Port Of Umpqua Protests Design Of South Jetty

The Port of Umpqua Commission this week voiced strong protests to the design of the Umpqua south jetty now being built near Reedsport. Members feel it is too short.

The commission authorized Thomas J. Murray and attorney Oren Collier to arrange a meeting with the chief of the Corps of Engineers, through members of the Oregon congressional delegation. And Port Commissioner O. H. Hinsdale was authorized to consult with Col. Sterling K. Elmsinger, Portland district engineer in an effort to emphasize the emergency nature of the problem as the commission sees it.

The commission contends that the jetty should stretch to a concrete block near the end of the jetty now being built. It says the block is a navigational hazard. The reason for leaving the gap is not known.

Hinsdale and Salmon Harbor Manager Harry Ludwig described it as "a death trap." They say the loss of the lumber barge Mendocino Woodman in June was attributed to the block and its relationship to the visible end of the jetty.

Commissioners report the gap between the jetty end and the large concrete block was recognized several months ago, but it was thought the Corps of Engineers, which has the prime contract, and Umpqua River Navigation, which Hinsdale owns, to obtain price adjustments for additional rock to fill the gap.

The gap between the end of the jetty and the concrete block is 103 feet at the waterline.

BOSTON (UPI) — Mrs. Ethel Kennedy, wife of Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, and their eighth child, a 6-pound 14-ounce boy, were in "good" condition today at St. Elizabeth's Hospital.

The child, the couple's fifth son, was delivered at 6:48 p.m. Thursday by Caesarean section by Dr. Roy J. Heffernan. The baby was about a week ahead of schedule and was born on 88 minutes after a frantic helicopter flight from Cape Cod.

The newest arrival is President Kennedy's 13th nephew. He also has six nieces. It was not known immediately whether the President, who arrived at his summer home on Squaw Island Thursday only a few minutes after Ethel

Smith River Road Crash Claims Life

Three persons have died in Oregon traffic accidents since the Fourth of July weekend began Wednesday evening. In addition another person drowned and a man died in a car fire.

Alexander Volk, 48, Eugene, was killed Wednesday night in a one-car accident about six miles west of Burns. His brother, Richard, was reported in serious condition in a hospital.

Two other persons died in Thursday traffic accidents.

Mrs. Margaret Louise Bussey, 56, Milwaukie, died as a result of injuries suffered when the car she was in crashed on a curve on the Smith River Road near Reedsport.

Her husband, Benjamin, 63, and another passenger, Mrs. Melvin Johnson, were reported in serious condition at a North Bend hospital.

According to Reedsport Correspondent Dawn Pesau, the three were on a berry picking outing. The car, driven by Mrs. Johnson, a sister of Mrs. Bussey and wife of a well-known North Bend physician, failed to negotiate a sharp curve on the Smith River Road, five miles from Gardiner, police investigation shows.

The car reportedly sailed over the roadside fence and hurtled down a 55-foot embankment. Mrs. Bussey died shortly after the accident. Her husband and sister were removed by ambulance to the hospital.

The tragedy occurred shortly after 10 a.m. Thursday. The car was traveling west. Tire marks indicate it crossed the highway shoulder, cleared the fence and rolled over. According to a report of investigating state police, a sheriff's deputy and an assistant county medical examiner.

The car came to rest against a stand of alder trees, which broke the descent a few feet from a trailer house recently parked on the M. J. Norlander farm home property. No one was in the trailer.

Sharon Lee Christiansen, 18, Chiloquin, was killed in a one-car crash between Sprague River and Beatty. Police say the car apparently went out of control.

The driver, Henry Cole, also Chiloquin, suffered injuries. A 13-year-old Portland boy, Lawrence Robert Adams, drowned when he fell into the South Saniam River near Sweet Home Thursday evening.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Adams, a skin diver recovered the body.

David K. Lund, 36, Route 5, Oregon City, died early today when his car burned. The Clackamas County medical examiner's office said Lund apparently had gone to sleep in the back seat after driving home when the blaze broke out. It's cause was not determined immediately. Lund lived with a brother and sister-in-law.

Nine-Year-Old Lost In Forest

VANCOUVER, Wash. (UPI) — A 9-year-old boy was missing in the Gifford Pinchot National Forest today.

Sheriff's deputies and forest rangers were hunting Jim Bispington, Ridgefield, who became lost on a Fourth of July outing in the Sunset Recreation district about 60 miles northeast of here. The boy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Bispington, Route 1, Ridgefield.

Roseburg Man Winner Of Event At Albany

John Miller of Roseburg again proved he was one of the best loggers in the Northwest over the July 4th holiday by winning the ax-throwing contest and finishing second in the log sawing event at the Albany Timber Carnival.

He came in second to Max Searis of Toutle, Wash., in the log sawing contest.

All-around logger was Hap Johnson of Forks, Wash., who also won the title last year. Johnson was picked by fellow contestants.

An estimated 10,000 persons attended.

Maryland Troops Stay On Duty As Racial Violence Continues

About 400 National Guardsmen enforcing limited martial law in racially troubled Cambridge, Md. today were ordered to remain on duty through the weekend.

The troops, sent to Cambridge

Tawes to put down racial violence, were to have been removed at noon today but Adj. Gen. Milton A. Reekord of the Maryland National Guard announced that they would remain.

Cambridge officials had asked Tawes to keep the troops here at least through the weekend.

Hundreds Arrested

Some civil rights leaders in Cambridge have urged that racial demonstrations resume immediately after the troops depart. Negroes by the thousands staged anti-segregation demonstrations and allies in at least eight cities from New York to California Thursday, and there were arrests in two of the cities — Baltimore, Md., and Chapel Hill, N.C.

The 283 demonstrators taken into custody at Baltimore, where "freedom riders" from New York and Philadelphia sought admission to a segregated amusement park, included the Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, head of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

A biracial group of 45 pickets was removed bodily from a road at Hempstead, N.Y., when it attempted to block traffic to Jones Beach in a protest against alleged discriminatory hiring practices at the state park beach.

Around 450 persons marched through Chapel Hill, home of the University of North Carolina, to city hall where they sang "freedom songs." Police arrested three persons.

This will be the fifth consecutive year the Roseburg Shrine Club has presented the Rudy Bros. Circus as a benefit for Shrine activities.

New Chinese Protest Hits Soviet Union

MOSCOW (UPI) — Soviet and Chinese Communist leaders, locked in an all-out ideological battle for leadership of the Communist world, today held their first meeting in their showdown Moscow talks.

The Chinese delegation got a chilly reception when it arrived in an atmosphere electrified with hostility by a last-minute exchange of bitter charges.

The Chinese Communists and a high-level Soviet delegation went behind closed doors several hours later and met for an hour and 45 minutes.

The first meeting was held in the modernistic "House of Reception" in the Lenin Hills section of Moscow, where it was understood the Peking delegation will be staying during the negotiations.

Chief Soviet delegate Mikhail Suslov, the Kremlin's senior ideologist, had suggested to the Chinese on their arrival that the first meeting be held late this afternoon, but there was no announcement where it would be held.

Newsmen, however, finally spotted the delegates arriving at the House of Reception and checked them out an hour and 45 minutes later.

The Chinese negotiating team flew in by special plane from Peking and was met at the airport by Suslov.

But the Russia press ignored their arrival altogether. Neither the official radio, the Tass news agency, or the government newspaper Izvestia, announced the arrival.

Izvestia's edition rolled off the presses four hours after the Chinese Communists arrived so there would have been sufficient time to push news of their landing.

It was believed today's first Sino-Soviet meeting was devoted largely to procedural and protocol matters and the delegates would get down to business Saturday.

Relations between the two Communist giants were strained to the breaking point just hours before the opening session of the showdown talks that will determine the course of international communism.

Red China announced a bitter new protest against the Soviet Union earlier in the day, and the Russians printed a front-page editorial in the Communist party newspaper declaring they would not back down in the discussions.

The negotiations were called originally to restore peace to the Communist world, but the flurry of last-minute vitriolic charges and counter charges between Moscow and Peking cast strong doubt that any progress would be made.

Western observers felt there was a possibility of an historic split of the Communist camp.

The New China News Agency, monitored in Tokyo, said the Chinese delegation left Peking earlier in the day and flew via Siberia.

The Chinese apparently delayed the departure of their delegation to the last possible moment. There had been some speculation they might cancel or postpone the talks, especially after a new attack on Peking's position Thursday by the Soviet Communist party.

The Russians followed up Thursday's attack with a front page editorial in today's edition of the party newspaper Pravda, declaring the Soviet delegation would hold "unswerving" to the Khrushchev line's interpretation of Marxism-Leninism.

The latest Chinese protest, as reported by the New China News Agency, accused the Russians of creating "new obstacles" to the "unity" talks on ideological and political differences.

The protest was in connection with the recent expulsion of three Chinese diplomats and two students from the Soviet Union for distributing copies of a Chinese letter strongly condemning the Kremlin's position in the dispute.

The Kremlin refused to publish the letter.

Agreement Made

Simpson Timber Co., which is negotiating on an individual basis, has agreed to withdraw the "hours of labor" article in its contract proposal, Williams pointed out. This has been tabbed by both union and management leaders as the chief stumbling block in negotiations. The article calls for no prime time (Saturday and Sunday) consideration for overtime payment, if one or both of those days fall within an employee's five-day work week.

The move by Simpson would return those days to overtime days even when they're part of the five-day week. Simpson also appears

ready to meet a demand for travel time pay to loggers, Williams said.

It was at 12:01 a.m. on June 5, a month ago today, that 300 IWA members of the U.S. Plywood Corp. plant in Roseburg walked off their jobs and established picket lines. This move came with a general strike against U.S. Plywood and St. Regis Timber Co., both members of the so-called "Big 6" manufacturers group.

Since that time, the other members of the Big 6 have closed their plants on a "strike one, strike all" basis. These closures, however, have not strongly affected the Roseburg area.

The only other workers in the

Roseburg area to feel the effect of the industry-wide strike have been some 30 members of the LSW employed by the J. H. Baxter Pole and Tie Co. plant in the Green area.

A strike against the Baxter plant in The Dalles and other affiliates forced closure of the plant here by cutting off sales outlets. Lee said most of the men hit by the Baxter closure were able to find other jobs, and those who did not find work became eligible for unemployment compensation.

Word Pending

The strike against Baxter Co. in The Dalles has been settled, but no word has been given on when the local plant will reopen. Work-

ers who have found other jobs will have five days to reclaim their jobs at the Baxter plant when it reopens, Lee said.

Both Williams and Lee said they have received tremendously favorable response to the \$1 per working day strike benefits assessment both unions to support strikers' applications for strike relief for IWA members on strike against U.S. Plywood were taken earlier this week, and Williams said vouchers for groceries will be ready on July 8.

The next major negotiating sessions have been scheduled for about July 10. There are no major sessions planned for this 4th of July weekend.
