

Legion 9 Extends Lead; Cool Tosses No-No Win

Power was the key to Roseburg's Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors rolling to their seventh and eighth consecutive Doug-Lane League triumphs Sunday at Willamette.

Home runs with men on base and RAN COOL's second no-pitching performance highlighted the 13-0 and 5-3 sweep of the counting double hit against the Bethel Merchants.

The twin victories gave the leading Roseburg team an 8-0 conference record and a 23-6 mark for the year. Willamette now sports a 1-0 league record and is resting alone at the bottom of the heap.

Cool went the full seven innings to gain his eighth victory against no setbacks. The flashy Drain southpaw curved the home team to death as he fanned 10 and held

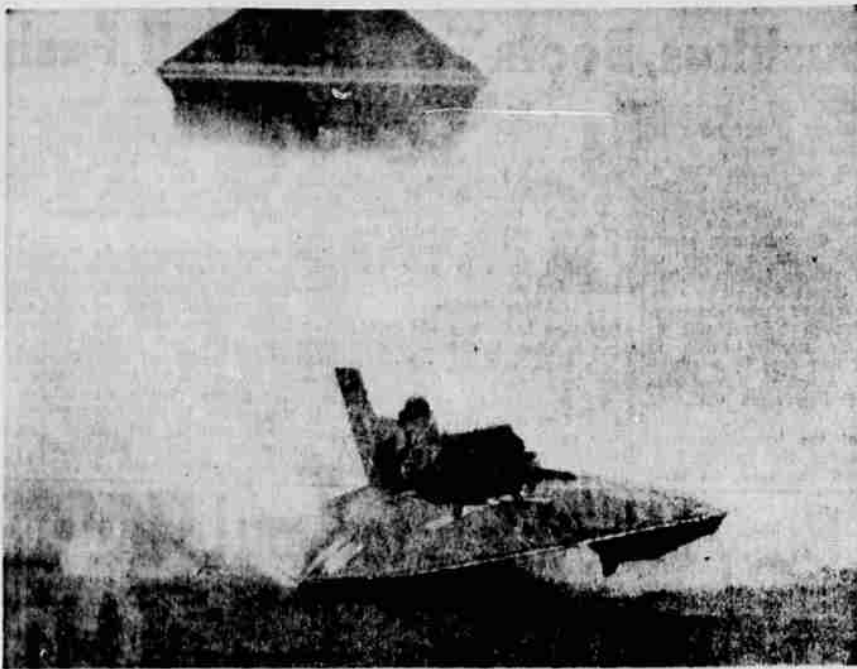

Houk Faces Pitching Dilemma; NL All-Stars Favored To Win

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—American League managers, putting the pennant race ahead of everything else, had Ralph Houk backed into an All-Star corner today.

Houk was faced with an "either-or" dilemma — whether to go with Ken McBride of the Los Angeles Angels, who will have had two days rest for Tuesday's 34th All-Star game, or his own rookie right-hander, Jim Bouton of the Yankees, who pitched two-thirds of an inning Sunday.

Meanwhile, Alvin Dark of the National League had well-rested southpaw Jim O'Toole of Cincinnati ready to go, and because of the uncertainty of the American League pitching, the Nationals were 3-2 favorites although playing in an American League park.

"If they let me, I'll name an either-or pitcher," said Houk, who was scheduled to name his starting hurler at a press conference today. "If they don't, well, I don't know which pitcher I'll name."

The press conference was scheduled for 10 a.m., EDT. Houk, directing the American League All-Stars for the third time, had Bouton, McBride and Bill Monbouquette of the Red Sox available as starting possibilities. McBride pitched Friday night while Monbouquette worked in relief Sunday, as did Bouton.

"I'd like to start someone with at least two days rest," Houk said.

That seemed to narrow the field to McBride, but Houk still could name Bouton who said he wasn't tired after Sunday's brief stint against Cleveland.

The Roseburg Merchants traveled to Salem Sunday to split a doubleheader with the host crew, winning the opener 8-7 and losing the nightcap 3-2.

Koufax Tosses 8th Shutout; Dodgers Increase NL Lead

Okay, baseball experts, who is the National League's top left-handed pitcher, Warren Spahn or Sandy Koufax?

If you are a Spahn fan you can quote statistics to back your argument all day long, and maybe through the night, too. Koufax fans can wrap up their argument in a hurry, mostly because Sandy hasn't been around nearly as long as the soon-to-be-43 Spahn. But they are imposing figures at that.

Koufax, who was only seven years old when Spahn began his major league career with the Boston Braves in 1942, hurled his eighth shutout of the season Sunday, only two short of the National League record of 10 set by Mort Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals in 1942 as the NL leading Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Cincinnati Reds, 4-0, in the first game of a doubleheader.

Spahn matched that performance about six hours later when he set the Houston Colts down on five hits in a 4-0 victory. It was Spahn's fourth shutout of the season and the 59th of his long career.

The victory was Spahn's 12th of the season against four losses, just three hits, is 14-3. Both are scheduled for some duty on Tuesday in the All-Star game in Cleveland. Spahn goes into the classic with an earned run average of 2.67. Sandy has an even more glittering average of 1.73.

The Dodgers wrapped up the first game against the Reds in the first inning when rookie third baseman Ken McMullen singled across two runs. Bob Purkey, who had been showing signs of regaining his old form after nursing a sore arm for most of the season, took the loss, his fifth against three victories.

Los Angeles also won the second game, 3-1, behind the seven-hit pitching of rookie Nick Wiltshire and Ron Perranoski. Catcher Doug Camilli hit the key blow, a two-run homer in the fourth, as the Dodgers widened their lead over the second-place San Francisco Giants to three games.

The Giants split their doubleheader with the St. Louis Cardinals, winning the first in 15 innings, 4-3, and the Cardinals taking the nightcap, 5-0. In the other games, the Philadelphia Phillies clipped the third-place Chicago Cubs, 3-2, and the Pittsburgh Pirates buried the hapless New York Mets, 11-5.

In the American League, the first-place Yankees split a doubleheader with the Cleveland Indians, rallying to take the nightcap, 7-4, in 10 innings after the Indians won the opener, 11-3; the extended their winning streak to seven by sweeping the Los Angeles Angels, 7-3 and 6-4; the Baltimore Orioles edred the Minnesota Twins in 10 innings, 4-3; the Chicago White Sox nipped the Boston Red Sox in 12 innings, 4-1, and Detroit and Kansas City split the Tigers winning the first game 5-1, and the A's the nightcap, 8-7.

Boyer Fumbles Grounder

The Giants struggled for three hours and 55 minutes before beating the Cardinals in their opener, the winning run coming across when Ken Boyer fumbled pinch-hitter Jose Pagan's grounder with the bases loaded and one out in the bottom of the 15th inning.

Bill White's 14th homer gave the Cards a 3-2 lead in the 13th but the Giants got that one back on a single by rookie Jim Hart and a double by Ed Bailey.

Stan Musial rapped a two-run homer in the seventh of the nightcap to break a scoreless tie and the Cards went on to score three more in the ninth as Bob Gibson picked up his eighth victory. Juan Marichal (13-4) was the loser. A crowd of 42,787, the Park's history, saw the doubleheader.

The Philadelphia Phillies beat the Cubs on Cookie Rojas' ninth-inning single and clutch pitching by Dallas Green. Green came on to get the final out after Ryne Duren filled the bases on successive walks to Billy Williams, Ron Santo and Ernie Banks. Jack Zaldschu (4-4) was the winner in relief of Art Mahafey.

The Pirates, who rapped New York pitching for 17 hits on Saturday night, kept right on going with another 15-hit assault, featured by homers by Smokey Burgess, Bob Bailey and Donn Clendenon. It was the Mets' 10th straight loss.

Roseburg Sweeps Two From Rugged Medford

Walks and a throwing error provided Roseburg with a pair of American Legion triumphs over a stubborn group of invaders from Medford in a non-league doubleheader Saturday at Legion Field.

The winners capitalized on five consecutive free passes issued by young Medford left-hander Dana Smith in the first inning of the opener to roll to a 7-4 victory.

The invaders had pounded out two hits, which coupled with one Roseburg error gave them a short lead in the opening frame.

Roseburg bounced back with one out as Mike Blomberg, batting right-handed, blasted a double to right-center. Bob Manning followed with a single to tie the score at 1-1. At this point Smith lost all signs of control and issued five straight walks before shortstop Dan Miles moved to the mound to put out the fire. Roseburg's winning run came as Mike Markham led off with a three-bagger and in attempting to get out of the way of a pitch Boucock hit a toppler in front of the plate. Pitcher Jim Calhoun threw blindly to first where no one was covering and Markham came home on the overthrow.

Mike Neathammer laid down a bunt which Brunham fielded and threw too late to second base. Ortega Posts Ring Victory

NEW YORK (UPI)—Victorious Gaspar Ortega, welterweight contender of Mexicali, Mex., and young Billy Bello of New York may be re-matched for another television 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden Aug. 24, promoter Harry Markson said today.

Markson was delighted with Saturday night's nationally televised bout at the Garden, where Ortega stretched his unbeaten string to eight fights and spoiled Bello's big-time debut by winning a split decision.

It was 20-year-old Bello's first TV fight and first Garden main event.

Ortega, 27, won the verdict, 5-4-1, 5-4-1, 4-5-1. One judge favored Bello. The United Press International had Ortega ahead, 5-4-1. And a poll of seven writers at the ringside favored Ortega, 6-1.
