

Willie Mays Leads National Leaguers To All Star Victory

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — The 34th All-Star game proved little or nothing, except that Willie Mays, even at 27, will may be the greatest star of them all. He batted in what proved to be the winning run, set two All-Star records and tied another as he led the National League to a 5-3 triumph over the American League before 44,160 fans in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium.

It was a gold-star performance in what was a lack-lustre game. Mays saved it from being routine. And while he was the hero, it was manager Ralph Houk's own players from his mighty New York Yankees who turned out to be the goats. Bobby Richardson, his usually flawless fielding second baseman, messed up a play that eventually resulted in setting up a fifth inning run which turned out to be the difference.

And it was Joe Pepitone, another flashy fielder, who let that run score.

Series Near Even

It was a game which brought the National League to within one victory of being even with its rival circuit in this competition which goes back 30 years—and which saw among other things: —The pitcher who gave up the most runs and most hits—Larry Jackson of the Cubs—being the winner as the National League won its 16th game against 17 defeats in what is billed as one of baseball's top events.

—The pitcher who pitched the best—except for a ball in the eighth and that error by Richardson—was the loser. That would be Jim Bunning, the right-hander of the Detroit Tigers, who suffered his

first All-Star defeat.

—A superb two innings of clutch pitching—the eighth and ninth—by fast-ball side wheeler Don Drysdale of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

—The littlest guy on either team collecting the longest hit, a double by Albie Pearson, the fine center fielder of the Los Angeles Angels.

—A game in which National League All-Star manager Al Dark of the San Francisco Giants made good his pre-game claim "we'll win". It made his All-Star record as a manager, 1-0, completing a new All-Star cycle—first as a player, then as a coach and finally as a manager.

Big Inning

There was what turned out to be that big fifth-inning that produced the "gift" unearned run.

Bunning was pitching and the score was 3-3 when Tommy Davis of the Los Angeles Dodgers led off with a walk. After Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves fled out, St. Louis Cardinal first baseman Bill White hit a ground ball to third baseman Frank Malzone of the Boston Red Sox.

Malzone, off balance, rifled a throw to second and Richardson, who had been playing deep with a left-handed batter at the plate, appeared to be a little late covering the base. The ball bounced off Richardson's glove and rolled into center field, Davis racing to third.

"The ball was right on the bag, I should have had it," said Richardson. He accepted the stigma for the American League defeat because, in addition to that play, he grounded into double plays both times he was at bat.

Then young Pepitone came into the spotlight.

He scooped up a ground ball hit by Mays and it looked like he would have had Davis out by 10 feet had he thrown to the plate. He elected, after a moment's hesitation, to throw to first instead.

"I thought Pepitone made the right play," Houk said later in the dressing room. "If he had missed the runner at home, it might have opened the way for a big rally. It was only the fifth inning and we couldn't afford to gamble on that play. We had only been to bat four times at that point."

Fail To Score

As it turned out, the American Leaguers might just as well have given up their next five times at bat. For first Ray Culp of the Philadelphia Phillies, then Hal Woodeshick of the Houston Colts and Drysdale turned them back without a score.

Mays helped. He went against the wire fence in centerfield to take an extra-base hit away from the unfortunate Pepitone in the eighth inning.

Before that he had: —Stolen first in the second inning after getting on with a walk out for pitcher Larry Jackson in the fifth inning. But that didn't keep the partisan American League crowd of 44,160 at Municipal Stadium from giving him the biggest hand of the day when he stroled to the plate to face Detroit pitcher Jim Bunning.

"I really like these games," he said with the honest enthusiasm of a kid after the contest was all over. "Of course, I've got to admit I was much more excited about it when I played in my first one, but I still get a big kick out of being in them."

Before the game even started, the veteran Cardinal outfielder was questioned on whether he might decide to play next year merely because of the opportunity of setting a few more important records. But he said that wouldn't necessarily influence him.

"Those records are all right," he said, "and there always seems to be another one in view but at this stage of the game they're not that vital. I don't think my decision on whether or not to keep playing would hinge on any records."

With the NCAA championship already tucked away, the tall, thin youth from Wichita, Kan., is playing at the peak of his game and is rated the favorite to go all the way.

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The winners struck paydirt in the third frame with a three-run rally. The uprising came on one base hit and three errors. The Merchants added two more insurance runs in the fourth inning on a two-out single by Estel Shike.

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Ribbons will be awarded to the first three place winners in each event by the Roseburg Parents' Swimming Team Association. Races will be held in the freestyle, backstroke, breaststroke and butterfly strokes.

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The Junior Olympic meet will start at 2 p.m. Immediately following the swimming events there will be competition in the one-meter diving. The complete list of events will be posted at the pool prior to the meet Monday.

Burnham Fires One Hitter; League Pair Slated Tonight

Jon Burnham regained control of his sharp-breaking curves Tuesday to toss a one-hit victory for the Lockwood Motors American Legion Juniors of Roseburg.

Following a couple of shaky appearances on the hill, the talented Roseburg southpaw proved tough for the invading Ashland crew as he picked up a 9-3 non-league triumph.

Tuesday's victory was the 24th for the local power in 29 starts this season. Roseburg will be out to improve its 8-0 league record tonight when Martin Bros. Signs (North Eugene) invades for a pair of conference outings at 6:30 p.m.

In rolling to the victory Tuesday, Burnham struck out 16 and scattered five walks over the nine-inning route. His bid for a no-hitter was spoiled in the fourth inning as Jan Susee led off with a sharp single to right field.

However, some sloppy fielding behind Burnham paved the way for three Ashland runs. Both teams had some trouble fielding as a total of 15 errors were recorded—eight by the visitors and seven by Roseburg.

Roseburg blew what was a close game for the first five and a half innings wide open with its strong display of power in the late innings.

Jim Beamer, Tom Morrison and Artie McDonald led the attack at the plate. Beamer had a 3-5 record, including a smashing triple in the seventh frame. Morrison was 2-3 at the plate with a double in the seventh, and McDonald had two singles in five appearances. Mike Blomberg smashed a booming triple in the eighth stanza.

The winners started the scoring with a single run in the first when Blomberg drew a walk, stole second and scored after two were out when Beamer was safe on an Ashland miscue.

Ashland took the lead in the fourth inning with a two-run uprising. Susee led off with his single and John Rhodes laid a bunt down the first base line which Burnham fielded and threw wild to first base with the runners ending on second and third. Susee raced home when Tim Voth's grounder was bobbled and Rhodes scored on a fielder's choice.

In the bottom of the fifth Roseburg moved out in front to stay, scoring three runs on three hits, two Ashland errors and a hit batsman. Blomberg was hit by the pitcher to start the rally. Bob Manning and Beamer followed with back-to-back base raps, with Blomberg scoring on the second hit.

Two Roseburg double plays kept Burnham out of trouble in the early innings. After issuing a walk to the lead off batter in the first inning, a sharp grounder to McDonald at shortstop was turned into a fast twin-killing, going from short to Rick Abrahamson at second to Sevall at first. A strikeout and a bulseye throw to second by Beamer provided another double play in the second inning.

Third baseman Jerry Boucock turned in the fielding play of the game in the eighth inning when he raced far to his right and hauled in a pop foul off the bat of Voth. Boucock rammed into the wire fence, but managed to keep the ball wedged in the web of his glove.

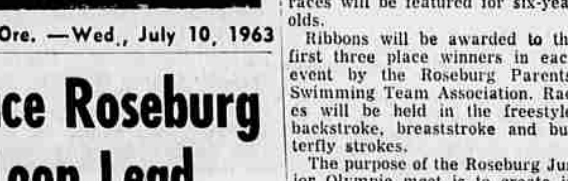

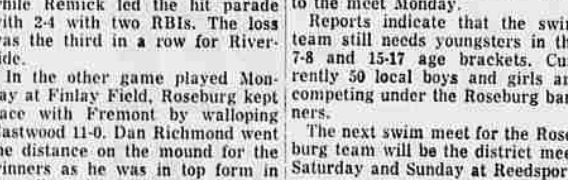
TOM MORRISON ... packs big bat

JERRY BOUCK ... hauled in a pop foul



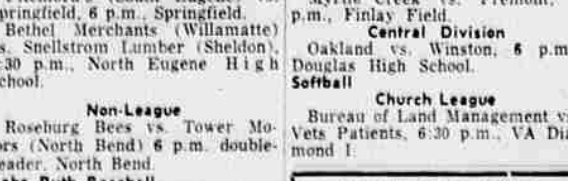

They are John James, North Bend, a 6-4 player who set scoring and rebounding records for his school; Byron Strickland, Portland, a 6-0 all-city guard from Roosevelt High; and Dave Green, Milwaukie, a 6-5 all-Metro League player.

Three Idaho prep stars also are on the scholarship list. They are Rod Boyman, Troy, 6-1; Dave Schlotthauer, Post Falls, 6-7; and Mike Wicks, Coeur d'Alene, 6-0. Goddard moved to Idaho this spring from Lewis and Clark College.

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
