

Dairy Maids Bop 'Jills On Hickson's 2-Hitter

The Roseburg Lumberjills will still be looking for their first win over the Rogue Valley Dairy Maids of Eagle Point when the two teams square off for a third meeting Thursday at Camp White.

Sunday the invading Dairy Maids, ranked as one of the top powers in the Oregon Women's Softball League, unleashed a 15-hit attack to drop the local girls by a 15-2 count.

The Dairy Maids were aided by seven Lumberjill errors, including three misuses in the first inning that saw the Rogue Valley team grab a quick 4-0 lead.

While her teammates were pounding two 'Jills pitchers, Doris Hickson tossed a nifty two-hitter and posted five strikeouts.

The big blow for the Lumberjills was Joan Heeter's two-run homer in the fourth frame. Miss Heeter pounded the ball to right-center for her round-tripper. Judy Zeigler picked up a single for the other Roseburg hit.

The victory gives the Dairy Maids a 2-0 record against the Jackson Wholesale sponsored Lumberjills. Thursday's battle between the two teams at Camp White will start at 8 p.m.

Injured Rookie Holds No Grudge

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Jim Ray Hart, the San Francisco Giants' rookie who received a broken shoulder blade Sunday, bears no ill will against hurler Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals.

"Gibson was just trying to pitch me tight and the ball got away from him," Hart said Monday from his bed at St. Luke's hospital. "I don't think he was aiming at me."

The Giants had called Hart up from their Tacoma, Wash., farm club Friday night. He went 2-for-5 in the opener Sunday, but then was felled in his first at bat in the nightcap.

Dr. E. C. Sailer, the Giants' physician, estimated that the fracture would take six weeks to heal.

After Hart left the game, Gibson had to duck in the third inning from a fast ball served up by Juan Marichal of the Giants. Plate umpire Al Barlick immediately walked to the mound and fined Marichal the automatic \$50 for throwing at hitters. Manager Alvin Dark of the Giants declined to discuss the incident afterwards.

Australian Lass Triumphs To Capture Tennis Crown

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI) — Billie Jean Moffitt, the fireman's daughter from Long Beach, Calif., remained the darling of the staid Wimbledon tennis crowds right down to the last shot in the 1963 women's singles final, but Margaret Smith, the top-seeded Australian, went home with the crown.

Miss Moffitt, the unseeded upstart who had banged her way into the final with a series of upset victories over seeded players, finally bowed to Miss Smith in the final Monday, 6-3, 6-4. Billie Jean had beaten Miss Smith in the second round of the women's singles a year ago, and a crowd of more than 17,000 crowded into the famed ivy-covered Center Court at Wimbledon in anticipation of a similar upset.

They cheered the bespectacled 19-year-old, even when she made errors, but a 48-hour delay because of rain apparently hurt Billie Jean more than tall Margaret, a 5-10 strawberry blonde generally recognized as the world's top woman player.

It wasn't a total loss for the United States, because Darlene Hard, Billie Jean's neighbor from Long Beach, teamed with Maria Bueno of Brazil to win the doubles title. They defeated Miss Smith and Aussie Robyn Ebberns, 8-6, 9-7.

Ritter Wins Oregon Tennis Championship

PORTLAND (UPI) — Top-seeded Horst Ritter of Germany turned back third-seeded Jerry Cromwell of Long Beach, Calif., 6-2, 9-11, 6-4 in the men's singles finals of the Oregon State Tennis Tournament Monday.

The match between Ritter, a 22-year-old student at Foothill College in California, and the 19-year-old Cromwell, a student at University of Southern California, was played at the Portland Armory because of rain.

Veterans Emery Neale and Sam Lee of Portland won over Ritter and Rod Kop of Hawaii 6-4, 7-9 and 6-3 in the men's doubles finals.

PCL All-Stars Score 4-2 Win Over Leading Spokane

The Pacific Coast League's 1963 All-Star game is in the record books, and Spokane pitcher Jack Smith is probably hoping it is quickly forgotten.

Spokane played host to the All-Stars Monday night for the second consecutive year and was making a strong bid for its second win in a row when Smith lost his control in a nightmarish sixth inning. A wild pitch by Smith, one of six in the inning, permitted the All-Stars to score what proved to be the winning run in their 4-2 victory.

With the score tied 1-1, Denver's Lou Klimchek opened the sixth with a single and advanced to second on a wild pitch. Dave Roberts of Oklahoma City walked and Hawaii's Herb Flews reached on an error to load the bases.

Smith then uncorked another wild pitch and Klimchek scored. Several plays later, Roberts scored the deciding run on another wild pitch by Smith.

Reliever Pete Richert gave up a run-producing single to Gil Garrido of Tacoma before finally retiring the side.

Spokane's John Werhas, who had a hand in both Indian runs, was voted the game's Most Valuable Player. Werhas tied the game at 1-1 with a bases-empty home run in the fourth and then scored Spokane's other run after singling in the sixth.

Portland pitcher Jose Santiago started the game for the A-Stars and shut out the Indians on one hit in the first three innings. He walked one man.

The league's regular schedule resumes tonight with three games on tap. All 10 teams will be back in action Wednesday.
