New York's Mayor Visits Ailing Son in Paris Hospital

PARIS (UPI) — New York Mayor Robert F. Wagner arrived Wednesday on an emergency visit to his hospitalized son, leaving behind a sit-in demonstration on his official doorstep.

Wagner flew here after receiving word that his 19-year-old son, Robert Jr., had undergone surgery for a ruptured appendix Monday night and was suffering from a mild case of peritonitis. A hospital spokesman said this morning his condition was satisfactory. The youth, a student at Harvard University, arrived here recently to begin a summer job with the Paris branch of the Manufacturers Hanover Trust Co. He became ill during the past weekend and entered the American Hospital on Monday.

As he left his office Tuesday in New York's City Hall, Wagner had to squeeze past 14 pickets of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE). The demonstrators sat down in the corridor leading to his office in a demand for more construction jobs for Negroes and Puerto Ricans.

The demonstrators said they would remain in City Hall until action is taken on a series of proposals made to Wagner before he left New York. A major goal of the CORE group was the suspension of work on city-financed construction projects until minority groups are given more construction jobs.

Wagner met with the group for 20 minutes and told them he was sympathetic to their cause but would not decide on the proposals until he receives a report later this week from a special committee probing charges of bias in the building trades.

"We will stay here all night, a week or longer if necessary," said one member of the CORE group, 21-year-old Eva Kerr. The demonstrators remained at their posts near the mayor's office today. Asked whether he thought the sit-ins were violating any laws, Wagner replied, "I have a lot more important things on my mind."

Cuban-Born Pilot Defects To Castro

MIAMI (UPI) — Havana Radio reported this week that a Cuban-born U.S. airman, reported missing on a flight from Miami to Pensacola, has defected to the Communist island.

The news broadcast identified the pilot as Roberto Ramos Michelena.

Ramos, 26, an airman stationed at Tyndall Air Force Base near Pensacola, was reported missing Monday after he vanished on the scheduled flight.

(In Washington the Defense Department confirmed that Ramos was "missing.")

"The pilot, Roberto Ramos Michelena, has deserted the United States Air Force and has returned to our country," the Havana radio broadcast said.

The broadcast said Ramos, flying a T34 training plane owned by the Tyndall AFB Aero Club, landed in Cuba Monday.

The airman's wife, Gloria, 26, said she did not understand why Ramos defected. She said Ramos had been in the Air Force for six years and was "happy with his work."

Ramos, on a weekend pass from the base, was to fly the T34 to Homestead Air Force Base just south of Miami to pick up a friend, then return home. The search began when he failed to show up at Homestead.

Thornton Places Titles On Constitution Changes

SALEM (UPI) — Titles and statements of purpose for three proposed changes in the Oregon constitution to be voted upon next year were announced here by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton.

The titles, and statements assigned by Thornton are:
Capital Punishment Bill — To amend constitution to abolish the death penalty for murder in the first degree and to make the penalty life imprisonment.

State Bonds for Higher Education Buildings — To amend constitution to authorize state general obligation bonds up to \$30 million for higher education building projects. Authorizes tax levy to retire bonds.

Leasing Property for State Use — To amend constitution to permit State of Oregon and its agencies to lease real property for a period not exceeding 20 years.

City Gets Fluoride

VANCOUVER, Wash. (UPI) — Fluoride is being added to Vancouver's water supply this week. City Manager Jack Slayton said the first of five pumping stations started adding the chemical ions to the water Monday. The final station will have the ions Friday. Fluoridation of the water supply system was approved by the voters last November.

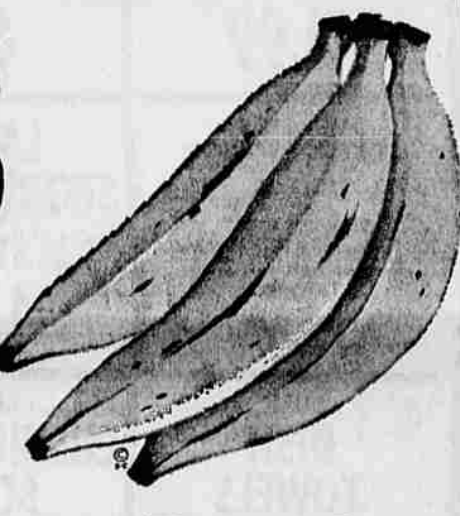
