on John Werhas' three-run homer.

**Rangers Climb**  
Dallas-Fort Worth, meanwhile, moved back to within a percentage point of the southern division lead by whipping Tacoma 5-3 while first place Oklahoma City was dropping a 4-2 decision to Seattle.

Elsewhere in the league, Cal Koonce tossed a strong five-hitter as Salt Lake City blanked San Diego 4-0 and Bob Uecker's eighth-inning homer powered Denver past Portland 5-4 for the Bears' eighth consecutive victory. A key fielding play by Spokane's Al Ferrara in the top of the ninth inning set the stage for the Indians' dramatic comeback against Hawaii.

The Islanders had the bases loaded with one out in the ninth when Stan Palsy lifted a fly ball to right field. Ferrara pulled down the ball and then fired a perfect strike to the plate to catch Tom Satriano attempting to score from third.

**Reed Wins 10th**  
Howie Reed, Spokane's fourth pitcher, was credited with his 10th win of the season. Tom Morgan took the loss for Hawaii.

Dallas-Fort Worth put together a single, two doubles, two intentional walks and a sacrifice fly for four runs in the first inning and were never in serious trouble thereafter.

The Rangers' George Bamberger won his fifth game of the season, and second against Tacoma although he needed help from Jim Rantz in the ninth when Cap Peterson and Bob Barton hit consecutive home runs with two outs.

**Two-Hitter**  
Seattle's Pete Smith dominated the Rainiers victory at Oklahoma City. The strong righthander held the 8pers to just two hits, but one of them was a home run by catcher Hal Smith in the fourth with a runner on base.

Bill Tuttle slammed a long two-run triple in the sixth to provide Seattle with the go-ahead runs. Denver took an early lead with a three-run outburst in the second inning, but Portland rallied for four runs in the sixth to move in front.

**Salmon Evens Count**  
Chico Salmon pulled the Bears even with a solo home run in the seventh and Uecker won it with his circuit clout an inning later. Dick Kelley pitched the distance for Denver to record his third victory in seven decisions.

Koonce turned in his best pitching performance since being sent down to Salt Lake City from the Chicago Cubs. His masterful five-hitter moved the Bees into third place in the Southern Division, a half-game ahead of San Diego.

# Glenn (Junior) Johnson Favored Thursday In 'Firecracker 400' At Daytona Beach

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Glenn Robert Johnson is a hard man to catch when he gets his hands on a steering wheel and you can't hardly blame him.

There was a time when "Junior," as he is known to the stock car racing fraternity which is gathered here for Thursday's "Firecracker 400" mile automobile race, wasn't quite fast enough.

Seems like "Junior," so-called because he was named after his pappy, once was caught with his motor cold when the revenoers showed up at the family's white lightning plant up in Wilkes County, N.C.

In that section, from time almost beyond memory, it has been

accepted as part of the local tradition that certain folks are entitled to make their own squeez-ins. The local folks have one idea and the government has another.

Anyhow, Junior's pappy was ailing and Junior was looking after things when the tax likers and people collectors came to call. Junior went on a small vacation, and came back a man who rightly intended that nobody else was ever gonna catch him again.

**One of Favorites**  
Which makes him one of the favorites in the 400, particularly in view of the fact that he is fresh off a victory in the Dixie 400 at Atlanta.

Junior is billed now as a chicken farmer out of Ronda, N.C., having turned his back on the

beverage business, and he proved that there had better not be anybody here who is chicken when he wheeled his Chevrolet one lap in a tuncup over the Daytona International Speedway at a whistling 165.593 miles per hour.

Just in case you think these stock car fellers are running for fun, let it be pointed out that Junior earned \$16,385 in copping the Dixie 400, which is about double the annual minimum wage in baseball's major leagues. And Fred Lorenzen is leading the stock car drivers' money winning list with more than \$69,000 already this year, which compares favorably with the top golf pros and baseball players.

It's a bit more hazardous, of course, than facing Don Drysdale's fast ball or keeping your nerves under control when you have to dunk a 10-foot putt to finish in the money. But these guys take it all in stride, one obvious reason being that it's better than sailing down a mountainside with revenoers behind you holding a fistful of pistol.

**May Set Record**  
The winner Thursday is expected to have to average right around 160 miles per hour with Fireball Roberts, one of the top NASCAR chauffeurs, asserting boldly that it might go close to 165 miles per hour. Which makes it, between these figures, the fastest 400 miles ever run anywhere by any kind of car. Daytona already holds the record for the fastest 500 miles, Fireball's 152,529 in winning the 1962 Daytona 500.

Three USAC stars are challenging the NASCAR pilots for the \$64,000 prize money. They are Troy Ruttman, 1952 Indianapolis winner in a Mercury; A. J. Foyt, the 1961 Indy winner, in a Smokey Yunick Chevrolet, the same one in which John Rutherford set a world mark of 165.183 for two laps at Daytona last February; and Paul Goldsmith, the present USAC stock car champion.

A field of 500 is expected to start before a crowd of 40,000. The revenoers won't have a chance.

# Dynamic Tennis Slugger From San Antonio Favored Over German Star In Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, Eng. (UPI)—

Chuck McKinley, the dynamic tennis slugger from San Antonio, Tex., was favored to whip German upstart Willy Bungert today and reach the men's singles final of the Wimbledon championships for the second time in three years.

The other semifinal match on the famed center court at the All-England Club pitted second-seeded Manuel Santana of Spain against unseeded Fred Stolle of Australia.

McKinley, ranked No. 1 in the States and seeded fourth here, hopes to become the first Yank to win the men's crown since Tony Trabert walked off with the trophy in 1955. Chunky Chuck almost made it in 1961 when he marched all the way to the final before bowing to Australia's Rod Laver.

Bungert, a 24-year-old student architect, gained the semifinals by surprising top-seeded Roy Emerson of Australia in a five-set thriller Monday. He looked ahead to his match with McKinley with great confidence.

"Of all the players in the semifinals, McKinley is the one I fear least," said the unseeded German upstart. "I don't know why exactly because he has beaten me this season (at Bristol last month). But I understand his game much better than that of the others and I think I can beat him this time."

Santana ruled a slight favorite over Stolle, who eliminated Frank Fochling of Coral Gables, Fla., in the quarter-finals.

Chances for the first All-American final in the women's singles since 1957 improved Tuesday when Darlene Hard of Los Angeles and Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., won their quarter-final matches.

In Thursday's semifinals, Miss

Hard will meet top-seeded Margaret Smith of Australia in a rematch of last year's U.S. final at Forest Hills, N.Y., won by the powerful Aussie, and Miss Moffitt will play Ann Haydon-Jones of England.

Miss Moffitt reeled off her second straight upset Tuesday when

she whipped Maria Bueno, two-time champion from Brazil, 6-2, 7-5. The 22-year-old Californian surprised second-seeded Lesley Turner of Australia in the previous round.

# Houk Said To Be Upset Over Blasts BY Stuart

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ralph

Houk, never one to dodge a fight, fired right back at Dick Stuart today in the first rharbarb of the 1963 All-Star Game.

Stuart, putting in his first season in the American League with the Boston Red Sox and leading the circuit's first basemen in homers and runs batted in, finished second to Joe Penitone of the Yankees in the balloting by the players but was passed over by Houk.

"It's tough to have a third-string catcher like Ralph Houk keep you off the All-Star team," Stuart said, according to the Boston Record American. "What would he know about how important it is to be on an All-Star team? He never made one in his life. All he ever did was sit in the dugout."

The Yankee manager, who will handle the American League All-Star team in Cleveland on July 9, was calm when he learned of Stuart's remarks but suddenly snapped.

In the last game of the recent Red Sox series here — it was an important game — and his own manager (Johnny Pesky) used a fellow by the name of (Dick) Williams at first base."

Houk was upset over Stuart's criticism but tried his best to conceal his feelings.

"I don't blame him for being mad," the Yankee manager said at first. "I'm sorry he feels that way about it, but a manager can't always stick to the second choice in the balloting."
