The beautifully decorated birthday cake was baked by Mrs. Charles Schulze and served by Mrs. Perley Oar.

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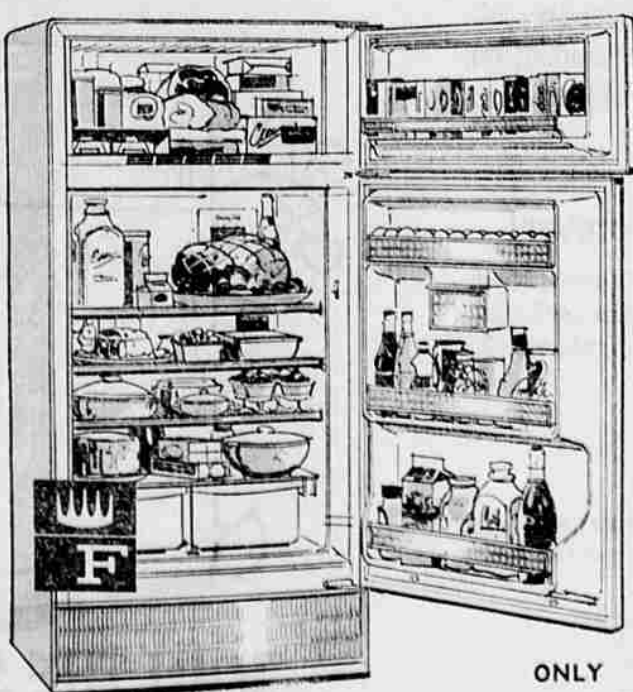
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
