Many Preachers Are Likely To Make Jail This Summer

The high church officials who were arrested for taking part in a July 4th anti-segregation demonstration in Baltimore were the vanguard of a growing movement.
Before the summer is out, quite a lot of preachers are likely to land in jail.
Leaders of major religious bodies in recent weeks have issued fervent appeals to America's white Christians to join the struggle for racial justice as active allies of protesting Negro groups. "Now is the time for action—even costly action that may jeopardize the organizational goals and the institutional structures of the church," said the policy-making General Board of the National Council of Churches, in a resolution adopted last month.
It said Christians should be prepared to "suffer personal indignities, alienation and physical suffering" to bear witness to their conviction that "every child of God is a brother to every other."

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mitted the leaders of the National Council of Churches (who are generally synonymous with the leaders of the major Protestant denominations which make up the council) "to engage personally in other direct action in particular situations of racial tension."
To organize an effective program of church action for racial justice and get it rolling this summer, the council set up a 25-member Commission on Religion and Race.
The Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, stated clerk (chief executive officer) of the United Presbyterian Church and a former president of the National Council of the clergyman arrested in Baltimore.
Episcopal Bishop Daniel Corrigan, who was arrested along with Dr. Blake, is a top assistant to the Rt. Rev. Arthur H. Lichtenberger, presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church, who is chairman of the Commission on Religion and Race. Bishop Lichtenberger is ill and could not take part in the demonstration personally.

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CHANGES IN UKRAINE
MOSCOW (UPI)—Vladimir Shcherbitsky has been removed as premier of the Ukraine and given the job of regional Communist party secretary in the Dnepropetrovsk region, it was disclosed Sunday.
The Ukrainian Republic's party chief, Nikolai Podgorny, was released from his post last month but became one of the 14 secretaries of the Soviet Communist party.

Adventists Aid Mission Projects

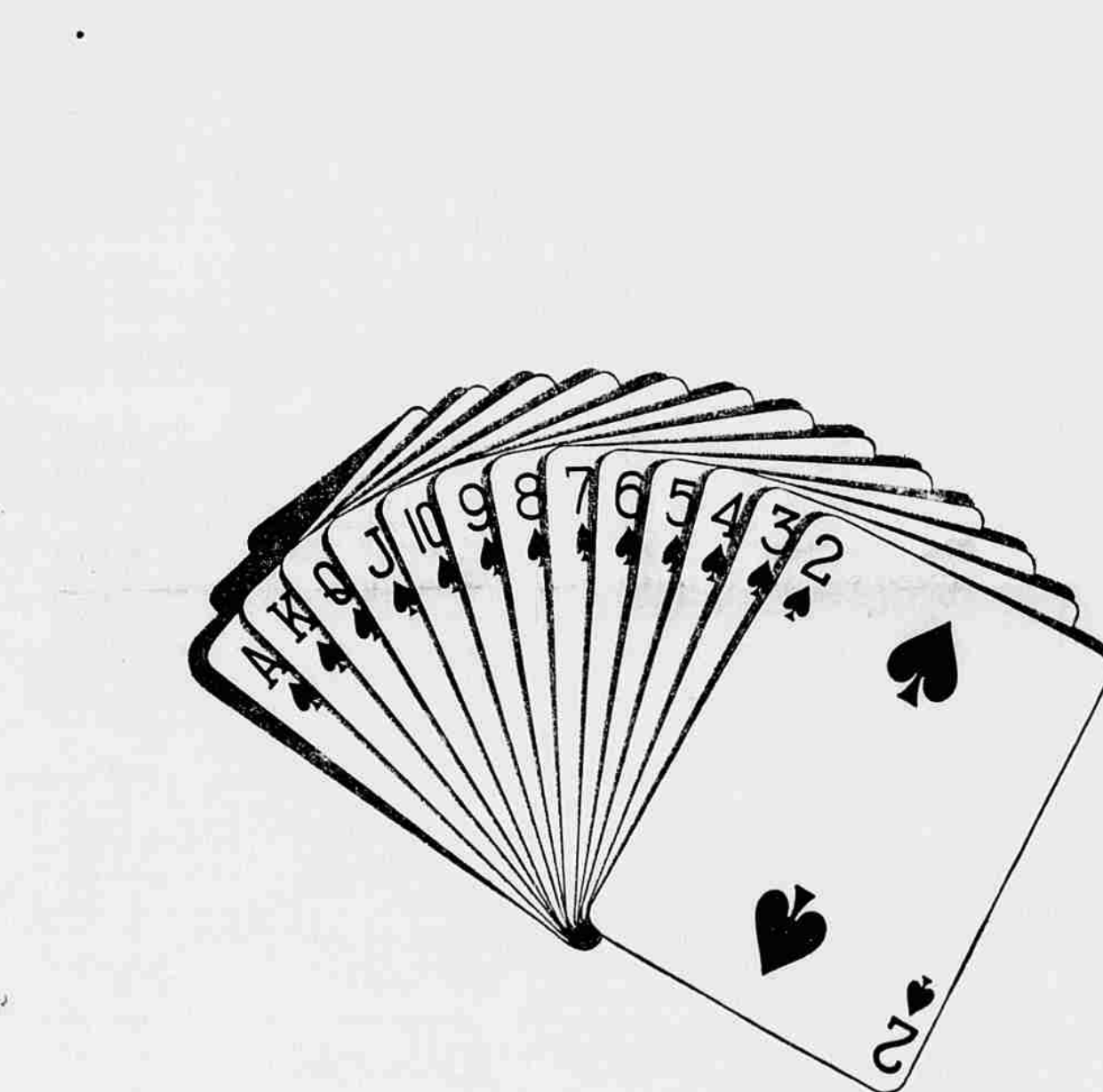
The Roseburg Seventh-day Adventist church contributed recently to a project in Mexico City which will eventually see 10 new Adventist churches erected there. Dr. Lewis Hart, Sabbath School superintendent, stated that present plans call for two community centers, each with a seating capacity of 200 to 300 persons. These will later become churches. At present there are five Adventist churches in the city.
The church also heard a report on its medical project for the past quarter—the Port-of-Spain Community Hospital in Trinidad, West Indies. The hospital is adding a new wing, the report said, which will bring its in-patient capacity to 100. The hospital now has 60 beds and is constantly filled to capacity. New, up-to-the-minute equipment is being added also in order to continue its efficient service to the community, the report stated.
The Seventh-day Adventist denomination operates 114 similar sanitariums and hospitals throughout the world, plus a like number of clinics, not including mobile clinics working in the field at set intervals in connection with established hospitals.
Students Interviewed
A special feature of the Sabbath School program was an interview between "Pat" Snow, director of the junior department of the local Sabbath School, and Miguel (Mike) and Victor Contreras who, with their parents, came to the Roseburg area from San Salvador. The boys attended the church's local elementary school last year. Mike was one of the graduates.
Another feature was a first-hand report from the island of Jamaica by Clarence Munroe, the father of Dr. A. B. Munroe, local physician. He stated that there are many Adventist churches on the island.
