German Hamlet, Astoria Note Birth Date Of A Butcher's Son

WALLDORF, Germany (UPI)—This German hamlet and Astoria, Ore., join together this month in celebrating the 200th birthday of a butcher's son who founded an empire in the new world that still stands.

Johann Jakob Astor was born in Walldorf, July 17, 1763, the son of a poor butcher, according to the village chronicle.

But young Astor emigrated to North America and made a fortune. He also founded Astoria.

His grandson, William, furthered the family empire by founding the famous Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York in 1896. William henceforth called himself Waldorf-Astoria, but no one knows why he dropped the second "A" in Walldorf.

The highlight of Astor Week in Walldorf, July 17-23 is the establishment of a sister-town relationship with the Oregon city. The mayor of Astoria is expected to attend the festivities.

Astor left at 18 "Nobbele," as butcher's son Johann Astor was known to his friends, left Walldorf at the age of 18 and joined his older brother in London. Then, in 1784, he left for the new world and got a job as apprentice with a New York fur dealer.

Within a year he had started his own firm, buying furs in the

Hudson River hunting grounds and Canada, and selling them in London at a good profit. In 1810 he sent an expedition to the West Coast and founded Astoria at the mouth of the Columbia River.

One reason for the link with Astoria is an attempt to revive the relationship, Walldorf Mayor Wilhelm Willinger said, "but we do not expect a donation from the rich uncles in America."

Twenty families named Astor now live in Walldorf, which sports an Astor Garden, an Astor Monument, the Cafe Astoria, and the Astor House, a home for old people built with a \$50,000 donation from Johann Astor.

Family Name Remains
Martin Astor runs a leather goods store in Walldorf, Hermann Astor is an upholsterer, Dr. Karl Astor is the village physician, and there is an Astor on the Astoria-Walldorf soccer team.

A picture of Astoria, Ore., decorates the dining room of the tiny Walldorf hotel, and another room contains a replica of a cabin in Johann Astor's flagship "Tonquin" that sailed past Cape Horn in 1810.

Enthusiastic Walldorfers also changed the name of their main road from "Nusslocher Strasse" to Johann Jakob Astor Strasse, and put up huge posters at the outskirts of the village advertising the birthday party.

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Russia's Latest Test Ban Offer Believed Sincere

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey said Tuesday there is a feeling in U.S. government agencies that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's new nuclear test ban offer is a proposal of "substance" rather than propaganda.

The Minnesota Democrat, chairman of the Senate Disarmament subcommittee, made the statement as President Kennedy expanded a policy meeting on the question into a full-blown National Security Council session.

The entire council was called in for a session with W. Averell Harriman, who will be chief U.S. negotiator at the test ban talks opening in Moscow July 15.

Humphrey, who plans to leave for Europe later this week, told reporters "I think there is a possibility of agreement on a limited nuclear test ban."

He added that there seemed to be "no evidence" that Khrushchev's parallel suggestion of a non-aggression pact was intended to be linked with his test ban proposal.

"There is a feeling in government agencies that Khrushchev's test ban suggestion is more than just a propaganda move — that there is substance in it," Humphrey said.

Kennedy scheduled the Security Council meeting earlier.

Desegregation Urged For Washington Town

SEATTLE (UPI)—The Washington State Board Against Discrimination Tuesday proposed a 15-point program to desegregate Kennewick, an all-white Columbia River Basin city referred to by a Negro leader as "The Birmingham of the North."

The board urged the Kennewick City Council to adopt an ordinance banning racial discrimination in employment, housing and public services. It also said the city housing authority should open its low-cost housing project to Negroes.

City, county, state and federal government offices were urged to hire Negroes in Kennewick. The board said that not a single Negro now works for a governmental unit in the city.

"Of the 14,244 people living in Kennewick, not one is a Negro; yet more than 1,200 Negroes reside in a ghetto, East Pasco, within three miles of the city," the board said.

"During sweet cherry week, and throughout the year, I would urge all homemakers to acknowledge the contribution of the cherry industry through use of fresh or processed cherries," the governor added.

Commonwealth Members Form Asian Union

LONDON (UPI)—An agreement was signed early Tuesday for the formation of the Federation of Malaysia, creating a new anti-Communist bastion in Southeast Asia.

The federation will merge Malaya, an independent member of the British Commonwealth, and Singapore, Sarawak and North Borneo — all remnants of the British empire in the Asia region.

A fifth proposed member, the tiny oil-rich sultanate of Brunei, decided to stay out for the time being. The sultan of Brunei made it plain, however, that with "satisfactory terms" he wants to join.

The signing of the agreement shortly after midnight insured that the federation would become effective as scheduled next Aug. 31.

The union will encompass 10 million people, including Malays, Chinese, Indians and indigenous Borneo stock. Its land area of 128,352 square miles will stretch from the southern tip of Thailand to the southern shores of the Philippine archipelago.

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said at the signing ceremony that Malaya and Singapore "had provided the success story of Asia," and expressed confidence the new federation would have a bright future.

The federation in effect extends the staunchly pro-Western federation of Malaya across the southern stretches of the South China Sea to form a bulwark against expansion of Communist Chinese influence. Malaya, whose people make up 70 per cent of the new federation's population, is the dominant member by far.

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
