'Lady Rich' Is Romantic Story
Of Celebrated, Beautiful Woman

With its brilliant masques, processions and balls, its court intrigues and affairs, "Lady Rich" by Elizabeth Boatwright Coker offers stunning pageant of the court of Queen Elizabeth of England.

A Bewitching Figure
This is the romantic story of Penelope Devereaux, one of the most beautiful and spirited women of her age.

She came from a noble heritage; the daughter of Earl of Essex, she was descended from the Plantagenets on her father's side and through her mother was related to Anne Boleyn and Queen Elizabeth. But more powerful than either her beauty or her heritage was her enemy, the queen's favorite, Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester. It was Leicester who prevented her marriage to Mountjoy, the man she loved since childhood, the man whose eight children she bore. At Leicester's instigation and by court decision, Penelope Devereaux was forced to become the wife of Robert Rich, the wealthiest — and the most licentious man in London.

This is an unforgettable love story involving a celebrated and bewitching woman and the most famous figures of her day.

Published After Death
Written for young moderns, "They Survived" by Wilfrid Noyce

On July 24, Wilfrid Noyce fell to his death while descending Mount Garmon in the Pamirs of the Soviet Union. During his eventful life he had won fame as a brilliant mountaineer and as a highly successful writer. Wilfrid Noyce spent much of his life in the shadow of possible and sudden death and was deeply interested in the characteristics that enabled certain men and women to survive in situations of exceptional hardship and danger.

Just before leaving on his last expedition, he finished the writing of "They Survived," a vivid, imaginative, yet authentic study of great cases of survival and of the psychological and spiritual powers which made them possible.

He shows the various quirks of mind and personality that are brought out by situations of great danger and which enable individuals possessing them to survive where others would go under. These characteristics are illustrated by true cases; that of the Scottish coal miner entombed in a cave-in for 23 days before rescued; the experiences of people who have survived seemingly incurable diseases; the survival of a young Finn who drifted alone on a tiny raft for 32 days; the ordeal of the

Englishman who single-handedly manned a weather station on the Greenland icecap for five months.

This is a book that will appeal to all interested in true adventure, psychology and the mysterious, seldom-tapped powers of man.

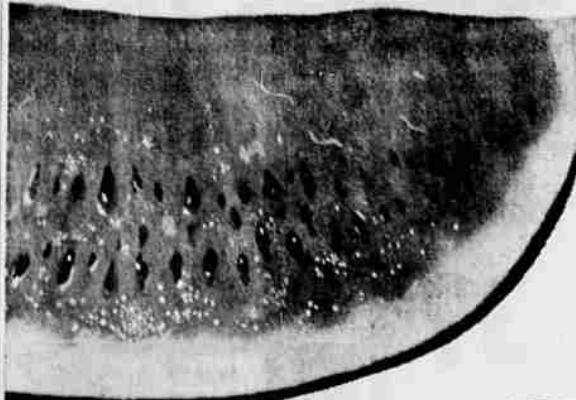
