

SALEM (UPI) Child slayer
Jeannine June Freeman won a
newly created \$100,000 lottery
and opened a new legal career
that could result in new appeals
for the state's first female ap-
pellate court judge.

Freeman may delay her next
execution date until after next
year's vote on repeal of the death
penalty.

Miss Freeman's attorneys, Carl
L. Smith and John W. Smith of
Portland, filed a motion for a stay of
execution on July 11, and a
post-conviction review with Mari-
on County Circuit Judge George
H. Smith.

The stay came 21 days before
Miss Freeman's scheduled Aug. 1
date with death in the Oregon gas
chamber. She was the first female
person executed in Oregon.

tory procedure, we are awaiting
the state's decision on the stay
conviction. We filed on the same
grounds that were raised in the
previous appeal. We are not sure

URGES PAY RAISES

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara appealed Wednesday to the Senate to restore pay raises for junior military officers to induce more of them to stay in the service.

Miss Freeman, 22, was first scheduled to die Dec. 8, 1962, then was granted a stay to Jan. 29. Her Aug. 1 execution date was set last month after the second U.S. Supreme Court refusal to review her conviction.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Collis Marsters has been assigned to handle the case for the state.

"She is entitled to file a post-conviction proceeding under the law," Marsters said, "the stay was necessary because we are so close to the execution date."

"This is going to be quite a

hearing, and may take a couple of days. Generally post-conviction cases don't take that long. We won't try the main issues of the crime itself, but we will have a hearing on the appeal."

If voters approve elimination of the death penalty, Miss Freeman would still be subject to execution because she has already been sentenced to die. However, change in the law might be interpreted by Gov. Mark Hatfield as a mandate of the people, and might commute her sentence to life in prison.

Hatfield to date has denied appeals for commutation.

Warden Clarence Gladden said Miss Freeman was handed a note advising her the stay had been granted.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress, which has never legislated a solution to a national railroad labor dispute, was uneasy today over the prospect of having to do so now.
