The hatchery burned the spring of 1945. Breeder-owners all over the state who specialized in trap-nested, broad-breasted turkey hens, sent eggs to Watzig Hatchery to be hatched into poult and shipped back to their owners. Steady output of chicks and poult was in Southern Oregon and Klamath Falls.
